

CHURCH NEWS

LETTER FROM THE RECTORY

I'm writing this on St Swithin's Day and it's raining hard. Tradition says this means we have forty days of rain to come – so no change there – but by the time you read this the summer holidays will be upon us and perhaps even some better weather. The school summer holidays have their origin in the time that children were needed on the farms to help with the harvest and so weren't able to go to school – a reminder that for some the summer is anything but a time for holiday. For others, though, it is a time to relax, to take time out and to enjoy the summer weather (if we get any).

In church this year we are reading our way through St Mark's Gospel. It is the shortest of the gospels and can sometimes feel action-packed as Mark rushes us from one event to the next. If you read it carefully, however, and perhaps with a Holy Land map to hand, you can see that there were times when Jesus and his disciples had time out, not least as they travelled from place to place in journeys that would sometimes have taken several days on foot.

None of us can go at full speed all the time. The Book of Genesis tells us that, having spent six days creating the world, God rested on the seventh day, and in the Ten Commandments we find the instruction to rest on the Sabbath. We need time to rest and to re-charge, however, whenever we are able to take it. For some of us that means time out, for others it means immersing ourselves in an activity that we enjoy. Whatever works for you I hope that this summer brings an opportunity for some rest, relaxation and enjoyment.

CORVEDALE BOOK GROUP

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IN THE WARS BY DR WAHEED ARIAN

Dr Arian's memoir was written by Caroline North McIlvanney and this is acknowledged by the doctor who states that she has accurately and sympathetically presented the many extraordinary aspects of his life. The book was published in 2021 and it is through this narrative that he wishes 'to inspire others to help to make the world a better place'. He was born in Afghanistan and, fleeing with his family from conflict, he spent much of his early childhood in both Afghanistan and Pakistan, living in extremely basic conditions and surviving serious illnesses. It was through this early firsthand experience of disease and the primitive medical support available at that time that he became interested in medicine and how he could gain enough knowledge and experiences to enable him to eventually help others. This desire to make the world a better place and the constant encouragement he received from his parents has continued to motivate him throughout his remarkable achievements and experiences.

Demonstrating his remarkable resilience and courage he endured being smuggled into the UK and detained in Felton, working through PTSD and studying medicine at Cambridge, Imperial College, and Harvard. He finally became an NHS doctor and radiologist. Throughout this period in his life, he continued to care for the majority of his family members who had stayed in Afghanistan and also a younger brother who had followed him to the UK. In 2015, against many odds, he established Arian Teleheal, a global charity that connects doctors in war torn, low resourced countries to their counterparts in UK, USA, Europe, and Australia. They share their expertise and experience to save lives,

As book group members, we wholeheartedly agreed that we found the book inspirational and almost ran out of words to express our general admiration. We applauded his amazing bravery and determination. We also shared, with some expressions of guilt, how ignorant we were about the history of the conflicts in Afghanistan and the conditions experienced by the majority of the population who fought for survival against poverty and almost constant danger.

There seemed to be a consensus that it was easier to engage with the earlier part of the book in which the social and educational aspects of Waheed's earlier life and the factors that influenced his later extraordinary achievements are discussed. The latter part of the book describes and explores a series of events and provides an opportunity for Waheed to present his ideas and achievements. One that generated discussion was his view on the underestimated value of refugees and how, by opening our hearts to them, we 'can play our part in healing our world.'

CARING FOR GOD'S ACRE

So, good news for Shropshire last month when something old, but new to us, was discovered. Did you spot the news that the National Trust at Attingham Park, right in the centre of the county, has discovered a couple of Roman villas within the parkland which makes up a very large site?

The Trust had not been expecting to find anything when it decided to do a huge geophysical survey of the site. The reason for the survey was to start looking at climate-change-aware land use. It was aimed at giving the Trust more knowledge about its land, which covered 1,000 hectares. I am not too good at hectares (or acres for that matter) but I do know it's very big as I have visited the site many times.

These surveys are so clever these days that they could see the floor plans for the villas and their outbuildings. Those who know that part of Shropshire will know that Wroxeter, where lie the remains of a Roman City called Viriconium Cornoviorum, is not too far away. Maybe these villas were on the edge of that town?

