



# **CHURCH NEWS**

### LETTER FROM THE RECTORY

By the time you get to read this, Advent will be almost upon us. Advent Sunday, which this year falls on 3rd December, marks the beginning of the new church year. The weeks that follow form the season of Advent, which this year is the shortest it can be because Christmas Day falls on a Monday. The season of Advent tends to get lost in the rush to prepare for Christmas, but it is a time of year in which we aim to prepare ourselves spiritually for the coming of Christ, thinking not only about the annual celebration of his birth, but also about his second coming and the Day of Judgment. In mediaeval times many churches had a Doom Painting. It showed Christ sitting in judgement whilst the blessed were led by angels to heaven and the damned were led by demons towards a monster and the flames of hell. We might see that as an attempt to frighten people into following the rules, but it can also prompt us to wonder about what Christ would think of the way we live if he were to return to earth now. Advent is a time in which we can reflect on that and on how we might adjust our lives so that we are ready to greet Christ when he comes. If it helps you to take time out from the daily rush which is life today, there will, as usual, be services of Compline on Wednesday evenings at 7:30pm.

We will prepare for Christmas in a different way at the Christmas Tree Festival on Monday 18th and Tuesday 19th December in Diddlebury Church: do join us for an enjoyable Christmas event and a chance to see the church beautifully decorated. Details of the Christmas services are elsewhere in the magazine and you are welcome to join us at any of them.

January brings us to the Sundays after Epiphany when we think about Jesus being revealed to the world – an ongoing task and one in which, as the church, we share. You are welcome to come and join in that task with us.

When we get there, I wish you a very Happy Christmas.

Barbara, who took the meeting in Loraine's absence, introduced Bev Harris who lives locally and is a retired teacher of Forensic Psychology. Bev talked about the factors that affect the accuracy of eyewitness testimony. She explained how our perception of what we see can change depending on our experience, expectations, and beliefs and how this in turn can influence our recall of events, leading to inaccuracies. Bev talked about the importance of investigating and understanding the accuracy of eyewitness testimony, as misidentification of suspects can lead to wrongful convictions. We were told of the work of 'Innocence Project', an American organisation which works to exonerate those in the USA who have been convicted of crimes that they did not commit, frequently due to eyewitness misidentification. Bev talked about how research has informed the legal justice system and its processes so that police questioning techniques and practices can obtain more accurate information. Finally, we learned that, despite popular beliefs held in the past, children can give accurate accounts of their experiences. Bev's interesting talk led to many questions which she was happy to answer. She was warmly thanked by Val.

The monthly raffle tea, coffee, and cake, provided and served by Christine and Sheila, rounded off a very pleasant afternoon. We meet on the 2nd Wednesday of every month and are always happy to welcome visitors as well as new members.

# SIGNIFICANT ACHIEVEMENTS

While readers who are seasoned church crawlers will doubtless be familiar with hatchments, those lozenge-shaped heraldic paintings which may still be seen in a reasonable number of churches, I suspect that many readers will have little knowledge of what they represent, and how they were used. To understand their origins, we must first go back to medieval times.

When a person was granted ('achieved') a coat of arms, these 'achievements of arms' would, at his death, often have been displayed in the church and in his house before and during the funeral. Sometimes replica armour and heraldic garments would be displayed permanently in the church afterwards. The earliest known example of this is the achievement of Edward the Black Prince (1376) in Canterbury Cathedral. A few examples of funeral helmets survive around the country, of interest to antiquarians and, unfortunately, to thieves. By the early seventeenth century the display of actual or replica armour was gradually replaced by painted 'achievements' commonly known as 'hatchments'. The custom of displaying these heraldic lozenges probably originated in the Low Countries, where many may still be seen in both Catholic and Protestant churches. Seventeenth century Dutch paintings of church interiors generally show numbers of hatchments adorning walls and pillars. It is interesting to note that one of the earliest examples in this country is to be found in Old St Chad's, Shrewsbury, dating from 1623. The golden age of hatchments lasted from 1700 to 1850, after which the number erected declined rapidly. Nonetheless, over a hundred were put up in the last century, and one was placed in the church at The Snead, near Bishop's Castle in the last twenty years.

