

Edge Chamber Choir Concert - Sunday 18th September, 3.00pm, Diddlebury Church

Edge is delighted to have been asked to be part of the inaugural Corvedale Festival. We have planned a concert full of the most amazingly beautiful music for you, but as this music is not well known I thought I would write a few words about it.



Two of the works in the programme are written for choir and soprano saxophone, the highest member of the saxophone family - it makes the most haunting and stunningly beautiful sound. It will be played by Alison Dodd who is a local saxophonist and music teacher. The works are **Nunc Dimittis** by Christian Forshaw, Professor of Saxophone at the Guildhall, and **Son of God Mass** by James Whitbourn. The music for the mass was originally written as background music for a BBC 2 documentary series, 'Son of God', which chronicled the life of Jesus using scientific and contemporary historical evidence, which some of you may remember watching. James Whitbourn later added the words of the mass to it, and I took part in its premiere in Sevenoaks, Kent, quite a long time ago! I loved it then and I love it now and I am sure you will too.

Alongside these pieces, there will be a variety of short pieces including Eric Whitacre's **Sleep** and the first performance of **Pied Beauty** by Paul Henley, founder with his wife Ruth of the Corvedale Festival, plus three gorgeous pieces by women composers.

The concert will be about an hour long followed by afternoon tea - a perfect Sunday afternoon!

Corvedale Garden Group

Byecroft, Bircher



Saturday 14th July saw the group heading just over the border into Herefordshire along the familiar road to Croft Castle. Turning up Welshman's Lane, on our right we came to

Byecroft in brilliant sunshine. This was a sharp contrast to the pouring rain in June. Sue and Peter Russell had moved 17 years ago, to a virtually empty patch, from the East of England where they had a nursery. They had the imagination to create a beautiful garden and grew most of their plants, including some very unusual ones, from seed. We parked in a field opposite the house where there was a well laid out orchard. They explained about the house and garden while we stood looking at the colourful plants in the gravel garden. In front of the house was a long pergola covered with a range of clematis and roses. Deep beds of perennials



framed the garden with bees and other insects loving the blue eryngium in particular. There were unusual Himalayan lilies (*cardio crinum giganteum*) which towered over the bed with their impressive seed heads. There were shady areas too, with soft planting. A pond with water lilies and a well-stocked vegetable patch completed the areas on view. We were struck by the large red



sculpture of a man and his mower and by the curved metal and mesh panelling with a circular hole in it, which drew the eye to a view down the hill into the Herefordshire landscape and the Malvern Hills beyond. Peter explained the panelling had been clad in ivy for several years but had needed replacing.

People enjoyed catching up with each other in the courtyard over hot drinks, chocolate, or sticky toffee cake. There was a selection of reasonably priced plants available too. What better way to spend a sunny Saturday morning?

Our August visit is closer to home when two members of the group have offered us the opportunity to visit their garden in Corfton on **Saturday 20 August**. If you would like to join us, please let me know by the Saturday before.

Munslow Village Hall (aka Beambridge Clubroom)

Annual General Meeting - September 20th at 7.30pm

In the UK, the number of us more than 80 years old is growing, both absolutely and relatively. We may have an advantage as far as experience is concerned, but there comes a time when younger minds (with more energy) need to take the lead. At the moment, there are too many octogenarians on the Village Hall Committee, so resignations are coming to the fore. At the Annual General Meeting on 20th September, there will be the opportunity for new leadership with initiative, to step forward.

Beambridge Clubroom gets its name from the time when it was used as a club facility for estate workers, in the earlier part of the 20th century. Over fifty years or more, the hall has been transformed from an agricultural building by local volunteers, to become the 'home' of Munslow Parish Council, Corvedale Arts Club and Munslow's WI, as well as being the Polling Station for our Electoral Parish. The hall is also the home to The Mappa Munslow, created to celebrate the Millennium and made by the children and ladies of the Parish.