But the survey showed more, both earlier and later history. The existence of the Anglo-Saxon hall was already known, but exciting for me is that much more detail is now available, even though it is still underground. Anglo-Saxon England is the age I love, and I am working on an Anglo-Saxon church trail for the Shropshire Churches Tourism Group (SCTG). We

will be able to offer a good coach trip day out GOD'S ACRE and possibly a 5-day holiday break. I still have work to do, but I am encouraged to think there is even more from that era in our county.

And just when you thought that was all, they found some Iron Age farms and a World War II airfield, which was part of Attingham Park for the five years from 1941 to 1946, a base for the United States Air Force. It seems that our county has been inhabited for thousands of years, a history we should be very proud of and protective of all these sites.

So, as the Secretary of SCTG, can I suggest you can find lots of history for the last 1,000 of those years in our church buildings, one in every village! Pick up a brochure from your local ancient building and you will see more than 100 churches with lots of history, the stories of our ancestors. Step through a few of the doors and support those who are caring for these buildings for us all. It's a nice day out too!

PEAR TREE COTTAGE, WITTON HILL, WICHENFORD

After leaving in the rain, the day was kind to us and when we arrived at Pear Tree Cottage we had a warm welcome from the owners, Pamela and Alistair Thompson. Luckily, it turned dry, and later we had sunny weather to explore this remarkably interesting garden. These three-guarter acre gardens are wrapped around the recently reroofed Grade II listed black and white cottage. They are situated in the heart of Bulmer orchard country with wonderful views across Worcestershire towards Abberley Clock Tower. The owners have developed their garden over many years. They are experienced 'plants people' with some lovely combinations of shrubs, roses and herbaceous perennials. There are unusual trees too, including a beautiful Tulip Tree, a Coastal Redwood, Acers, Cotinus - too many to list here.



As you walk into the property there is a pear motif under your feet on the drive and 'pears' appear in many different nooks and crannies of this fascinating garden. There was an abundance of recycled and upcycled items to add interest and quirkiness, without becoming

overwhelming. Things are reused in a sensitive and creative fashion. From the terrace around the house itself, gently sloping lawns lead into woodland, a fernery and compost areas around the edge of the property; then onto a series of small garden rooms, an enclosed luxurious chicken area for the four resident hens and a lily pond with newts and native fish. Each section has its own sitting area to make the most of

the views of the garden and beyond. In the productive area of the garden there was an impressive Hartley Botanic greenhouse and vegetable beds full of potatoes, carrots, beans, salads, all thriving. This lead to on to the log store. Then there were the sheds and summer houses, for which they have won awards. Such a variety - one devoted to housing their library of garden books, magazines and winning certificates from local shows. An immaculately laid out tool shed, with well organised, clean and oiled tools, which we might all dream of. A potting shed, a shed set up for writing and another one for painting - and a huge conservatory housing three coffee plants with ripening beans. So much to see and take in - I will need to go again. When we needed a break, drinks and delicious cakes were served from the garage; we all found seats in the sun to chat. Alistair joined us to explain more about the garden and to show us the photo books of their developments over the years. The Thompsons richly deserve to have been awarded Midlands Regional Winner of the Nation's Favourite Garden.

Pear Tree Cottage is regularly open through the National Garden Society and offers visits for groups. They also do a summer evening visit with Pimms. In May they had 270 NGS visitors and raised £2,376. They are open again on 25th August or see their blog www.peartreecottage.me for regular updates on the next project or planting.

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CORVEDALE PAST & PRESENT

VANITY, ALL IS VANITY...I'LL NEVER BE ABLE TO LOOK A PICKAXE IN THE EYE AGAIN!

Shortly before writing this piece for our wonderful local magazines I made two visits to Hartlebury in Worcestershire where, as you may know, there is a 'castle'. In truth it doesn't look much like a castle, the place being mostly transformed from its mediaeval origins by successive bishops of Worcester. We, as a family, made several visits to the archaeological dig on a hill adjacent to the castle. I'm not going to describe here

what it was all about (it's a bit too complicated to do it justice) but if you Google 'Dig Hartlebury' and look at the Facebook page you will see interesting explanations and spectacular aerial photography. If you don't know how to do that, please give me a ring and I will try to talk you through it.