A number of customs quickly developed around the use of hatchments, which played an important role in the process of mourning. The hatchment would be placed outside the deceased person's house and remain displayed for a month after the funeral. It was then normal for it to be placed in the church, where it would remain until it decayed or was ejected by an unsympathetic vicar. On occasions they went instead to the house of the deceased, where some may still be seen. While there are still many churches with hatchments, they are generally a fraction of the number which were originally to be seen. There are now three examples surviving in the six churches of the Corvedale Group, one in Culmington

and two in Diddlebury, which will be discussed below. However, a drawing made by the Rev. Edward Williams in 1791 shows that there were six in Munslow church at that time, and another watercolour made some sixty years later shows three above the east window of the north aisle.

It is highly unlikely that many readers will have seen the two examples in Diddlebury, as until earlier this year they were largely concealed by the organ in the vestry. The Cornewall family lived at Delbury Hall from 1742 until 1845 and took

over the family chapel which had been erected in 1609 by the Baldwyns, previous owners of the estate. Here the family attended church in some state, with their own fireplace and other creature comforts! The family monuments and hatchments were placed in the chapel, while the bodies were interred in the adjacent railed enclosure in the churchyard. The two hatchments commemorate Bishop Folliot Herbert Walker Cornewall, successively Bishop of Bristol, Hereford and Worcester, who died in 1831, and his son Frederick Hamilton Cornewall whose death occurred in 1845. That of Bishop Cornewall is the only example of an episcopal hatchment in the county, and something of a rarity. The arms of the Diocese of Worcester (ten red medallions) are shown on the left, with the arms of the Cornewall and Herbert families on the other half of the shield. His son's arms are the same those of his father, without, of course those of the diocese.

In January, following last year's five-yearly inspection by the church architect, the hatchments were taken down for examination by Annabelle Monaghan, who previously restored the Royal Arms. Unfortunately, she found considerable damage, which is why I am currently approaching a number of grant-awarding bodies to see if they could contribute to the total cost of nearly £10,000 which is needed to conserve and repair them. However several of the trusts which I am approaching would like to see evidence of some money raised by the parish, and if any readers would like to make a contribution to the restoration, our treasurer, Liz Jones, the Vicar or I would be very pleased to receive it.

Provided that sufficient funds can be raised, these two hatchments will be repaired and conserved, and then placed on the west wall of the church where the Royal Arms hung before it was re-sited. They will then be visible to all and add a touch of colour to this part of the church.

In our next issue I hope to say something about the history of the Cornewalls and how their time at Delbury Hall came to an end.

### **ST NICHOLAS**



This is the last month of the year and we are very certain it is winter. The shortest day is just three weeks away and the weather is promising to misbehave, too. But Christmas is coming and that is exciting (although sometimes exhausting!).

So here is some stuff to keep you positive between now and the big day. Father Christmas is a big player at Christmas. He is known more widely in the world as Santa Claus – St Nicholas. Facts are what we need next.

Originally 'Santa' was a Bishop in fourth century Myra (now Delme, in Turkey), who made a significant mark on the world of that time. By the sixth century, churches all over Europe were being dedicated to him. From the ninth century in the East, and the eleventh in the West, he was the pin-up boy of saints. He is the Patron Saint of sailors, children, archers, merchants, brewers, pawnbrokers, and repentant thieves, not to mention unmarried people and students dotted all around Europe! And his piety and generosity were unbounded. The legendary story of his help to the merchant who had three daughters and no money for their dowries is still told in many parts of the world. A bag of gold coins came flying through the window, not once but three times as the merchant married them off with the apparent approval of good old Santa! Do you now understand why bags of chocolate money are part

of Christmas? Traditionally they should be handed out (but secretly) on 6th December, the feast day of St Nicholas.

St Nicholas, as patron saint of children, has become Father Christmas. In America he became Santa Claus which is derived from the early Dutch pilgrims to that then New World who called him 'Sinte Klaas'. The new name instantly included the Spanish speaking children.