Recently, Corvedale Tots, have enjoyed our facilities but there are more opportunities for wider use of the building, by the community. The scope for a new administrative body to develop and expand this unique, historic asset in the Parish of Munslow, is evident to the existing committee but requires new energy to make it a reality. It is not an onerous responsibility, the committee, currently meets about four times a year.

In 2023, the 21-year lease for Beambridge Clubroom is due for renewal. As a Village Hall, it is already a registered charity, but it is planned that it will be transferred from the ownership of Millichope Park to the Millichope Foundation, a charitable body that supports the arts in Shropshire. The heating and lighting in the Hall are currently being upgraded, together with the recent installation of Wi-Fi, this will make it more user friendly in the present climate of fuel economy and developing technology.

If you are a resident in the Parish of Munslow, please do consider coming forward to serve on the Village Hall Committee. Bring your ideas and energy with you so that we octogenarians can step down gracefully. It has been a rewarding commitment, but it is time to move on.

Vichyssoise Soup - Beth Neden

This soup, served chilled, is perfect for the recent hot weather we have been having.

Ingredients

- 1 sweet onion, chopped
- 2 tbsp butter
- 3 potatoes, peeled and diced
- 6 large leeks, thoroughly rinsed and sliced (white and light green parts only)
- 2 pints chicken stock or vegetable bouillon
- A pinch of nutmeg
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup double cream
- Chives (chopped) to garnish

Method

- 1. In a large saucepan, gently heat the butter until soft, then add the onions and cook until soft (about 2 minutes). Add the leeks and cook until soft (about 4-5 minutes).
- 2. Add the potatoes and season with salt and pepper before adding the chicken stock and bringing to the boil. Lower the heat and simmer for 30 minutes or until the potatoes are tender.
- 3. Puree the soup using a blender.
- 4. Add the double cream and turn the heat up to medium. Cook for about five minutes, so it thickens slightly. Add a pinch of freshly grated nutmeg. Remove from the heat and serve.

This soup can be served warm or cold. Garnish with chopped chives when serving.

The Past by Tessa Hadley

NATIONAL BESTSELLER

TESSA HADLEY The Past

This is the story of four adult siblings returning to their grandparents' home as adults for a three-week summer holiday as they have done for several years. This year they must decide whether they keep and maintain the house or if they will sell it. Alice arrives first in the story but has forgotten her key. She is single, intense, an actor, the youngest child, and has come with Kasim, an ex-boyfriend's son. Kasim is a bored student at the end of his first year of university. Harriet, the eldest, is also single and had arrived before them, but had gone for a walk, leaving the house locked. Fran's husband, Jeff, who promised to come, has let her down again, so Fran has had to shop in addition to bringing her children Ivy (9) and Arthur (6). Roland arrives late with his third wife, Pilar, and his teenage daughter Molly. The families settle into their roles, some bickering, some agreements. The brother and his wife are set apart by the intensity of their new relationship. The sisters are watching and commenting throughout the reunion.

The shadows of the past are not just in the house, its furnishings, and its surroundings, but in their rekindled

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memories of their vicar and poet grandfather, Grantham Fellowes, their grandmother, Sophy, and their own mother, Jill, whose early death had meant Harriet became the one responsible for caring for her siblings. This family, as most do, has its secrets which have an impact on the present. The setting provides a background to Sophy's role as vicar's wife, Jill's life as a young mother, the four children's childhood, and the younger grandchildren's exploration of the garden, the churchyard, and the world beyond.

The book is well written with the characters beautifully drawn, delicate pen portraits being layered across the pages as their characters are built up. The house is vividly described, as is the ruined cottage which the children discover. The siblings share their emotional responses to the past, present and the future. Alice overreacts, Fran is stressed by the day-to-day chores, Harriet is quietly intense, Roland more detached. The slow development of Kasim and Molly's inevitable relationship is spied on by the younger children and woven into Ivy's game of make believe. Harriet begins to consider she has a new friend in Pilar, but things don't turn out quite as she had hoped.