We've had many civil wars in this country, but one of them we call '*The* Civil War,' and with good reason. We know so much more about it than earlier civil disasters because by the 17th century printing was a mass industry (this, incidentally, probably means we grossly underestimate the burden of human misery in earlier conflicts on English soil).

In the bloody and bitter struggle between Parliament and Crown it is reckoned that some 6% of the population of the country died. Proportionally, this is a comfortably higher national mortality rate than for the First World War: that's how bad this tearing apart of the nation was.

The vast majority of things written about the English Civil War is on political and military topics: fair enough, this is fascinating and hugely informative of our past. I've noticed that there is now, though, also a lot of interest in the social aspects of the war, hitherto largely neglected. For instance, there is now a civil war pensions project (www.civilwarpetitions.ac.uk/discoveries-of-the-civil-war-petitions-project/).

In brief, what our son Tim discovered in the hot summer of 2022 was a huge defensive structure, a 'bastion', which would be hard to fit into two of the proverbial football pitches laid side by side. Last year we got a real sense of the colossal ditch that surrounded this structure, but this year we got astonishing detail.

When we arrived a lot of the work had already been done, and the three-metre-deep ditch had been excavated in a stepwise progression to its base. Remarkably, if not uniquely,



the ditch was bounded by a walkway and the massive post holes dug to accommodate the timbers which supported this were excavated.



What really struck me was the detail on the side wall of the ditch – you could see the blooming pick marks! All of it was dug by men (and perhaps women) with hand tools, pickaxes and the like! It's thought this was achieved within a few months, fashioning the ditch, wooden superstructure and bastion.

Consider: 17th century Worcestershire was a country which had not lost its medieval clothing. It was a land of small, isolated farms, woodland, heath and common, straggling villages with 'ends': what is known as 'ancient' countryside in a land-historical sense.

The hinterland of the castle must have suffered a colossal haemorrhage of people and resources to build this monumental structure. Fields would have been left untilled or unharvested, huge woods obliterated, and vast areas stripped of turf (stone was no defence against ordnance but a turf wall would stop a cannon ball). Beasts must have been left untended and small family farms nearby abandoned while the country was bled dry to feed the vast army of workers.

The result of all this effort was... well nothing much at all, it seems. History suggests that the castle was surrendered to Parliamentary forces by the royal garrison near the end of the war without a shot being fired on either side. The archaeology thus far seems to back this up. It seems the bastion likely was never used purposefully.

NEWS FROM THE CORVEDALE DIVISION

The Labour Party's large majority in the General Election has changed the face of politics throughout the country and Shropshire is no exception. We now have a Labour member, Julia Buckley, in Shrewsbury, an increased majority for Lib Dem Helen Morgan in North Shropshire and a new Conservative member, Stuart Anderson, succeeding Philip Dunne in the new South Shropshire constituency. Longstanding Conservative member Mark Pritchard retained his seat in the Wrekin whilst Labour's Shaun Davies took the Telford seat.

We wait to see what the new Government has in store for us, particularly in the rural counties. There have been announcements about providing more homes and plans are already emerging to achieve a major increase in housebuilding. We also know that onshore wind turbines, discouraged under the Conservatives, will now be allowed, and from past experience this may be an issue which particularly affects the rural areas.

From a Local Government perspective we will be looking to the new Government to recognise and redress the financial problems affecting councils which are buckling under the strain of caring for our elderly population, supporting children's services, and providing housing for the homeless. Shropshire is not alone in experiencing higher levels of demand for elderly and children's care, but it is a fact that south Shropshire has a higher proportion of over-65s and over-85s than the national average, or its statistical neighbours. Governments to date have failed to rise to the challenge of determining how we pay for our elderly to live comfortable and fulfilling lives with appropriate care. It is a particular concern for our rural elderly who have limited access to transport, have to travel longer distances to medical facilities, often suffer from inadequate housing, poor broadband and, for the local authority, difficulty in recruiting sufficient qualified healthcare workers.

'Levelling up' is a policy which looks likely to be adopted by the new government but to date many rural authorities have been passed over in their applications for government funding for infrastructure projects. This must change. We need to make our case to government with renewed vigour, to impress upon them that vibrant rural economies bring huge benefits to the national economy.

