Letter from the Rectory

We begin this month in Holy Week, remembering the events that led up to Jesus' arrest, trial and crucifixion before we come to remember his rising to new life on Easter Day. In our services in the days of Holy Week and Easter we do what we can to experience the events we remember, with all the emotional ups and downs that can bring, so that when we come to Easter Day we have a more complete appreciation of what it is that we celebrate. I always think that as we journey through the events of Holy Week our experience of them is affected by the fact that we know how the story ends. We know that Jesus will die on the cross but that he will come back to life a few days later, so we do not experience the full despair felt by those who witnessed the crucifixion, or the same level of joy they felt when they realised that Jesus really had returned from the dead. Being, collectively, in a situation unlike any we have ever experienced, which brings with it both sorrow and joy, I wonder if we can have a better understanding of that first Easter as it may have been experienced by those who knew Jesus?

This will be our second Easter in Coronavirus restrictions. Last year we found ourselves doing everything online with the churches closed and a good deal of uncertainty about what lay ahead for us all. I remember last year feeling a particular resonance with the events we remember on Good Friday as I thought about the disciples and how they must have been feeling. This year we have been able to plan to have a mix of services - online and in church - and the continued progress of the vaccination programme means that the way ahead looks more hopeful than it has for a while. Around us we see signs of new life and hope: we are reminded that, as St Augustine put it, 'We are an Easter people - and alleluia is our song?'. Public health concerns may stop us actually singing 'alleluia' (or anything else) this year, but even so I wish you, when we get there, a very Happy Easter.



Details of the services are given elsewhere in the magazine and you are welcome to join us, either in church or online as we celebrate.

Climate Crisis - What can we do and what difference can we make in rural Shropshire?

South Shropshire Climate Action (SSCA) was set up in November 2019 following a public meeting in Craven Arms of concerned citizens. The first activity was a very successful online conference in September 2020 which strongly supported the idea of local action to combat the twin threats of Climate Change and Biodiversity Loss. Philip Dunne, our local MP, attended both meetings and encouraged the initiative which covers the whole of the Ludlow constituency. A similar campaign is taking place in the rest of the county by Shropshire Climate Action Partnership (SCAP) and the two organisations are working closely together.

SSCA's objective is to create an action plan for the achievement of Net Zero Carbon emissions in South Shropshire by 2030 and, in conjunction with others, to implement the plan as far as possible.

There are three working groups, focussing on Buildings & Energy, Transport, and Land & Biodiversity - and a fourth group concentrating on Communities and Education including the creation and maintenance of a website so that materials are available for community groups and schools.

Our second online conference is planned for **22nd May 2021**. There is still time to join one of the working groups. And we would be pleased to hear from you if you would like to know more.

A lot of inspiring local actions are already happening. We can make a difference by working together and drawing on a wealth of expertise that is already in our midst!

We really value local expertise and knowledge. We would like to find out:

- What's the best thing which has happened in the last year to help cut greenhouse gas emissions or loss of natural habitat?
- What are the most important things which need to happen next?
- What support is required to make that happen?

January was a wash-out, and far too wet to work the soil, but despite lockdown, we were able to do some repairs to footpaths in February working in pairs. It certainly was 'exercise' at times!

Many of you will be ecstatic by the change at Christmas Cross. The stile here has been in a bad state of repair for many years, and I know it is a well-walked path. It's not far from the bottom of the track leading down from Corfton, where the badger sett is, leading steeply up into, (or down from) the field is a smart new kissing gate with a few

extra steps to help negotiate the terrain. We even put a bar of wood to warn walkers of the rather large badger hole, beware! Also, if you approach the path from the track, watch where you tread, as the grass verge here is where the badgers have their latrine!



There are four stiles leading up from Middlehope to the Shropshire Way on Wenlock Edge.