St Nicholas is quite extraordinary. It is accepted that he was a real person and he was known to have visited the Holy Land when Bishop of Myra. While there he is believed to have stayed in the crypt in Bethlehem where the birth of Jesus took place. The spot is still marked by a large old church dedicated to – yes, you guessed it – St Nicholas.

The rest of his 'life' appears to be legend, embroidered over centuries from his existence in Myra in the fourth century to nineteenth century America. But never mind, it's a story we all love and have enjoyed its secrets over time in maintaining this amazing persona. And what child is not going to enjoy that moment on Christmas Day when they wake to find that Santa has delivered!

# **CORVEDALE GARDEN GROUP** \*

### IN THE BLEAK MIDWINTER - A TALK BY PIP SMITH

In a last-minute change from our advertised speaker, Tamsin Westhorpe, (who will speak on a future occasion), Pip Smith kindly agreed to speak at short notice. Pip is a landscape designer based in Droitwich, who gives regular talks to garden groups and has had exceptionally good reviews www.pipsmith.co.uk

Although Saturday was a beautiful autumnal day, the weather since has reminded us that winter is close. Pip started by encouraging us to go out and really look at and enjoy our gardens across the winter months and to take photographs using the low winter sun to best effect. He then showed a series of beautiful photographs celebrating the benefits of thoughtful planting for this time of year and very kindly provided everyone with a detailed planting list. Pip had worked for several years as head gardener at Wollerton Old Hall near Market Drayton. He showed photographs from there, from RHS Wisley, Bodnant, Cambridge Botanic Gardens, Trentham gardens and gardens belonging to his clients. We came away feeling inspired.

He talked about the importance of choosing plants for structure, colour contrast, texture, and scent. He encouraged us to think about layers of trees, shrubs, perennials, grasses, bulbs, and annuals and to use these to create eyelines and vistas through the garden to draw the eye to the winter features we want to highlight. These might include a paved path, door, gate, window, building, fountain, or sculptures. Water features could add reflections which would create depth or sparkle. Using trees with distinctive bark and late season leaf colour, fastígiate or columnar trees and trees which can be clipped into topiary balls, columns or pyramids will provide the first level of interest. He suggested we consider a variety of conifers and deciduous trees with spectacular bark including Acer griseum (paperbark maple), Prunus cerrula (Tibetan cherry), Betula Jackmontii or Betula Trinity College (Silver birch) and Myrtus communis (Myrtle). In a bigger garden, using hedging of different heights also creates formal structures such as garden rooms. Winter frost looks spectacular on the leaves of Taxus baccata (Yew), Fagus sylvatica (Beech) and Carpinus betulus (Hornbeam). These can be clipped into formal and fanciful shapes.

Once the trees and hedging are in place evergreen shrubs will provide a variety of greens as a backdrop at the next level and deciduous shrubs add form and texture, drawing the eye through to the features you want to highlight beyond this. He also suggested using perennials with woody stems which would not collapse in frost, e.g., Phlomis russeliana, and those with seed heads, e.g., Dipsacus fullonum (Teasel) and Lunaria annua (Honesty), which can provide structure until spring and allow both birds and insects to overwinter. The Cornus family too offers beautiful stem colour of blacks, emerald greens, oranges, yellows, and reds to complement the greens or the white branching stems of the bramble Rubus cockburniensis. Interspersing these with waving grasses adds both texture and depth. They too look spectacular in the frost, e.g., Miscanthus sinensis and Anemanthele lessoniana (pheasant grass).

Although gardens are not at their most colourful in winter, creating colour contrasts which are enhanced by winter

sunshine could be part of our planting. Pip encouraged us to consider not only winter clematis, honeysuckles, hellebores, and a variety of bulbs but also evergreens with berries, e.g., Hedera helix (Ivy), Sarcococca confusa (Winter box), Skimmia japonica 'Reevesisna' or 'Kew green.' Later in the season, moving into spring, the Hamamelis family offer a variety of colours ranging from traditional yellows and oranges to deep red, e.g., Hamamelis 'Diane,' 'Harry' and 'Ripe Corn.' Although many of his clients request he does not use yellow plants, Pip felt that, in winter and early spring, bright yellows were a mood lifter. Narcissus (daffodils) are the obvious example, but eye-catching yellows would include Mahonia 'Winter sun' and Edgeworthia grandiflora. Where specific plants or trees provide specific interest, consider purchasing good garden lighting.