We hope this government will work with rural authorities and business leaders to ensure that our rural areas benefit from investment to enable the growth of economically productive areas, encouraging new enterprises and innovation whilst valuing and investing in existing longstanding businesses such as farming, agritech, and the food and drink industry. The Shropshire Council Administration will work collaboratively with all our county MPs to achieve improvements for Shropshire and see what we can achieve.

Finally, I am sure you will be pleased to know that following public consultation (which attracted over 18,000 responses!) and discussions with our contractors, Veolia, Shropshire Council has decided that none of the county's Household Recycling Centres should be closed permanently. However,

they will all close one day per week (either Wednesday or Thursday, which are the two slowest days) and a booking system will

be introduced to help reduce queues. The other decision was that those people requiring a green waste bin should be asked to pay £56 per bin per annum to have it collected. This brings Shropshire into line with around 80% of other local authorities

A SPLASH OF LIFE

At this time of year access to water can sometimes become a problem for wildlife. Providing water in our gardens, churchyards or other types of outdoor areas is not only beneficial for the animals themselves but can also enrich our own contact with nature.

Water is crucial for maintaining the health of wildlife. It aids in digestion, regulates body temperature, and helps in the overall metabolic processes of animals. Regular access to clean water can prevent dehydration, reduce stress, and assists the resilience of wildlife to local environmental challenges. And it isn't just for drinking – newts, frogs and toads use water as shelter and breeding grounds. Butterflies gather valuable salts and minerals from slightly muddy water, and birds need water to bathe in and remove parasites.

A simple water source can attract a variety of species - creating a vibrant and lively place.

THREE TIPS FOR PROVIDING WATER:

Keep it Clean:

Regularly clean and refill water dishes to prevent the spread of disease.

Add Variety:

Offer different types of water sources, such as shallow dishes for insects, deeper baths for birds, or sunken sinks for larger animals.

Provide shallow edges to all water sources so anything that falls in can get back out.

Choose the Right Spot:

Find a place away from predators to make wildlife feel secure while drinking. Place water for birds near to a shrub or tree as they like to have a place of safety nearby.

Then sit back and watch what arrives!

A short walk down the lane took us to the flower field - smaller than you might imagine considering it works so hard to provide wedding flowers, host workshops and visits and even some dates for picking your own, what a lovely concept! It was a mass of colour and interest.

Clare Greener and Andrew Henderson, at the beginning of lockdown in 2020, decided to follow a dream to start a flower garden. Both from farming backgrounds, they have a deep appreciation and respect for their environment and welcome the birds and other wildlife to their field, though have some fencing to discourage the rabbits and deer from feasting on the flowers! Hedges have been planted to shelter the site and the last beds are still being worked on for roses and other flowers as their business develops. They use a 'no dig' system and a lot of cardboard and have created an enchanting space in which to wander and admire. Closer to their home are beds brimming with flowers that mice love to feast on and Merlyn, their cat, does a sterling job of protecting specialty tulips and other blooms.

We admired the flowers in such glorious colour and shades and asked many questions as well as making mental notes of what to go home and plant ourselves. I think another visit may be required as I have already forgotten my choices! We finished a lovely visit having tea and delicious homemade cake in a floral marquee which warmed us all up nicely. Earlier, in June, our Big Green Book Swap stall was set up in the grounds of The Ludlow Farm Shop where a number of members encouraged passers-by to come over and see the secondhand books

available to take away. The tables were filled with many books of all kinds, donated by branch members and friends, to pass on or give away to the passers-by for either a small donation, or in some cases for nothing at all, which, I must say, all the passing kids loved! By the end of this event, we had raised a significant amount of donations to give to our nominated local charity, *Hands Together*, in Ludlow. We were delighted to have taken part in a national festival of fun, where the focus was on doing something 'green' for the good of everyone, but we were also able to give some financial assistance to a local charity – just what the WI is all about!