All four were in need of attention and are now quite respectable and easier to negotiate. The ground is steeply sloping up and

The Tiger's Wife by Tea Obreht

Tea Obreht started life in Belgrade, Yugoslavia in 1985, moving to Cyprus and then Egypt at the age of seven and the USA when she was 12. *The Tiger's Wife* won the Orange Prize for fiction in 2011. It is a very complex and multi-layered book which displays a deep understanding of complex emotions. The story weaves together a mix of family history, folklore, war and how we make sense of the place of death in society.

Natalia, the narrator, recounts the story of her childhood, adolescence, and time at medical school, focusing on frequent trips to the zoo, to feed the animals and worship the tiger, along with her grandfather, who always carries his childhood copy of the *Jungle Book* in his top pocket. Her grandparents are an important part of her life with her mother. Her grandmother feeds and nurtures the household with food and stories. Her grandfather, a respected doctor, had a strong bond with her. He gets her and her friend Zora out of several scrapes, rescuing them even when he doesn't approve of what they are doing. When he develops a serious illness, it is Natalia he tells in confidence. By this point war has begun. The population is cross that the zoo has been closed and protests. When the zoo is bombed, the tiger escapes.

The grandfather was brought up in a rural village called Galina which was rife with poverty, prejudice, abuse and in-fighting. He lived with his grandmother and became a keen observer of how people around him behaved. He was also keen to help the underdog, in the form of the abused deaf-mute wife of Luka the butcher. As a nine-year old boy, he too encounters war and another escaped tiger, which forms a bond between him and Luka's wife. Both form a lasting impression on him. When he moves from the village, becomes a doctor and marries a woman from '*the other side*', he has strong values of love and tolerance.



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In helping the sick and injured he encounters '*the deathless man*' (Death's nephew), on several occasions, who eventually makes him repay the bet they made.

As an adult, Natalia too helps those damaged by war and with Zora sets off on a journey to vaccinate orphan children. She learns that her grandfather died alone in a nearby village and tries to discover more about his death and bring his belongings back to her grandmother so she can complete her mourning.

The writing is detailed, with fascinating descriptive passages, but the three interwoven plots make it initially difficult to get into. In many ways it is full of horror, of the vicious and divisive prejudice of one community against another, ultimately terminating in the devastation of a nationalistic war and its aftermath in a divided country. It is also about family, love, caring, loyalty and resilience. Wound around all the stories is the importance of making sense of the experiences which happen to us, whether through mythology, superstition or science.

The majority of the book group members enjoyed the book and found it thought provoking, even though some people had read it before. Aspects of the book were dark and depressing and related not only to that war, but other current ones in Syria, Yemen and Myanmar, and there was a sadness that we learn and gain so little from them. The focus on the impact of illness and death also had a resonance for the current pandemic and how the world is learning to adjust to unforeseen happenings in our time. Then, as now, aspects of life are 'on hold'.

Middlehope Celebrates...

Thanks to the unstinting work of Diddlebury Parish Council Clerk, Mrs Jean de Rusett, Middlehope and Bache Mill now have their own grit bins. A real cause for celebration! Many thanks and very well done Jean from all the residents in Bache Mill and Middlehope.



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Diddlebury Parish Flood Action Group (FAG)

As part of the Shropshire Flood Action Group Forum, we have attended Zoom meetings with several senior members of Shropshire Council including Professor Mark Barrow (Director of Place), Steve Smith (Assistant Director of Infrastructure) and John Bellis (Flood Risk Manager) and also senior members of Severn Trent. These face-to-face meetings are useful in that they give us a direct link to individuals who are near the top of the relevant decisionmaking processes in the Council and to whom we can appeal if our contacts lower down the hierarchy are being stymied by bureaucracy.

Shropshire Council has indicated that it is willing and able to provide funding to Flood Action Groups for the provision of things such as sand bags (or their modern equivalent - Flood Sax), road signs for use during flooding and so on. The Forum has carried out a survey of all its member Groups to quantify what is needed and the results of this will be passed to the Council for action. As part of this process we have been updating our Flood Response Plan (FRP) to ascertain what is needed locally. Our FRP is predicated on triggers, which in Diddlebury are the flow levels in the Diddle brook as shown on the level gauge by the road bridge. As there are no equivalent gauges in the Pye brook, we are pushing for the provision of a new flow level gauge in the Pye brook above Bouldon so that settlements downstream have some early warning of flooding. The one in Diddlebury has proved to be very useful.