Scented plants on arches, at doorways and alongside pathways add a further dimension to the garden: plant Daphne 'Jacqueline Postill' against a sheltered wall, Jasmine nudiflorum (winter jasmine) over an arch with Lonicera fragrantissima (winter honeysuckle), Sarcococca hookeriana or Sarcococca confusa along path edges.

We digested the talk and some of the forty-two members attending asked interesting questions after we had stood in silence to mark Armistice Day. We then had delicious refreshments and time to chat as we bought raffle tickets. I would like to thank everyone who attended, with special thanks to those who set up chairs and tables, made cakes, served refreshments, donated raffle prizes, and sold the raffle tickets. The morning felt a good end to the Garden Group year.

# DIDDLEBURY FLOOD ACTION GROUP

### STORM BABET SUMMARY


Friday 20th October 2023, Storm Babet, saw a busy day in Diddlebury Parish. It rained 'cats and dogs' causing our rivers and tributaries across the parish to rise rapidly. Unfortunately, once again, a number of properties suffered flooding inside their homes. Known incidents of internal flooding occurred in Bache Mill - 3 properties, Diddlebury - 2 properties, Bouldon - 2 properties. There were possibly other unreported incidents. Many gardens suffered in the floodwaters, with bridges being destroyed and many garden plants lost.

The roads were flooded at the bridges on the Corve, the B4368 and at the bottom of Mill Lane, causing travel around the parish to be disrupted.

Many volunteers helped neighbours in trouble, particularly at the Tally Ho in Bouldon and the B4368 bridge in Diddlebury.

### Did the leaky dams make a difference?

Difficult to say, as there is no monitoring of water levels being held behind the dams. What can be done is compare the water level at the B4368 bridge in Diddlebury during Storm Babet (2023) and Storm Denis (2020).



This shows an initially slower rate of rise in 2023 than that in 2020, although the impression of many was that the water level appeared to rise faster in 2023 and the stream levels seemed higher. The levels then lowered at similar rates after both storms. The maximum level may be a function of the position of the gauge.

# **CORVEDALE BOOK GROUP**

### HOMEGOING BY YAA GYASI Ref: Asantemanmn.org

This is a fascinating family saga with a difference. It is a 2016 debut novel by a Ghanaian American writer who was highly acclaimed for her work. It tells of the nine generations of descendants of Maame, an Asante woman, through the different lives of her two daughters and their subsequent families.

The Asante, a matrilineal society, were part of a 13th century kingdom in central Ghana which became known as the Ashanti Empire of Akan people. The empire further developed across the two hundred years from 1701-1901 to cover Côte d'Ivoire, Gold Coast and Togo. It became wealthy and powerful from the slave trade and the gold trade. As they were successful warriors, the slave trade was very profitable for the Ashanti in Africa and Europe. Their culture was renowned for its amazing gold work, woodcarving, and bright, vibrant textiles. The Asante people speak Tui, which is part of the Kwa group of Niger-Congo languages.

The 'Golden Stool' mentioned in the book is believed to have come down from heaven in the 1700s to become the Asantehene's throne. It is also believed to hold the souls of the nation. The Golden Stool must never touch the ground and can



never be sat upon; new kings are raised and lowered over the stool without touching it. It is now held in the Ashante Royal Palace in Kumasi, Ghana. The people sent their king, Prempah, into exile in the Seychelles in 1896 in preference to losing it to the British. They refused to become a British Protectorate until 1 January 1902. The Gold Coast was incorporated into the British Empire as a British Crown colony in 1821. It became a Dominion of the British Commonwealth on 6 March 1957, achieving independence in 1960 under Kwame Nkrumah who led the country until the 1966 coup. The current Asantehene is Otumfuo, Oseii Tutu 11 who acceded as 16th king in 1999.