Once all branch business had been concluded we welcomed our speaker for the evening, Claire Tatler, along with husband Phil, to give us her talk on gardening in historic places and to explain her own learning and later experiences as a professional gardener working in a number of stately homes. Claire started becoming interested in gardening when she had an allotment of her own while working as a Social Worker. She loved the idea of gardening so much she decided to become a volunteer at the National Trust's Attingham Park, long before its current kitchen garden was developed. There she learned about the Women's Farm Gardeners' Association which eventually became WRAGS, the Women Returners to Amenity Gardening Scheme, and took the opportunity to train with them. After she completed her training, Claire got the job to become a trainee gardener at Combermere Abbey in Whitchurch with its 1500 acres - a lucky and incredibly happy first role. Her career there lasted over seven years, moving from Trainee Gardener to Assistant Head Gardener where she met and worked with husband Phil, Head Gardener. She then became Head Gardener in two roles, one for the National Trust and another at Elton Hall, near Ludlow, but in Elton Hall she was a sole gardener, meaning she worked with the family living there to help develop a garden that had been overlooked for many years: a completely different role to all her other roles. Throughout her presentation, Claire told us about the work she undertook in each role, explaining how many of the tasks that professional gardeners do behind the scenes are a little bit different to the tasks we do in our own gardens! A fascinating, highly recommended talk.

Our next meeting will be held on **Thursday 12th September** at 7:30pm with a talk and demonstration of Basketry by Sophie Francis. Meetings are held at *Stanton Lacy Village Hall, Hayton's Bent, SY8 2AT*.



CULMINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

DRAFT MINUTES OF THE ORDINARY MEETING HELD ON 2ND JULY 2024

Members: Councillors Mr M Seabrook (Chair), Mr A Pike (Vice Chair), Mr Ian Alderson, Mrs M Holland and Mr I Steele.

In Attendance: Cllr Cecilia Motley (Shropshire Council) and H Coonick (Clerk/RFO).

Apologies: Cllrs Mrs C Byng, Ms J Mear and Mr J Turley. **Declarations of Interest relating to this meeting:** None.

Public Involvement Session: A member of the public wished to make comment on the planning application relating to 6 The Laundry. He was concerned that the property, which already had a garage, was applying to build a second garage with a ground floor of 54m2 and an upper storey. In his view it would be unnecessarily large. The property already has a cesspit and he was concerned that a sewage treatment system included in these plans would be for a garage. He felt this was a 'back door' way of building a house in an area where house building is very restricted.

Minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 4th June 2024 were approved and signed as a correct record of the meeting.

Reports: Shropshire Council - Cllr Motley reported that once the General Election was over the council would be dealing with the same issues as before. She would like to get the Chairs and Clerks for the Corvedale together in September to look at the future of rural areas. She had received a letter of complaint from the Holiday Property Bond at Norton regarding the poor state of footpaths in the area and would respond to them. There were issues with footpaths in the area of Norton Camp which might be insurmountable. Cllr Pike would review the paths with Mr Jeff Williams as part of the P3 group.

Village Hall Committee - Cllr Mear reported that there would be a busy few months ahead. The D-Day celebrations had been very well supported and she thanked Mr Peter Lines and Mr Mark Griffiths for their restoration of the beacon. There was a new yoga class starting on 3rd July at 6pm. The team was busy marketing the hall and fundraising for the new extension.

Highways: The new Vehicle Activated Sign at the northern end of the village was due to be installed at the end of July.

As Seifton Brook would not be desilted this year the application would be made in May next year aiming at the three-year licence beginning on 1st July 2025.

The highways engineer did not consider that clearing the ditch would improve the issue of standing water on Seifton Lane.

A site history report on the manhole cover and damaged road

surface on Seifton Lane had been reviewed by Councillors. The Highways Engineer would be asked to check if the drain leading away from the manhole was blocked. The repair was in Shropshire Council's plan of work for this financial year.

Due to financial pressures Shropshire Council had cut the Environmental Maintenance Grant to all Parish and Town Councils by 50% this financial year. This would not impact Environmental Maintenance for this year but would in the following financial year. It was agreed to ask Cllr Motley to inform Shropshire Council that Culmington Parish Council would like to see the full grant reinstated in the next financial year.

Planning: 24/02100/FUL: 6 The Laundry, Seifton, SY8 2DH. Erection of 3 bay garage with office/storage above, installation of new treatment plant, new discharge pipe to connect to ditch on agricultural land. Applicant: Mrs Jeanette Price.