In line with the above, we are trying to recruit a volunteer in each of the settlements we cover to act on our behalf at times of flooding - first preference being the Core Group Member in that location. In particular, we are looking for anyone who has useful skills (first aid etc.) or useful equipment (4x4 etc.). We also could do with sites for storage of sand bags etc. in most settlements. The NFF offer training to volunteers and have also set up insurance products to cover the actions of all such volunteers (including those involved in regular stream clearances, litter picking etc.). We are currently investigating these to see which we need as a Group.

There is a good chance of ongoing funding for the Slow the Flow project in the Corvedale after the end of the current one which has now been completed. The report on this project, which will include the report from Cardiff University on the effectiveness of leaky dams, will be published in the next month or so.

Otherwise, we continue with the usual grind of trying to get Highways to clear blocked gulleys (like the perennially blocked one in Mill Lane, Diddlebury) and more urgently, the undermined wall in Bouldon.

We have applied to Shropshire Council for a new Ordinary Watercourse Consent (OWC) which we need in order to carry out any work in the Diddle brook. Our current one expires in May.

We continue to monitor all incoming Planning Applications thanks to the assistance of Diddlebury Parish Council.

We have requested £50 from the Diddlebury Parish Council for the FAG to top up the amount already allocated.

Although we have not been able to hold any meetings for what seems like years, the work of the FAG goes on.

The Corvedale Kitchen

Sweet Potato, Butternut Squash & Smoked Chilli Soup

Another new contributor this month. A really warming soup which can be made more luxurious with addition of some cream. Serves 4

Ingredients

25g butter or tablespoon of olive oil
1 clove garlic
225g sweet potato
1 small butternut squash, washed, deseeded
and diced into 3 cm cubes (leave skin on)
1/4 teaspoon sweet smoked paprika

1/2 small red chilli, finely diced750ml vegetable stock2 teaspoons wholegrain mustard1 tablespoon parmesan cheese, finely grated125ml of double cream (optional)

Salt and freshly ground black pepper

Method

- 1) Melt the butter in a large pan (or warm the olive oil).
- 2) Add the garlic, sweet potato and butternut squash, stir, cover and cook for 10 minutes on a medium heat.
- 3) Add the smoked paprika and red chilli and cook for a couple of minutes, stirring
- 4) Add the stock and bring to the boil, cover and simmer for about 20 minutes or until the sweet potato and butternut squash are cooked through
- 5) Allow to cool a little and then stir in the mustard and parmesan, blend until smooth (adding more stock if you feel it is too thick at this point)
- 6) Add the cream, if using, season to taste and gently reheat for a couple of minutes before serving.

Can be frozen before the addition of the cream (if using).

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Corvedale Past and Present

Mediaeval and Fishy?

Those that work, those that pray, and those that fight - but who got the fish?

Last time I wrote about mediaeval fish and fishing around our coasts and felt a little guilty that I wasn't able to bring that 'home' to any degree. So I judged I should write 'local' this time, in the context of three broad categories of mediaeval society, though in all honesty it's a rather scanty classification.

South Shropshire's fields are really rich in 'humps' with many resonances of a distant past and in particular many of them can be related to water filled features.

So, to our fishy thoughts - and what we can say of fish ponds, stews, moats and fry ponds. Who built them? At the behest of whom? Who looked after them and who ate the fish, and when?

The mediaeval church in Western Europe used to forbid the eating of meat for about a third of the year, taking into account yearly festivals, saints' days and fast days.