Returning to the novel, Maame's two daughters and their families have vastly different lives, but their experiences highlight the impact of both the African and the British slave trades. While Esi is held captive in the dungeons of Cape Coast Castle, unbeknownst to each other, her half sister Effia marries James Collins, the British Governor in Charge. Their son's white blood sets him apart and his descendants carry that difference overtly or covertly over the years. Across the generations the story covers many aspects of the slave trade from kidnaps, abductions and forced marriages, to sea voyages, plantation lives, the Slave Railroad, indentured service as miners, the escape from the north to the south of America, finding work in the jazz age in Harlem, succumbing to drug abuse, protesting about black rights, and becoming part of an educated middle class. The importance of oral history and family heritage which runs through both strands of the novel is held by Akua 'The Crazy Woman' who heard voices but gave her granddaughter love and hope.

We found the book fascinating as it made us consider the history we were taught from a different perspective. The subject matter was not always cheerful, but the characters were engaging, and the thread of resilience ran though the script. The chapters, which could stand alone as short stories, were almost factual rather than descriptive or emotional in their content. Nevertheless, there was a strong emotional reaction to parts of the story. Having a variety of lead characters and voices was an interesting approach. It continued to challenge assumptions and attitudes about power, wealth, class, and racial difference. It is well worth a read.

The book we will be discussing at our meeting on **Thursday** 14th December is 'This is going to Hurt' by Adam Kay, a venture into life as a doctor in the NHS.

# **CORVEDALE PAST & PRESENT**

### A NAUGHTY BOY AND A GENIUS

Charles 'Gas' Darwin was a naughty boy and Shrewsbury-born genius who got things right and got things wrong!

We all know that the chap is best known for sailing around the world and providing us with a new theory called 'Evolution.' okay, he was not the only one worrying at the same ideas at that time, but that is not the only thing we should remember about this Shropshire lad.

Charles had an interesting grandfather who had interesting friends. Erasmus Darwin was part of the 'Lunar Society,' a sort of supper club of scientists and industrialists in the 18th century who, interestingly, met at the time of the full moon. Another member of the circle was Josiah Wedgwood. Charles later married into the wealthy Wedgwood family, becoming a gentleman farmer and having interesting ideas about earthworms!

I suppose most people still believe in evolution, although, strictly speaking, no one should 'believe' any scientific proposal; it should be constantly questioned. The current view, however, is that Charles got the mechanism of evolution completely wrong, due to things he couldn't have known about at the time. This doesn't make him any less a genius, though. He propelled human thought in new directions.

As he came from a well-off middle-class family, Charles went to Shrewsbury School, where he couldn't stand the predominantly classical education. Like his grandfather he wanted to be pushing the bounds of knowledge. He was always courting trouble for doing his own scientific experiments, which presumably was what got him the nickname 'Gas,' though it may have been trouble with flatulence. History does not record!

Charles, and his contemporaries who thought about it, believed that the inheritance of genetic material passed on from our parents was immutable and unchangeable during our lifetimes. Today we are told that our genes are changing all the time to produce vital chemicals for our body. Radically, this is said to be wrought by the great cloud of viruses that inhabit our body and the whole world in unknowable numbers and seem to be striving for maximum diversity in the world (they must get quite depressed when they visit local high streets).

So, what of the humble earthworm? Settling down to family life after his world travels Charles got very interested in these

beasts of the soil. People thought he'd gone slightly dotty, but it seems that he primed a strand of thought that is of immense importance today. He realised that over time worms not only help to produce new soil, but continually burrow and leave casts on the surface.

Perhaps this was the first inkling of why, for instance, Roman structures may be metres below the present-day surface. This was a stimulus to stratigraphy, the study of earth layers, which is very much a tool of modern-day archaeology.

Massively important though they are in soil production, with the movement of organic materials from the surface, aeration, and dynamic hydration of the soil, they do this in conjunction with astonishingly diverse



lifeforms. Meet the Moss Piglet...

Worms are part of a universe of life below our feet of which we know very little. No doubt it's every bit as remarkable as the Attenborough worlds above the ground and in the sea. Certainly, all these worlds seem wholly interdependent.

