



# MUCH WENLOCK MALE VOICE CHOIR

#### LETTER FROM THE RECTORY

Every year, as Christmas approaches, people tell me that my busy time of year is coming up – and it is certainly a time when the world at large is aware of what is coming up in the church calendar. Whether we are in any way involved in the life of the church or not, Christmas is a large part of what is happening around us – in the shops, on the television, at home; with parties, presents, food and so much more. However, for the clergy and many of us who are actively involved in the life of our local churches, a busier time is coming up now, as we look to all that Holy Week and Easter will bring, with services (and preparation for services) throughout much of the week and particularly from Thursday to Sunday. Easter can perhaps have less impact on the world outside the church: a couple of bank holidays, some hot cross buns and an Easter Egg and that can be it – done!

We will never be able to experience the same range of emotions as the disciples because we know how the story ends, but journeying with Christ and his disciples through the events of that week helps us to understand more fully what Easter is all about. We invite you to join us at any or all of our services, whether they are in your local church or not, so that when we get there, we may all be able to welcome the risen Christ and share in the joy of the resurrection.



#### **CORVEDALE BOOK GROUP**

#### **ORBITAL BY SAMANTHA HARVEY**





This was Samantha Harvey's fifth book, a Booker Prize winning novel about a spacecraft containing four astronauts and two cosmonauts orbiting the earth collecting data, conducting scientific experiments and observing. Together they watch our silent planet: endless displays of spectacular beauty witnessed in a single day. They orbit sixteen times each day, each orbit shifting to a new trajectory. Although separated from the world they cannot escape its constant

pull. News reaches them of the death of Chie's mother in Japan and with-it thoughts of returning home. They look on as a typhoon gathers over an island and people they love. The fragility of human life fills their conversations, their fears, their dreams. So far from earth they begin to ask what is life without earth? What is earth without humanity? So far from earth they have never felt more protective or part of it.

The book takes place over a single day in which we read beautiful descriptions of our planet as it changes from dawn to day to dusk to night each orbit. We deduce that it takes place in October 2010, a year after the 'toilet row' between NASA and Russia, which led to the Russian cosmonauts having their own living area, facilities and food in the space craft, and when a Category 5 Super Typhoon devastated the Philippines. It is however clear that the six occupants are a real team. 'Whatever they were before they came here, whatever differences in training or background, in motive or character, whatever country they hail from and however their nations clash, they are equalised here by the delicate might of their spaceship.'

The novel has been described as genius, uplifting, exquisite,

beautiful, luminous, stunning, awe-inspiring, extraordinary. While some members of the group shared these views, others found it repetitive and even boring. Some didn't like the fact there is no plot and would have liked to know more about the individual characters. Others relished in the stunning imagery, the beautiful crafting of the book and the big ideas that made us reflect on our own place in the world and the fragility of the earth. This is a highly original book. The author herself says she did not set out to write a sci-fi novel but 'to try to do justice in words to the beauty of the earth and how I feel about the unnerving fact of its aloneness. I put astronauts in it because it needed a heartbeat, but they are just part of the image, not the lens.'

Our discussion covered the surprising details of life aboard a spaceship such as the need to catch tears so that liquids would not float around; the impact of being in zero gravity for that length of time on our bodies; the desire for never wanting to leave that sets in; the impact of being so far away from family especially at times of sadness; what might motivate someone to go in to space; and how humankind and particularly politics have shaped and crafted our planet.

The Booker Prize judges said 'By positioning the entire planet within a single narrative frame, Orbital blurs distinctions between borders, time zones and our own individual stories. This is a vantage point we haven't encountered in fiction before, and it is infused with such awe and reverence that it reads like a love letter, an act of worship.

'In offering us a vision of our planet as borderless and interlinked, Harvey makes the case for the futility of territorial conflicts, and the need for co-operation and respect for our shared humanity. This is a theme that couldn't be more sobering, timely, or urgent.'


#### **MUSINGS ON LIFE...**

#### WITHOUT AND WITHIN

The other day I was chatting after a meeting, talking about an exhibition I had just seen in London: 'Soil, the World Beneath our Feet.' My friend, on hearing some of this, launched into an eloquent speech about our seas and oceans. The burden of his discourse was wonder: unspeakable variety and natural abundance, but also fragility in these domains, which we were destroying before, long before, we had come to understand even partially what we were crushing.