Fighting was the thing that really set the upper echelons of society apart (the professional peasant soldier came on the scene later), and, for them, fish ponds were not only a status symbol, but also a resource when they felt they had to refrain from eating meat. In the Peasants' Revolt of 1381 the fish ponds or 'stews' in Southwark, opposite London on the South Bank of the Thames, were so associated with the nobility that they were a natural target for the would-be revolutionaries.

It was essential for 'those who prayed' – priests, bishops, and monks - that a source of fish (which was effectively any living aquatic beast), should be near at hand, so if no sea or river fish were available the monastic or episcopal fish pond was a 'must have'.

For those who worked, the peasantry, who made up the vast bulk of the population, fish ponds meant work! It was a normal part of the management that the ponds were drained every three to five years, and the pools restocked. The pond silt was regarded as highly valuable and extremely fertile and this would be carted off to be spread on the peasants' or the lord's fields.

Over time, the old orders started to break down, particularly after about 1300, and many 'middling sorts', such as merchants or the more prosperous peasant farmer, started renting their own fish-ponds. From then on, the process became a lot more commercial, particularly with the introduction of the carp from Europe which was fast growing and needed little feeding.

How does this play out locally? There are a surprising number of recognised mediaeval fish ponds in our area, and many more mediaeval moats surrounding the houses of the gentry and nobles. Moats would have had a very similar function to fish ponds and they were all about status rather than defence. Although many have found their way into the official records, many more suspected fish ponds dating from mediaeval times have not. I will give a couple of local examples.



High on the flank of Titterstone Clee is the village of Cleeton St Mary, where church and village were a Victorian creation. However, travel a little downhill to the northwest and there is what English Heritage believe is a rounded moated site and adjacent fish pond and, in close attendance, a now deserted mediaeval settlement.

On the gently sloping plateau between the Brown Clee and The Corvedale, there is an apparently isolated Chapel dating from 1100 or so, at Heath. The Chapel would have been in no way isolated in the mediaeval times. It was surrounded by a substantial village spread over some 15 to 16



acres. Just to the north of the Chapel are some interesting earthworks, which most probably represent a moated structure (partially seen to the right) and an adjacent fish pond (to the left).

It's no surprise that the two structures stand cheek by jowl in both examples. There are well over 200 known mediaeval moats in Shropshire alone. Fish ponds are usually more difficult to recognise and the two can occur separately or together, where they represent a pretty substantial piece of water engineering.

Afterthoughts: English Heritage get pretty excited about Cleeton because round moats are uncommon; they are usually square or oblong. They probably represent an earlier phase when moats started appearing in the 13th century.

Secondly, the 'Southwark Stews' were the mediaeval red light district of London, the name being transferred from the aquaculture enterprise to one of a rather different nature. It's usually stated that the ownership of this latter 'industry' was in hands of the Bishop of Winchester!

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Munslow Parish Community Speed Watch (CSW)

CSW Sessions: As and when the Covid-19 restrictions are gradually lifted, our Munslow Community Speed Watch sessions will begin again. However, whilst the traffic lights in Munslow continue to operate they are doing some of the work for us by slowing down the traffic as they pass through the double bend. Unfortunately, local residents still observe vehicles ignoring the 30mph limit as they enter and leave the village.

NPCC National Seatbelt and Mobile Phone Campaign: Plans for how our CSW team can be involved with this initiative are still to be confirmed.

IAM RoadSmart: Leafing through my husband's Spring 2021 issue of the IAM (The Institute for Advanced Motorists) member's magazine for advanced drivers and riders, I noticed that the organisation offers a 'Managing

Speed' course for those of us who have experienced occasions where our speed has crept up unawares. The short one-off session is designed to improve the ability to drive proactively at the appropriate speed and provide techniques for monitoring and controlling speed. Alternatively, there is a 'Managing Speed' e-learning module which takes around 20 minutes to complete. I plan to try out these courses when restrictions allow. You can find out more about both courses at *www.iamroadsmart.com*.