It was agreed to object on the following grounds: a. access to the site b. need for an additional garage c. excessive size for a garage for the size of property d. need for a sewage treatment plant for a garage e. outflow from the sewage treatment plant f. tree preservation orders in place g. no plan for rerouting footpath during works.

Emergency Officer: This was deferred to the next meeting.

Empty Housing Association Property: Connexus had not yet decided whether to refurbish or sell the property. The Council's view that it favoured retaining it as a rental property had been recorded by Connexus.

Blocked Bridleway: Shropshire Council was working with the landowner to clear the blockage on both the bridleway and footpath.

Finance: Cllrs Pike, Alderson, Mear, Watts and Turley would remain as signatories for cheques (two signatories required) and Cllrs Pike, Alderson, Mear, and H Coonick (Clerk) for online bank (three signatories required).

As of the 10th June 2024 the Bank Accounts held £13,163.50 with income of £8,274.32 and Expenditure of £4,924.73 (which includes the vehicle activated sign).

Cllrs Holland and Seabrook signed the bank reconciliation as correct.

Payments were authorised to: H Coonick (reimburse for domain and software) £35.37, D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) £8.00.

Items for the Parish Council Meeting on Tuesday 3rd September 2024: a. emergency officer b. update on the blocked bridleway.

DRAFT MINUTES OF MUNSLOW PARISH COUNCIL MEEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 3RD JULY 2024

Present: Cllrs Barbara Archer (Chair), Nigel Dobson and Graham Williams. In attendance: H Coonick (Clerk/RFO).

Apologies for Absence: Cllrs Val Fotheringham, David Marston, Chris Meeson and Ed Povey; Cllr Cecilia Motley (Shropshire Council).

Declarations of Interest: None.

Public Forum: No members of the public were in attendance.

Minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 6th June 2024 were approved and signed by the Chair.

Changing the date of Meetings: It was agreed to permanently change the day of meetings to the first Wednesday in the month, with no meetings in August or January.

Co-option of New Councillors: Mr Richard Wilks was co-opted. There was still one vacancy for a councillor.

Reports: Chair's Report - Cllr Archer reported that there would be

a South Shropshire Area Committee meeting the following week, which she would attend and report on at the September Parish Council meeting.

Shropshire Council - Cllr Motley had sent her apologies.

Highways: The two mobile and one static vehicle activated signs were working well. Operation SNAP was leading to prosecutions for traffic related offences in the parish. It was agreed to purchase two new vehicle activated signs at a total of £4,400 plus VAT which would be funded jointly by the Council's precept and the West Mercia Police and Crime Commissioner grant.

Environmental Maintenance Grant: This had been reduced by 50% due to budget cuts. This would be accepted but the Clerk would write to Shropshire Council complaining about the reduction.

The Environmental Maintenance Contractor would concentrate on cutting back verges on corners but was not allowed to work on the B4368, which was the responsibility of Shropshire Council. Members of the public can report issue on the B4368 to Shropshire Council via 'Fix My Street' on the internet.

Finance: The new Financial Regulations were adopted.

As at 18th June 2024 the expenditure was £1,490.52 and income

was £8,820.24. The budget was satisfactory.

As at 13th May 2024 the bank account held £18,391.40. This was agreed and Cllr Williams would sign the bank reconciliation as correct.

It was agreed that Cllrs Archer, Povey and Dobson would be signatories. Cllrs Archer and Povey were also online banking signatories.

Payments were authorised to: H Coonick (Clerk) reimbursement for software (shared cost with three other parishes) £16.65, D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) inv 534 £72.00.

DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL

SUMMARY OF THE DRAFT MINUTES OF DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL'S MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 26TH JUNE 2024 AT WESTHOPE VILLAGE HALL

Present: Cllr D Hedgley - Chairman, Cllrs S Povall, R Morgan, T Pardoe, A Watson, A Rattu, T O'Boyle.

Apologies: Cllrs R Povall and C Martyn.

In attendance: The Clerk, Shropshire Councillor C Motley and five members of the public.

No Declarations of Interest were made.

Minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting, which was then followed by a Parish Council meeting on 22nd May 2024, were approved by councillors and four Matters Arising were considered.