Funny, that was the exact soil show message (Somerset House till 13th of April).

The plains of the American Midwest give us an example of what can go wrong. The light, windblown, deep, loess soils which built up after the last Ice Age were colonised by specialised grasses like this prairie grass. These were partnered by grazing beasts like the buffalo and a delicate equilibrium was achieved. The massive root system not only gives stability and seeks moisture but establishes a two-way cooperation between plant and soil universe. The green plant produces sugars avidly taken up by roots and soil beasts. The latter, in turn, produce a huge spectrum of chemicals taken up by the plant which support its life. Many of the soil organisms, notably fungi (are they animals or plants?), actually grow in soil



Well enough; so what went wrong? European settlers, many our ancestors, ploughed and artificially 'fertilised' the plains – of course they did. After heavy European soils this must have seemed like a dream, but they destroyed the stabilising fungal networks by so doing and 'force-feeding' the new cereals artificially diminished the work and vitality of root and soil biology both. The soil minerals left the way they had arrived – wind-blown dust!

No doubt an insect enthusiast, bird lover, plant, fungal or moss person would say something highly similar: everywhere, it seems, nature is under ruinous pressure and humanity is by no means excluded!

With a background in medicine (the italics are intentional),

and a long-time interest in historic landscape, it's hard for me not to think there is a fascinatingly close relation between the human body's deteriorating function (in many, though not all, areas), and the way those bodies encounter the natural world.

So this is where I want to draw a parallel with the human body: it is indicative, but not exact. Instead of the root system of the prairie grass think of the organs of our body that are in contact with the outside world... skin, nose and sinuses, lungs and gut. They all, like plant roots, receive... and the gut particularly, naturally profits from the goodness of food. These benefits are passed on to all our organs – good examples being brain and homeostatic systems, like the immune system which keep us on an even keel. Our gut-like plant roots, in rude health, spread to a massive area by twisting and astonishing superficial complexity (for the technically minded, by structures known as microvilli, massively increasing surface area – just like those roots).

For us, soil, and plants, threats arrive from all manner of industrial processes. While there are many inter-weaving factors, our food has become overwhelmingly big business. Soil and food are subject to mechanical and chemical disruption.

Soil and gut micro-life show direct comparison: many now refer to the soil within us!

Vicious cycles of destruction are all too common but virtuous cycles can also appear very quickly. Looking after a tiny patch to grow nutritious food will benefit you and generate life within and without the soil. Cooperating with friends and neighbours can magnify these benefits. Events like 'Soil' can show us hope also on a larger scale: brown hills in southern Mexico rendered barren by 'improvements' in the 1990s are now starting to green again by simple water management which helps the soil to regenerate. When the soil comes back to life, it seems, so does nature – including people.

#### **WOMEN'S INSTITUTE**

Our March meeting was particularly captivating with an engaging talk by Mainstone WI's President, Nowella Swanson, on the subject of her and husband Peter's visit to Botswana. She was accompanied by Mainstone WI's Secretary, Nikki, who assisted on the technical side by setting up and operating the slide projector to give us a pictorial overview of the 'bush,' the wildlife and the various extremely comfortable and highly facilitated accommodation provided in the army-type tents that Nowella and Peter stayed in. Nowella described how the background sounds of wild animals and birds investigating their accommodation at night kept them awake until, with their guide's assurance, they accepted that they were safe in their accommodation, being high up on stilt bases, enabling them to relax and sleep! Nowella and Peter had been on safari before over the years, starting with a trip to Kenya's Masai Mara, then, with their growing passion for safaris, returning to explore other African countries - and this time was Botswana's turn.