CSW Training: Mark Booth (our Mercia Police liaison officer) has offered to arrange some Speed Watch training sessions as soon as possible. Anyone who is interested and has a spare hour, will need to complete a simple security form which can be obtained from me at the email address below.

Sutton Court and the Powell family

Part Three: Charles and Louisa

As noted last month, Charles Fletcher succeeded to the estates in 1806 and took on his father's name, and it might be thought that the circumstances of his birth would have been something of an embarrassment. We must remember, however, that this was Regency period, and the dead hand of Victorian respectability had not yet cast its gloomy shadow over the land. In fact Charles Powell was not the only illegitimate landowner in the parish in the early nineteenth century, for William Beddoes of Sparchford and Thomas Lloyd Roberts of Corfton Hall were both similarly placed. Charles Powell took his place in county society, and served as a magistrate and Deputy Lieutenant.

Although as yet no documentary evidence has come to light, it is certain that the large scale rebuilding of the Court was undertaken during Charles Powell's time as owner, and it is to this work that the building owes much of its present appearance. It may be that the work was undertaken in preparation for, or as a result of, his marriage. In April 1843, at the age of 62, he married Louisa Coombe of Stoke St. Milborough at Stoke church. Louisa was forty years old at this time, so the likelihood of an heir was fairly remote. Nothing is known to me of how they came together, though it is possible that the family papers may contain the answer. Louisa was the daughter of Captain William Coombe RN, who had died in the West Indies in 1808.

William Coombe's exploits in the Caribbean read like an episode of *Hornblower*. In 1807 as a Lieutenant commanding the *Galatea* he had captured the French vessel *Lynx*. After bitter fighting on deck the ship was secured at the third attempt, but Coombe was hit in the thigh by a musket ball, above a previous amputation. The *Lynx* was taken into the Royal Navy as HM Sloop *Heureux*, refitted in Antigua and sent into action under Coombe as Captain. The following year he was killed by a cannon ball while leading his men on a night raid on ships in a harbour on the island of Guadeloupe.

What brought Coombe's widow and her daughter from their home in Plymouth to Shropshire is not known. Both were staying as guests at Sutton Court when the 1841 census was taken, and, when Charles and Louisa were married, Mrs Coombe came to live at the Court. She died in 1856 aged 70, having been a widow for 48 of those years, and it is interesting to note that Charles Powell was in fact five years older than his mother-inlaw. In 1868 Powell died, aged 87, and was buried in the churchyard at Diddlebury by the porch. Unusually, he was commemorated by two monuments. One was erected on the north wall of the Chancel, in the same style as those of his father and grandfather. A large monument was erected by his widow over his grave in the churchyard, which also commemorates Mrs Coombe and her husband. Charles Powell's will may seem somewhat strange to many people now, but was perfectly normal in the nineteenth century. Louisa was given a life interest in the estate, after which it became 'entailed' – which meant that it is passed down through the nearest male relative until the line ceased. This practice was used to keep estates together by making it impossible for a spendthrift heir to sell off part or all of the property to pay his debts. Apart from its unfairness to the widow, entails caused no end of trouble and a great deal of income for lawyers. Many readers will be familiar with the anxiety caused to the Bennett family in *Pride and Prejudice* by the spectre of Mr Collins inheriting their home on Mr Bennett's death. The entail on the Sutton Court estate was not so contentious, but as we shall see in next month's article, led to some strange circumstances.

Louisa lived at the Court until her death in April 1898 at the age of 95. Under the terms of the will she was given a choice of a lump sum of £1,000 and an annuity of £100 for life, or an annuity of £400 for life. Let us hope that she chose the latter option! She also came into a small sum from her mother's estate on the death of Charles, so she should have been fairly comfortably off. As a widow she lived a very quiet, almost reclusive, life with only a couple of servants. She did, however, leave one lasting memorial, for in 1876 she purchased a piece of land at the lower end of Corve Street in Ludlow where two years later she established an almshouse for five poor inhabitants of Diddlebury and Stanton Lacy who had been engaged in agriculture. In those days, when the workhouse was the only refuge for the elderly poor, the little brick cottages must have seemed like heaven. They still exist, providing homes for the needy, though the terms of the charity have been widened as there are few indigent farm workers seeking accommodation today.