Reports: The Chairman reported that the owner of Jack's Cottage, Bache Mill, told him that, with the agreement of some neighbours, he was hoping to convert an unused area to create a car parking space. This would involve digging out a bank. He was seeking planning permission. There had been problems in Bouldon with the intermittent failure of Broadband, which he had taken up with the Broadband providers. He had represented the parish council at Sally Woodhouse's funeral.

Shropshire Councillor Motley advised that following legal advice she was unable to provide a report on SC's activities due to the imminent General Election. Much work at SC and all committee meetings had been postponed and would result in massive re-scheduling after the 5th July.

Broadband Report: Cllr Rattu advised that VONEOS had taken over from SWS and had been awarded the government funding contract to deliver the Project Gigabit Broadband to South Shropshire, including the hard to reach places such as Westhope and Middlehope. They had carried out mapping and had access to funding. The voucher scheme had been withdrawn. Their funding included new antennas where necessary. Mr Brooks said he had tried and tried to contact VONEOS about his connection, but they never respond. All communication had to be conducted through a webchat, to which they never respond, and it was impossible to contact them direct. Cllr. Motley suggested DPC should talk with neighbouring parish councillors to see if their parishioners had had the same issues and take the matter up collectively with VONEOS. The Council could invite VONEOS to a future meeting to explain how they intended to spend the government funding in the Corvedale parishes.

Westhope Village Hall Report: Mrs Worthington thanked all who had contributed to the success of the recent centenary celebration, attended by around 90 people. A carved stone plaque commemorating the centenary would soon be installed. Bookings for community and fundraising events were good, although hampered in June due to the road works. Work on the flooring was the next priority.

Diddlebury Village Hall Report: Cllr S Povall advised that as the DVH committee meetings were held during his working hours he was unable to attend them, but he could report that the pizza evening had been very successful and the committee was discussing the possibility of an EV charging point. The Chairman noted it was good to see that both village halls were thriving and being well supported by the community.

Planning Applications:

24/01809/OUT – an outline application for the erection of a single dwelling and garage (to include access) on land adjacent to The Sun Inn, Corfton.

As DPC had passed a Resolution on 23rd January 2019 that it would not support any further open market housing development in Corfton, it was unable to support this application.

24/02102/TCA – An application for tree works, as per a schedule, within the Diddlebury Conservation Area, at The Old Vicarage, Diddlebury. As none of the trees were subject to TPO's, DPC supported the application.

24/01977/FUL – an application for change of use, from ancillary annexe to open market rental accommodation, at Lydehole Farm, Mulberry Lane. Upper Hayton, Ludlow. DPC supported this application.

24/02080/FUL – an application for the development of 10 shepherd's huts for wedding accommodation, in the Walled Garden, Delbury Hall, Diddlebury. DPC supported this application.

Highways/Environmental Issues: Mrs Worthington asked if the road repairs in Westhope, which currently terminate at the college, would continue up towards Burwood. Residents of Hillside Coppice, the development of which contributed a large amount of CIL money to SC, were dismayed at the state of the road between the college and Hillside Coppice. DPC would make enquiries of Highways.

Clir Watson Congratulated SC: She had called one morning about a dangerous tree on the Bache Mill side of the B4368, and by lunch time they had felled and removed the tree. The contractors were submitting a report on other trees which they considered needed felling.

Communications and Correspondence: Nine items were considered and responded to as necessary. The response from Connexus about the empty houses in Mill Lane was considered to be wholly inadequate and they would again be asked to attend a meeting to explain the long delay in refurbishing and re-letting these houses.

Public Access Playground: The Chairman reported that the fencing had been completed and the laying of the rubber mulch surface would commence on 15th July. Complaints had been received about the siting of the new picnic bench. Cllr Pardoe said he had had to site it there as it was the only level space. When the rubber mulch had been laid he would move the bench away from the trees/ birds.

Finance Matters: The Finance Report for June 2024 was considered and cheques totalling £594.06 were approved for payment, after which DPC held funds totalling £33,221.15, of which third party funds comprised £928.46. Cllr O'Boyle verified the reconciliation between DPC's cash book and HSBC's bank statement.

The new set of Financial Regulations was considered by councillors, approved and adopted.

Any Other Business: No matters were raised.

The next Parish Council meeting would be on Wednesday 24th July, 7.15pm at Diddlebury Village Hall.

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


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
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