The book weaves its plot around the assumptions people make about each other, the details of the relationships and how they are re-negotiated over time. The events seem inconsequential in themselves but build a believable picture of family life which we could each relate to.

It provoked a long discussion about whether the characters were drawn in depth or were inconsequential, with cliched incidents or literary devices being used too prominently. It raises questions about male and female roles and about how people manage longer term relationships. Hadley is interested in how people are managing longer relationships, when marriages stay together and when they fall apart, commenting '*you either hang on, or you don't.*' In a way, that was the crux of the tale.

Tessa Hadley was an author which few of us had heard of, but several of us would now like to read some of her other books. Our read for next month is *Etta Lemon, The Woman Who Saved the Birds* by Tessa Boase. It is a history of the formation of the RSPB.

Corvedale Past and Present

The good old ways?

The word 'way' is really interesting. It is very old, coming to us from Old English and it occurs in lots of European languages, in many forms.

It's not only a 'way' to travel the earth like a path, but it's also a metaphor for the journey of life itself and it's a really powerful concept. The word 'path' is also of great antiquity, occuring in Old English, and it's interesting that we have at least two really solid words for this idea.

Many people these days leave their garden grass long during the summer months and cut paths through the sward. It is lovely, and gives us the reward of seeing insects in clouds on a warm July evening in a westering sun. Even if your only contact with the countryside is travelling by car through our road system (and this may sometimes be the case these days), no one could miss seeing green lanes, paths, tracks or holloways connecting to those lanes.

They're tremendously alluring, or I find them so. They seem to dare or entice us to follow; they have an air of mystery and compulsion. There is always a story just round the corner. A foot-way is a deep thing with humans even after our minds have been dulled by car travel and endless screens.



In the past there were huge numbers of ways or paths crossing the countryside. They were organic rather than planned, and people used them for all manner of reasons. There was the walk to work; to church, or chapel. People walked to see friends; to avoid enemies. They walked outwards and back again. They set out for war not knowing if they would come back again. They carried their dead for burial, and came back shoulder light. They went to fairs and dances and came back again. They drove their cattle over huge distances, to markets or seasonal pasture. They went to find work, or went in desperation to avoid starvation. They went on pilgrimage or just walked! They went to see lovers and relations. They traded and bartered. They left home and they returned and they set out on their last journeys on foot. They walked for strength, consolation, and inspiration.

Prodigious walking was the rule for the vast majority before our modern means of transportation. Today, we are told of the great benefits of walking for our bodies, minds and spirits. People in the past would have roared with laughter at such a statement – they just walked!





In Victorian times, the old ways were tidied and became paths. They were tamed and sanitised and appeared on maps. Today, if we look at maps from the late 19th century we can get some idea of the vast plethora of old ways. They could concentrate around farms and villages, even ones that had now long since gone. They would lead to sites of gathering or sacred sites. It's a good game to play on the right scale of O.S. map... spot the lost settlement, by looking at the pattern of footpaths.

Between Abdon and Clee Burf, at the saddle between the two hills, we see on the early ordnance map paths forming the spokes of a wheel as they coalesced and spread. This would be typical of the concentration around a point of geographical, social, magical or spiritual import.



So let's keep thinking about the good old ways. They are a vital part of our deep past and let's hope more and more people begin thinking they must be a big part of our future.

Afterthought: Quite rightly, much has been written about droving roads, but far less on 'coffin routes'. Before the English 16th Century Reformation, if you wanted to be buried in 'holy' ground – and you likely would – your parish church was the only option. If you lived in a 'detached' part of a parish this could mean many miles in prospect for carrying the dead. Coffin routes must have been a harsh reality, and places to rest the coffin en route must have been really important. It has been suggested that the benches in church porches would have been ideal. So maybe Clee St Margaret was used en route from Heath to Stoke St Milborough, or Munslow for Earnstrey to Diddlebury – or even Bromfield in the two generations or so before the new town of Ludlow had its own chuch and the town dwellers were buried in Stanton Lacy.