MUNSLOW PARISH COUNCIL

Minutes of the meeting held on Thursday 4th March 2021 at 7:30 pm via Zoom

Present: Barbara Archer (Chair), Linda Charie, Ed Povey, Val Fotheringham, Mike Kelly, Buster Evans: Cecilia Motley (Shropshire Council); Clive Leworthy (Clerk).

Apologies for Absence: Chris Meeson and Antonia Bury.

Declarations of Interests: Cllrs Evans and Charie declared prejudicial interests in Beambridge Village Hall.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved with one amendment ('Flood Action Group' not 'Flood Awareness Group').

Matters Arising from those minutes not covered on the Agenda - none.

Urgent Items For Discussion: There were none.

Reports: (a) The Chair reported that Anne Donnelly had an old laptop which had previously belonged to MPC. It was agreed that it be donated to either Corvedale School or Playgroup after it had been wiped of all information. The next meeting of South Shropshire ALC would take place Monday 7.30pm. Either the Chair or Mike Kelly would attend.

(b) SC Cllr Cecilia Motley: There was a strong feeling that Zoom meetings should continue as an option for Council to meet after May 6th when the current legislation expires. The Government was being lobbied to extend this option.

(c) Community Governance Review: Cllr Motley urged Councils to review their boundary issues with neighbouring Councils and explore any other options for collaboration.

Beambridge Village Hall Lease: At present the lease for the Beambridge Clubroom is between the Bury Family and Munslow Parish Council, and is due to run out in March 2023. The lease has Munslow Parish Council as the Custodian Trustee and the Management Committee as the Trustees. This lease was first drawn up in 1989 for 21 years and then a renewal lease was signed by Munslow Parish Council in 2002 for a further 21 years.

The Bury family now wish to place Beambridge Village Hall in the Millichope Foundation and to do so as soon as possible. Therefore, a new lease was drawn up by the Millichope Foundation solicitors. This was sent to the Clerk last November but there seems to have been a misunderstanding on the part of the solicitors.

This new lease changed the status of the Parish Council from Custodian Trustee to that of a tenant with no mention of Trustees. A small paragraph said that a Management Committee would take on the day-to-day running of the Hall but no details were given. It was very different from the present lease and involved the Parish Council in significant additional liabilities.

It is the responsibility of the Trustees to negotiate the new lease and it has been agreed with them that the new lease would be a renewal lease in the same way as the 2002 lease. This would keep the status of the Parish Council as Custodian Trustees and the Hall Committee as the Trustees of the lease, undertaking the day-to-day management. The original lease has worked well for the last 41 years and so it seems sensible to continue in the same mode.

Once the new lease, with the Parish Council as Custodian Trustees and the Committee as the Trustees had been received it would come before the Council for consideration and. if agreed, to be duly signed.

Finance: The accounting statement was agreed.

The following payments were approved: Clerk's salary£156.67, Clerk's expenses £14.39, HMRC £ 39.20.

Planning Matters: Application no *21/00788/FUL* - Installation of external wall insulation, with render finish, to include associated alterations to eaves and verges; relocation of rainwater goods and SVP relating to 2, 3 and 7 Greenyard Cottages, Munslow. Applicant: Connexus Housing. The Council resolved to support this application,

Highways: The Clerk reported that the post for the VAS sign had not yet been installed by Kier: he had asked SC chase this up.

The Council agreed that the Highways Report should be sent with the Chair's covering letter to Kevin Aitken and David Gradwell (both SC Highways), Graham Oliver (PCC) and Mark Booth (West Mercia Police). Some Council members expressed concerns that not enough time had been allowed to debate the various preferred options. Other Councillors thought it would be better to wait until SC's response had been received. It was agreed that the Highways report would be placed on the Agenda as a standing item for the foreseeable future therefore allowing debate as required.