Earthworms were pretty slow to come to the party. We're told that billions of years ago when the earth was literally boiling hot, some specialist bacteria gobbled up enough carbon dioxide to cool the whole earth in a sort of 'reverse greenhouse' effect. They set about initiating the story of soil. Sadly, over our time on earth humans have not always made a good soil story. The globe is littered with civilisations that thrived on soil fertility but ultimately failed, leaving arid, rocky or desert places. What of the present age?

There is huge number of quotations about how vital soil is from the sages of the ancient world down to the present. Perhaps the most telling is the common derivation of 'human' and 'humus' – soil. Earth, our planet takes its name from 'earth,' the world's protective skin. 'Adam' and 'Eve' are derived from the Hebrew words from soil and life, whilst we have named ourselves 'Homo Sapiens Sapiens.' Man from soil, wisest of the wise?



# DRAFT MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON THURSDAY 2ND NOVEMBER 2023

**Members:** Cllrs Barbara Archer (Chair), Nigel Dobson, Val Fotheringham, Andy Johnson, David Marston and Graham Williams. In Attendance: H Coonick (Clerk/RFO).

**Apologies for Absence:** Cllrs Edward Povey, Antonia Bury, Chris Meeson, and Cllr Cecilia Motley (Shropshire Council).

**Declarations of Interest:** None.

**Public Forum:** No members of the public were in attendance.

**Minutes** of the Parish Council meetings held on 5th October 2023: Cllr Nigel Dobson was added to the list of members in attendance and at item 13.4, last sentence. 'Wild Goose' was added before 'nursery'. Subject to these amendments the minutes were signed by the Chair as a correct record.

**Urgent Items for discussion at the discretion of the Chair:** Cllr Archer wished to thank Cllrs Williams and Meeson for the work they had done in the parish during Storm Babet.

**Reports:** *Cllr Archer (Chair)* reported that she would be attending a service and lay a wreath on behalf of the Parish Council at the War Memorial in Munslow at 11am on 11th November. Aston Munslow Village Shop had raised £14.72 for the defibrillator: this will be used to help maintain the defibrillator in Munslow. She thanked everyone who had made donations.

Cllr Motley (Shropshire Council) has sent an update on the B4368 report. Manpower and financial resources were scarce, with only one engineer covering the south of the county, which mitigates against trying to deal with all the problems at the same time. Given these constraints, Derek Buchanan (Shropshire Council) had proposed that the report be broken down into component parts recognising the different characteristics of the individual parishes. He had suggested that efforts should focus initially on Munslow and Diddlebury, the parishes that had initiated the route study in the first place, and prioritise meetings with them by the end of November/early December. He suggested the following programme for Munslow and Diddlebury: a. Respond to the comments already received with a summary report that covers key issues and constraints raised in the report and the subsequent comments. This response should be finalised and issued by the end of the following week (Friday 10th November) or Monday 13th November at the latest. b. Get a meeting in the diary for end of November/early December which would allow parishes time to review the report and set up a mutually convenient meeting date. This timeline would take into account that Munslow parish council meets early in the month whilst Diddlebury meets on the last Wednesday of

**Cllr Dobson (Beambridge Club Room)** reported that the AGM was on 21st November when ideas for future events would be welcome. The coffee mornings were starting again. £650 was raised at the Millichope Open Garden teas and coffees stall

which would go partly to the Club Room and partly to the Henry Angell-James Memorial Trust which donated the defibrillator.

**Highways:** A joint meeting with Shropshire Council and representatives from Diddlebury Parish Council was agreed to discuss the B4368 Report from Shropshire Council. The Clerk would inform Derek Buchanan and ask that they also involve the police in the proposed meeting.

**Vehicle Activated Signs:** The Aston Munslow (western entrance) vehicle activated sign (VAS) owned by Shropshire Council had now been replaced and was working. The mobile VAS sign reported that 85% of vehicles are passing at below 32mph whilst the sign was in Munslow.

**Review of Environmental Maintenance and New Tasks:** The drains on the B4368 in Hungerford and Broadstone needed jetting. The Clerk would report this to Shropshire Council.