Botswana is a landlocked country in southern Africa with its landscape defined by the Kalahari Desert, the Okavango Delta, which becomes a lush animal habitat during the seasonal floods, and the massive Central Kalahari Game Reserve, with its fossilised river valleys and undulating grasslands being home to numerous African animals including giraffes, cheetahs, hyenas and wild dogs. Botswana boasts a significant population of the beautifully marked wild dogs, known for their striking coat patterns and intricate social structures. These wild dogs were Nowella and Peter's prime inspiration for taking this trip and they were in no way disappointed, with many images of those unusual, curious wild dogs and all the other animals they were able to get close to, as well as meeting many Indigenous people who were happy to welcome them in to observe their way of life. It is, of course, possible to find out all about Botswana, its animals and Indigenous peoples by searching the internet, but hearing about the experiences of one couple's personal trip was indeed special.

Our next meeting will be held on **Thursday 10th April** at 7.30pm. This is the first meeting of the 'programme' year when membership fees are due, and the new programmes are distributed. #### **NEWS FROM SHROPSHIRE COUNCIL**

#### REPORT FROM THE CORVEDALE

This is my final report to the parish magazines as your Unitary Councillor for the Corvedale division. The pre-election period is now under way and countywide the 74 candidates for election to the 72 divisions are busy leafleting and door knocking as the four-year local government term draws to a close.

I just wanted to highlight a particularly welcome result achieved by the portfolio area which I have covered since 2022 - Adult Social Care and Public Health. Shropshire Council has announced that its Adult Social Care services have been rated 'Good' following an assessment by the Care Quality Commission (CQC).

The CQC is now operating under a new regime and Shropshire Council's Adult Care Services were one of the earlier directorates to be examined by the CQC in its new guise. The majority of authorities examined to date have been urban based, so a very large rural authority like Shropshire, delivering care through both domiciliary and residential facilities, supported by initiatives such as assistive technology, must have presented a rather different perspective to their work.

The purpose of the CQC assessments is to understand the performance of Local Authorities and to assure CQC and the Department of Health and Social Care about the quality of care in an area and consider whether any improvements may be required.

In the report published at the end of February the CQC concluded that 'evidence shows a good standard' for the council's adult social care service, highlighting several areas where Shropshire Council is excelling in serving its community. The CQC report highlighted many areas of good practice and rated the service good in:

- Care provision, integration and continuity
- Safeguarding
- Partnerships and communities
- Governance, management and sustainability
- Learning improvement and innovation.

The council was pleased to hear from inspectors who said that many people across the county reported 'positive

experiences' with Shropshire's adult social care services, noting 'improvements in their independence' due to the care and support they received. Inspectors also heard positive feedback from unpaid carers and staff and described staff as 'committed and passionate.'

The CQC report identified many strengths within adult social care services, saying:

- The local authority has a good understanding of the diverse needs and make up the local population.
- There was a clear focus on promoting independence, and work to prevent, delay or reduce the need for care and support.
- The local authority has clear and effective governance, management, and accountability arrangements. This provides oversight of the delivery of their Care Act duties.
- The council has strong relationships with housing, health, public health, and community partners. Inspectors recognised the collaboration in aligning priorities, integrating care systems, and improving care quality and accessibility, ensuring that people can live independently and receive the necessary support within their local communities.

I am delighted for all our Adult Social Care professionals and the Executive Director for People, Tanya Miles, for this excellent result. I have seen how hard they work, their diligence, and their passion for their work. It has been a huge privilege to work with them and represent

the interests of the Adult Social Care directorate at Cabinet and Council.

#### DRAFT MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 5TH MARCH 2025

**Attendance:** Cllrs Barbara Archer (Chair), Richard Arnold, Nigel Dobson, Val Fotheringham, David Marston, Chris Meeson, Ed Povey and Graham Williams. In Attendance: H Coonick (Clerk/RFO).

Apologies for Absence: Cllr Cecilia Motley (Shropshire Council).

Declarations of Interest: None.

**Public Forum:** Two members of the public were in attendance. One asked the council to lobby the MP and Shropshire Association of Local Councils regarding the removal of hedgerows as part of agricultural schemes.

**Minutes** of the Parish Council meeting held on 5th February 2025 were approved as being an accurate record and they were signed by the Chair.