Parish Council Facebook Page: the Council debated various options, including Facebook, but it was felt there were a number of potential pitfalls for the Parish Council in running its own page. Cllr Povey said that he was prepared to look at setting up a village Facebook page. The Chair outlined various options that were already available: Corvedale Google Group, Next Door Munslow & WhatsApp plus Corvedale News, all of which could be utilised for Council news.

Environmental Grant: The Council felt that having reviewed their spending on the Environment Maintenance Officer over the past two years they would not get best value for Council tax payers if they entered into an arrangement with Stanton Lacy PC for a joint contract. The Council would therefore continue to use the EMO on an ad hoc basis as required.

Correspondence: A resident had raised issues regarding the calming measures and the road surface at Broadstone/ Hungerford, both of which needed repair. This had been reported to SC.

Elections 2021: The Chair had attended an online Election session which encouraged Councils to use various ways of promoting the elections and encouraging people to stand for their local Councils. This included posters, social media and websites. The Clerk said he would be sending out a link shortly which would enable people to download their nomination papers. More information will follow.

Public Involvement Session: 3 members of the public attended the meeting. One supported the Planning Application for 19 Burley. Another raised concerns about the Boundary Review. As Cllr Motley was not present this matter will be included in Potholes Repairs and Drains Clearance Delays: There are the agenda for the next meeting. The applicant for the Planning still issues with the drains in Culmington Village, the B4365 and Application at 19 Burley explained the plans.

Minutes of the meeting held on 2nd February 2021 were approved as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

Matters Arising: Cllr Mear reported that she owned the boundary between Seifton Brook Cottage and The Old School.

Reports from Members: Cllr Motley (Shropshire Council): Cllr Motley was absent but had sent a report. The parish governance review will begin in May this year. Would there be any advantages to Culmington Parish working more closely with any of its neighbouring parishes? This may be an opportunity for considering whether there are road, environmental maintenance and flood schemes, which might be better done collaboratively with neighbours.

The other issue to think about is whether the number of councillors representing the parish is correct, and the warding arrangements (do all councillors look after the same patches?) and possible boundary changes (eg Seifton Bache/Diddlebury) that councillors might like to see.

It is possible that a lot of people will not wish to go to the polling stations for the local elections so it would be worth ensuring that any residents who don't already have them can get hold of postal votes or proxy votes. The Clerk agreed to inform Ripples.

Cllr Steele (Flood Action Group): A multi-agency meeting was planned for 4th March. There is continued representation of the group at The Shropshire Flood Forum meetings where there has Internal Auditor for 2021-22: It was agreed that Jayne Disley been much discussion on drainage issues and the slow response should be the Internal Auditor. from Shropshire Council when blocked drains etc. are reported.

Cllr Mear (Village Hall): although the hall remains closed there is a meeting in late March to consider plans for reopening.

Correspondence: Came and Co Insurers have increased the Street Furniture sum to £5670.22 to include the Speed Sign. Cllr Alderson asked the Clerk to check whether this covers the

Planning: 21/00496/FUL - erection of single storey side extension 19 Burley, Craven Arms, Shropshire, SY7 9LW. Resolved (unanimous) to support.

Seifton Lane. The Clerk was asked to report these issues again with copies to Cllr Motley. The Clerk reported the flooding near the church again. Cllr Turley asked the clerk to report potholes and ice risk due to surface water at Castle Barn.

'We Don't Buy Crime' SmartWater Initiative: The clerk reported that 70% of the purchased kits had now been registered so the police will erect up to 9 signs on entrance roads to the parish. There are still 38 kits available.

Speed Sign: The speed sign has been installed and already a resident has noticed an effect on the speed of traffic passing her home. The position was decided upon by Shropshire Council; it needed to be unobstructed as it is solar powered.