**Planning:** Members agreed to support the following applications: **23/03773/FUL** - Erection of part single storey/ two storey extension to rear and single storey extension to side (resubmission) and change of use of land to domestic curtilage. Brook House, Munslow, SY7 9EZ. **23/03977/FUL** - Erection of flat roof single storey rear extension. Dale View, Aston Munslow, SY7 9ER. **23/04210/FUL** Installation of free-standing greenhouse to south-east The Racehouse Aston Munslow SY7 9EN. **23/04175/LBC** Alterations to remove existing window and replace with new french doors, blocking up of an existing external door opening to allow a small kitchen area to be formed in place of existing utility room affecting a Grade II Listed Building The Swan Inn Aston Munslow SY7 9ER.**23/03969/FUL** Installation of new entrance steps, platform lift and cellar access Aston Hall Aston Munslow SY7 9ER.

**Update on the Washwell:** The minutes of meetings in 2006 were reviewed and it was agreed a. to write to English Heritage to establish why the Washwell had not been listed and b. to apply to the Land Registry to request a change to the entry for the Washwell to return it to public land.

**Update on the Website:** The website will remain free until April 2024.

**Finance:** The draft budget was reviewed. Maintenance of the three vehicle activated signs owned by the Parish Council should be added to the budget. ### **DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL**

SUMMARY OF THE DRAFT MINUTES OF DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL'S MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 25TH OCTOBER 2023 AT DIDDLEBURY VILLAGE HALL

**Present:** Cllr D Hedgley - Chairman, Cllrs A Watson, S Povall, A Rattu, C Martyn, R Povall, T O'Boyle.

**Apologies:** Clirs T Pardoe and R Morgan.

**In attendance:** The Clerk, Unitary Cllr C Motley and four members of the public.

### No Declarations of Interest were made.

**Public Involvement Session:** Mr J Farley and Mrs J Vine, on behalf of the Corvedale Walking and Footpaths Committee, asked DPC to assist them by holding the CWFCs funds in a ring-fenced third-party funding arrangement as they are having banking difficulties. DPC agreed to provide this assistance.

**Minutes** of the Parish Council Meeting held on 27th September 2023 were approved by councillors. Matters Arising included the Chairman's report on SC's Emergency

Planning meetings and the lack of a response from the Craven Arms sorting office to DPC's request for an explanation of the poor standard of service of mail deliveries and collections.

**Reports:** The Chairman said he had attended Chris Jackson's funeral. He reported on his continuing work on a display to be sited alongside the war memorial and brought draft copies of the documents for councillors to peruse. He was meeting the Headmaster and Governors of the school the following day and would raise the playground proposal with them. He had helped the Tally Ho pub and other properties on 20th October when Bouldon had been inundated with flood water.

**Clir Motley** reported on the outcome of the Constituency Boundaries Review. It would not affect the Corvedale Parish boundaries other than that Cardington would become a Corvedale parish. The review of parish boundaries could now proceed and any proposals should be submitted to her in writing. She and the Chairman had met on the 22nd October to review the flood damage caused by the 20th October floods. She congratulated Cllr Rattu on his heroic efforts, over many hours in driving rain, to clear the drains on the bridge on the B4368. His efforts, and those of other volunteers, kept traffic safe and prevented houses in The Moors from being flooded. Councillors added their appreciation of Cllr Rattu's efforts and of the other members of DPC and the community who had given assistance during the floods.

**Flood Action Group Report:** Cllr Martyn reported at length on the floods of 20th October. The Tally Ho, which had never before been flooded, was inundated with water as were six other houses and a farm in Diddlebury parish. He was preparing a comprehensive report on the flooding for discussion at the January meeting of the National Flood Forum. He would also produce a list of what resources were available within the parish which residents could draw on in the event of future floods, such as stocks of sandbags etc. and details of what steps householders could take to protect their properties. He was unable to say how well the leaky dams had worked as there was no way to capture data from them.

**Westhope Village Hall.** Mrs Kath Worthington reported that the recent Macmillan coffee morning had raised a significant sum of money. The Harvest Festival supper had been attended by 48 people. A full programme of skittles, bingo and whilst drives is scheduled this winter to help raise funds for the ongoing refurbishment of the hall.