West Mercia Police: The Community Support Officer, Lisa Thomas, reported that Operation Whitebeam had flooded the area with marked and unmarked police vehicles in the late evening to deal with rural crime. Farmers could contact the police re trackers for their vehicles. There had been reports of hare coursing in the Corvedale. If residents were experiencing speeding at particular times of day, they should please report that to the police so they can monitor the situation and target vehicles. Fly tipping could be reported to the police if the crime was taking place: once the fly tipping had taken place then this needed to be reported to Shropshire Council via FixMyStreet. The Council wished the priorities to remain the same for the Neighbourhood Policing Team: Speeding, Rural Crime, and Wildlife Crime.

**Correspondence:** The council duly acknowledged receipt of the letter from C Prince re speed restrictions on the B4368.

**Reports:** Chair's Report: Cllr Archer reported that the Caring for God's Acre team would be working at Munslow Closed Burial Ground on 14th March.

Shropshire Council: Cllr Motley had sent a report. The Council had held its last council meeting the previous week before it went into the pre-election period. They had settled the accounts for this financial year but further savings would need to be made in the next financial year. The Council had received the Care Quality Commission rating of 'good' after the inspection last June. They had been working on the Devolution Agenda. She expected that the review of parish boundaries would restart after the election.

**Munslow Village Hall:** Cllr Dobson reported that the hall would be short of income this year as Millichope would not be opening the gardens. There would be another breakfast in April and they might be organising a guided walk ending at the hall for refreshments. He was encouraging people to organise events that could be held at the hall.

**South Shropshire Area Committee:** H Coonick (Clerk) said there had been an update on arrangements for the elections. Stanton Lacy Parish Council was concerned about an increase in fly tipping which would hopefully reduce now the booking system at the recycling centre had stopped. Nash Parish Council was concerned about the cost to small councils of the elections. The Committee planned to invite John Campion, Police and

Crime Commissioner and a representative of the Planning Enforcement Team to future meetings.

**Accounts:** It was agreed that Cllr Dobson would become an online banking authoriser.

Members resolved to open a Lloyds Savings Account and transfer funds into the account, keeping only sufficient in the current account for everyday needs.

Arrangements for the Parish Council Elections on 1st May 2025: Nomination papers were available from Shropshire Council Elections Team for anyone wishing to stand as a parish councillor and they needed to be submitted to Shropshire Council by 2nd April.

**Arrangements for the Annual Parish Meeting:** The meeting would be publicised in the Corvedale News, parish council website and Facebook page. The agenda would be decided at the next meeting.

**Highways:** The Environmental Maintenance Contractor would be asked to take on clearance of drains and a monthly check of the drain at Broadstone.

The issue of ditch digging was discussed and it was agreed to check with Shropshire Council what responsibilities they had and whether this would be carried out this year. This, and the Environmental Maintenance Grant application and hourly rate for 2025/26 were deferred to the next meeting.

**Agenda 2030:** It was agreed to write to Stuart Anderson, MP and Shropshire Association of Local Councils regarding the removal of hedgerows as part of agricultural schemes.

#### **CULMINGTON PARISH COUNCIL**

#### DRAFT MINUTES OF THE ORDINARY MEETING HELD ON 4TH MARCH 2025

**Present:** Councillors Mr M Seabrook (Chair), Mr A Pike (Vice Chair), Mrs C Byng, Mrs M Holland, Mrs J Mear, Mr I Steele. In Attendance: Cllr C Motley (Shropshire Council), H Coonick (Clerk/RFO).

Apologies for Absence: Mr Ian Alderson, Mr J Turley and Ms J Watts.

Declarations of Interest: None.

**Public Involvement Session:** Two members of the public were in attendance. Mr Andrew Mear reported that Shropshire Council had found the plans of the drain on Seifton Lane, installed in the 1990s, which he shared with councillors. Mr Mear had been asked by John Bellis, Shropshire Council, to arrange for the area in front of the outflow of the drain on Cllr Turley's land to be desilted. It was hoped that this would improve the drainage on Seifton Lane and allow for the drain cover to be repaired.