Review of the Environmental Maintenance Contract: The clerk has informed the present contractor and will now advertise the contract in Ripples in collaboration with Stanton Lacy Parish Council. Diddlebury PC wish to remain with the present arrangements and Munslow have not made a decision yet.

Local Elections May 2021: These are planned for the 6th May and nomination packs are available to download from Shropshire Council website.

Signage at the Racecourse: The Clerk contacted the racecourse about replacement of the sign with forthcoming race dates. They responded with a list of dates which is also available on their website.

Dennis Jubb: Cllr Mear wanted to report that the support of the community at Mr Dennis Jubb's funeral was a good tribute to him. A memorial service will be held in Culmington later in the year.

Summary of the draft Minutes of Diddlebury Parish Council's meeting held on Wednesday 24th February 2021 via Zoom.

Present via Zoom: Cllr D Hedgley - Chairman, Cllrs O'Boyle, Woodhouse, S Povall, R Povall, Watson, Worthington.

Apologies were received and accepted from Cllr S Thomas and Unitary Cllr Motley.

In attendance: the Clerk and eight members of the public.

A Declaration of interest was made by Cllr O'Boyle in respect of planning application 21/00656/TCA.

Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting of 27th January 2021, following a few amendments being made, were approved by a majority of councillors and signed by the Chairman. Five matters arising were dealt with.

Reports: *The Chairman* reported, amongst other things, on his response to an expression of interest for a Community Led Housing Scheme involving land between Milford House and The Moors in Diddlebury. He and the Clerk had spent a lot of time liaising about correspondence from Mr Waite and with HSBC over their threats to close DPC's bank account.

Flood Action Group Report: Cllr O'Boyle reported that flood action volunteers are being sought in each Diddlebury settlement, as are sites for the storage of sand bags. It is hoped more funding will be available for a Slow the Flow project in the Corvedale and for flow gauges for the Pye Brook above Bouldon.

Diddlebury Village Hall: Cllr Woodhouse reported it is hoped the hall will be able to re-open in April or May. Shropshire Council has booked the hall for the elections on 6th May.

Planning Applications: 21/00564/FUL - an application for the conversion of a Dutch Barn into storage units for Barns A & B at Hales Barn, Diddlebury. The parish council supported this application.

21/00656/TCA - an application for the removal of branches and reduction in the height of trees within the Diddlebury Conservation Area, namely at Glebe Farm, Mill Lane, Diddlebury. The parish

council supported this application.

Highways & Environmental Matters: The very poor response from Highways in dealing with reported highways issues, including potholes, blocked drains and the failure to supply the mirror for the Bache Mill junction was discussed at length. The Clerk was asked again to contact Highways on all outstanding matters and to copy Cllr Motley in to the correspondence. DPC has ordered and paid for salt bins for Middlehope and Bache Mill: their delivery is imminent and Gary Trim will be asked to arrange a grit supply. Cllr Watson reported that the sign on the B4368 indicating the turning to Middlehope is lying in a hedge. The remains of the Tally Ho's signage at the top of Mill Lane has not been removed as requested.

Communications & Correspondence: Sixteen items of correspondence were considered. A detailed response was given by the Chairman to the four requests from Mr Waite about why Cllr O'Boyle was not visible at Zoom meetings and Cllr S Thomas' attendance at Zoom meetings and intentions to remain as a councillor.

Finance: The Finance Report for February 2021 was considered by members and cheques totalling £545.92 were approved for payment. Cllr O'Boyle verified the bank statement/cash book reconciliation.

Any Other Business: The meeting on 24th March will be via Zoom, as will the April meeting. The right to hold Zoom meetings expires on 5th May 2021 and it remains to be seen whether open meetings will be allowed after that. A resident of Bouldon has obtained a defibrillator for that village. DPC will encourage people seeking possible grant avenues for funding units for Diddlebury/Westhope/Middlehope. Cllr O'Boyle gave a vote of thanks on behalf of the council to the Clerk and Chairman for keeping the parish council fully functioning during the past year despite the many administrative difficulties created by the pandemic.