**Diddlebury Village Hall**. Cllr S Povall reported that luckily the hall has escaped any flood damage. The Harvest Festival

supper was well attended and a curry night is scheduled for the 17th November

**Planning Applications: 23/04417/OUT** - an outline application for the erection of three affordable homes and associated drainage works and access on land adjacent to the car park at Westhope College, Westhope was considered by the councillors and the application was supported by them.

**Highways/Environmental Issues:** The effects of the flooding in October had been considered elsewhere. The continuing problems of speeding drivers and non-residents utilizing scarce parking places at The Moors/Moors View were further discussed. The proposed Bouldon highways operations and works to remedy the collapsing bank and water mains problem had been discussed by the Chairman, and Mr Keyland of Highways at a site meeting. Mr Keyland's proposed works were scheduled to start in the spring, since when the October floods have intervened, making the situation far worse and more expensive to remedy.

A complaint about a pothole in Bache Mill, which damaged two tyres on a resident's vehicle, was discussed. It has long been the subject of reports to Highways.

**Communications and Correspondence:** Thirteen items of correspondence were considered and dealt with as necessary.

**Parish Boundaries Review:** Cllr R Povall had met with Culmington Parish representatives. The only issue between the parishes is the fact that Seifton is partly in Culmington and partly in Diddlebury, which have different planning designations. It was felt the matter could be sorted out with the Planning Department rather than via a boundary change.

**Finance Report:** The Finance Report for October 2023 was considered. Cheques totalling £641.15 were approved after payment of which DPC held the sum of £24,236.74. The HSBC bank statement had not been provided by the bank, so the cash book/bank statement reconciliation could not take place. The Clerk enquired whether new funds were being sought in the 2024/2025 Precept, as she was drafting a preliminary budget for consideration in at the November meeting. £4,000 worth of items were discussed.

The next meeting is on Wednesday 22nd November 7.30pm at Diddlebury Village Hall.

**Minutes** of the meeting held on 11 May 2023 were read by Chair and unanimously agreed as being correct.

**Finance:** The balance as at 4th October 2023 was £10,403.44. There had been many hirings of the marquee and £5,036.21

came from the Neighbourhood Fund payment.

Brown Clee Medical Practice: Cllr Lewis gave an update: there are two groups: PPG (Patient Participation Group) and the Brown Clee Medical Practice Community Group. The main issue for the surgery is finding a buyer for the building. The Parish Council had received a request for seed funding of £100-£150 to start a bid to purchase the building. This was discussed and Cllr Hartley proposed waiting for more clarification on plans and the appointment of a new doctor. This was agreed unanimously. A member of the public asked whether there is government guidance for these situations: Cllr Motley responded that there was but this it was changeable.

**Highways:** Powkesmore potholes needed urgent action. The patching of the top road was inadequate and it needed to be done again. A member of the public had reported that the

drains by Abdon Church were blocked so water was running down to Upper House. Drains on Osley bank were blocked and causing damage to the surface. Earnstrey Hill House had a blocked drain. There was a blocked drain at the bottom of Masseys Bank. Cllr Yarwood said a mini-digger was required to clear culverts and improve ditches. The Neighbourhood fund could be used. The Highway Maintenance Grant was confirmed for another year. It was agreed that the Clerk would get digger quotes. The Clerk would chase Shropshire Council for drain clearance as they will need the machine.

Cllr Motley reported that Shropshire Council needed to make savings. Andy Wilde of Highways was moving to use local contractors and this had resulted in savings. The bypass extension around Shrewsbury had been funded by the Government. The Riverside regeneration plans had been achieved via the Levelling Up fund. The Demand Responsive Transport route was being trialled around Shrewsbury.

Place Plan: There was nothing to report. The funding priorities

for this could be updated at any time so no changes would be requested at the moment.

**Correspondence:** A request for a change of the footpath route around Earnstrey Hall had been received. The consultation deadline expired on 7 December. Cllr Hartley had met with the applicant and agreed with the proposals on his land. Cllr Hartley proposed support: this was unanimously agreed. A Healthwatch survey for diabetes services would be on the website. The planning officer had recommended refusal of an application in Clee St Margaret for an affordable home. This was discussed and it was agreed unanimously that the Clerk would draft a response in support of the application for Councillors' approval.