The Clerk read out a report from PCSO Lisa Thomas (West Mercia Police) who apologised for not being able to attend the meeting. She reported that there had been two crimes in Culmington Parish Council area during the last six months: both vehicle thefts. There had been no reports of hare coursing from Culmington but they were conducting regular patrols of the Corvedale as there had been reports in other areas. The team was keen to receive reports of offences as they occurred. They have recently conducted speed monitoring in Culmington village: the average speed of vehicles checked was 33.54 mph with one at 41mph and another at 45mph in the 40mph speed limit area. They had conducted a number of rural crime operations in the area which involved saturating the area with marked and unmarked vehicles during the evenings. They had visited farms offering security advice and supplied free SmartWater kits for farms that did not already have them. The Council wished to retain the same three priorities for the next six months: thefts (farm), speeding, and wildlife crime (which includes sheep worrying).

**Minutes** of the previous meeting were approved, subject to an amendment to entry 5.2 to mention that Cllr Mear asked that it state that 'the committee are seeking a new treasurer'. They were then signed by the Chair.

Reports from Members: Shropshire Council – Cllr Motley reported that SC had its last council meeting the previous week before it went into the pre-election period. They had settled the accounts for this financial year but further savings would need to be made next financial year. The Council had received the Care Quality Commission rating of 'good' after the inspection last June. They had been working on the Devolution Agenda. She expected that the review of parish boundaries would restart after the election.

Village Hall Committee - Cllr Mear reported that the AGM would be on 20th May.

**Flood Action Group** – Cllr Byng said that the Shropshire Wildlife Trust was visiting local farmers to look at storage ponds and how soil erosion might be prevented. The Trust also hoped to increase the leaky dams in Seifton Bache. The FAG had been informed by Shropshire Council that in future when a drain was being emptied it would also be jetted. Cllr Pike reported issues with water running from Sparchford Lane to the church after heavy rain. The Clerk would report this to Shropshire Council.

**South Shropshire Area Committee** – H Coonick (Clerk) reported that there had been an update on arrangements for the elections. Stanton Lacy Parish Council was concerned about an increase in fly tipping which would hopefully reduce now the booking system at the recycling centre had stopped. Nash Parish Council was concerned about the cost to small councils of the elections. The Committee planned to invite John Campion, Police and Crime Commissioner, and a representative of the Planning Enforcement Team to future meetings.

The Council would check to see whether Shropshire Council intended to clear ditches and if not to write a letter of objection.

It was agreed to increase the Environmental Maintenance hourly rate for 2025-2026 to  ${\tt f19.00}.$ 

Shropshire Council Traffic Engineer Nick Newton had responded to the request to move the Vehicle Activated Sign at the western entrance to Culmington village further west, stating that the present site allowed drivers time to adjust to the speed limit and clear access for the solar panels. Moving the VAS would detract from the importance of the remaining signs. The Clerk had asked West Mercia Police if speed checks could be taken from the entrance to the village hall.

Any Village Gateways installed at the entrances to Culmington village on the verge would need to be at least 450mm from the highway. The narrowest gates available are 960mm. The Clerk would continue to investigate this and measure the verge at the speed limit sign. She would also check if there would be a grant from the Police and Crime Commissioner for traffic calming in the new financial year.

**Flooding:** There had been a very useful site meeting with the Shropshire Council Flood Engineer and the plans for the drain had been found.

It was unlikely that Seifton Brook would be desilted this year. A Permit application would be submitted in mid-April.

**Items for the Annual Parish Meeting Agenda:** The Council would invite the Chair of the Flood Action Group and the Emergency Officer, Mr Hugh Disley, to the meeting. Consideration of parish boundaries would also be included in the agenda.

**Parish Council Election:** Nomination papers for the Parish Council Election on 1st May 2025 were now available from the Clerk or Shropshire Council for anyone interested in standing. The closing date for nominations is 2nd April.

**Risk Assessment:** it was agreed to include the need for specific Parish Councillor emails in the section on Cyber Security.

**Tree Preservation Order:** A preservation order has now been placed on the limes and pines opposite the Village Hall (TPO 2025 (SC/00530/25).

**Blocked Bridleway:** There had been no response from Shropshire Councillor Macey (Portfolio Holder - Culture and Digital). It was agreed to write again and copy in Lezley Picton (Shropshire Council's leader).

**Ludlow Hospital:** Replies from both the Mayor of Ludlow and the MP said that they shared the Council's concerns about the health and wellbeing of parishioners and were engaging with relevant partners to develop an action plan that would make healthcare simpler, faster and fairer.

Finance: It was agreed that the Asset Register was accurate.

The Statement of Internal Controls was adopted

It was agreed to retain £70.00 of the donations budget to support the Village Hall's maintenance of the defibrillator; to give donations of £35.00 each to Ludlow Hospital League of Friends, Shropshire Dial-a-Ride, Ripples Magazine and Midlands Air Ambulance.

Income of £250.00 from the Parish Paths Partnership (P3) was noted.

Payments were authorised to: Information Commissioner £47.00, H Coonick and HMRC for Salary Jan-March £889.85 and Travel Expenses £17.55, D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) Inv 700 £54.00, J Williams (reimbursement Parish Paths Partnership) £171.46.

It was considered that the additional administration of a second – savings - account would outweigh the small amount of interest now paid on savings accounts.

#### SUMMARY OF THE DRAFT MINUTES OF DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL'S MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 26TH FEBRUARY 2025 AT DIDDLEBURY VILLAGE HALL

**Present:** Cllr D Hedgley – Chairman. Cllrs A Watson, C Martyn, R Povall, T O'Boyle, T Pardoe and R Morgan.

Apologies: Cllr S Povall and Cllr A Rattu.

In attendance: The Clerk, Shropshire Cllr C Motley and one member of the public.

**Declarations of Interest:** None were made.

**Minutes** of the Parish Council Meeting held on 22nd January 2025 were approved and two matters arising – relating to Severn Trent Water and the Craven Arms recycling centre – were dealt with.

**Reports:** The Chairman reported on his meeting with Severn Trent Water about their proposed new pipeline. He had completed a response to SC's budget consultation and their Emergency Planning Survey. He had handed out and displayed the avian flu posters. He had submitted a report on DPC's Precept Budget to the Corvedale News and dealt with the issue of new batteries for the defibrillator in Bouldon.

**Clir Motley** confirmed that SC's move from Shirehall to the Guildhall on Frankwell Quay had almost been completed. The move put SC staff under much pressure as they were also gearing up for the elections in May. She reminded councillors they had until 4.30pm on 2nd April to submit their nomination forms if they wished to stand for re-election. Her last meeting with DPC would be in March as she was not standing for re-election.

**Mrs Worthington** reported on the numerous successful events which had been held at Westhope Village Hall. Community Lunches would be re-commencing in April. The WVH committee was seeking donations and grants to improve the heating. The Chairman invited the committee to submit a bid to DPC.

Flood Action Group: Cllr Martyn reported on his attendance at a Multi-Agency Flood

Forum meeting. He now had the co-ordinates for 52 leaky dams and he and Cllr O'Boyle would be surveying their condition. Cllr R Povall felt there should be at least 80 leaky dams locally to deal with flooding issues. Cllr Martyn noted that Highways had carried out repairs to the main drain in Pinstones Lane.

**Planning Applications:** Councillors considered application 24/00230/OHL to increase the height of the Moorwood Farm transformer, located at Moorwood Farm, Dinchope, from 9.5 metres to 11 metres. Councillors supported the application.

**Highways/Environmental Issues:** Further complaints had been received about the state of the road between the College and the Hillside development in Westhope. DPC had been advised it was scheduled for work in 2026 but would request earlier attention if possible.

**Communications and Correspondence:** Eleven items of correspondence were considered.

Item 10 was deferred to the next meeting. Item 11 was a communication and sets of draft plans from Connexus relating to the re-development of 3 and 4 Mill Lane. It was agreed that the proposed scheme was in line with DPC's discussions in July and this should be communicated to Connexus. A full planning application would then be awaited.

**Finance Matters:** The Finance Report for February 2025 was considered and cheques totalling £530.67 were approved for payment after which DPC held funds totalling £13,784.98. Cllr O'Boyle verified the reconciliation between DPC's cash book and HSBC's bank statement.

**Any Other Business:** No matters were raised, and the Chairman closed the meeting at  $8.35 \mathrm{pm}$ 

The next Parish Council meeting is on Wednesday 26th March 2025, 7.30pm at Westhope Village Hall.

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