It was a very productive evening, with a convivial atmosphere and we all enjoyed ourselves as we worked. Weeds were pulled up, brambles cut back, moss cleared, railings washed down, and all the debris swept up.

The evening was an excellent display of community spirit. We will plan to do another session next spring.

Diddlebury Parish Plan

The Diddlebury Parish Plan was refreshed in 2013. The action points from the plan have now been implemented and the Parish Council has been regularly appraised of progress. A copy of the action plan review is uploaded to the Parish Council website: www.diddleburyparish.co.uk

During the last year, the group commissioned the Parish Council Speed Awareness Device, and this is now in action at various locations in the parish. The Police have suspended community speed awareness groups on the B4368 due to safety concerns, so the device has been mounted on brackets fixed on signposts. Speed awareness wheelie bin stickers have been distributed.

Discussions have been held with the Parish Council to investigate a Community Led Housing Scheme aiming

at providing some affordable housing within the parish. Suitable land plots need to be identified.

Following discussions with Shropshire Rural Communities the Steering Group has agreed that a further refresh of the parish plan will be undertaken. This will again involve parish wide consultations and a communication plan will be designed to develop a programme.

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Fix My Street

Fix My Street is a relatively new service provided by Shropshire Council.

It is extremely easy to report a problem.

- Simply access the website FixMyStreet *www.shropshire.gov.uk.*
- Then enter a postcode, or street name and area e.g., SY7 9DJ. The interactive map then allows you to plot the precise location of the problem.
- You can then choose the type of problem from a drop-down list e.g., potholes, signage, ditches and drains, flooding etc.

Shropshire Carers Feedback System

Shropshire Carers Support team want to hear the voices of unpaid and family carers in Shropshire. We want carers to have more opportunities to get involved in shaping services and support throughout Health and Social Care.

The Carer Feedback form will give carers and their representatives a means of feeding back their experiences with the whole Health and Social Care sector, including community and voluntary sector organisations and groups.

We want to hear what is working well and what may need improving so that we can share 'best practice' across the whole of Shropshire and send the feedback of poor experiences to the relevant support area e.g., primary care; hospital trusts or adult social care for them to look at how they can improve that area of their service.

For people who do not have access to online forms who would like the opportunity to tell us about their experience, paper copies can be found in local libraries and will be distributed within local peer groups or, alternatively, Shropshire Carers Support team can note your feedback via the telephone; you will not have to give your full name/ contact details unless you would like to.

Shropshire Carers Support team contact details are: 01743 341 995 Monday - Friday 9.00am till 5.00pm.

- There then may be a sub-category to give more details of the type of problem.
- If you wish you then have opportunity to upload a photograph of the problem.
- Further details can then be added in free form text.
- Finally, just add your contact details and submit the form.

The system is remarkably simple to use, and anecdotal evidence suggests that Shropshire Council is responding to problems reported in this way.

So, if you see a problem, report it!

How It Works

- Carers/representatives leave their comments on the form, with an option for someone to call them to discuss further.
- The feedback is forwarded to the appropriate work area for response within 2 weeks.
- Carers/representatives are called, if contact details given, with an outcome from their feedback or update on the progress of the response from the receiving organisation.
- Contact with carer/representatives will be maintained until a final response has been received to the feedback.
- The feedback is collated into relevant groups/topics.
- A report will be taken to Shropshire Carers Partnership Board (SCPB), as a standing item on the Board agenda, of the types of feedback and any emerging patterns. The SCPB will feed the information into the Health and Wellbeing Board.
- An annual report from SCPB will be shared with Shropshire Council's Information and Insights team for their annual public feedback report.

CULMINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Draft minutes of a meeting held on Tuesday 7th June 2022 at 7.00pm

Present: Councillors Mr I Alderson, Mrs C Byng, and Mr J Turley; holds £12,871.97. Cllr C Motley (Shropshire Council); H Coonick (Clerk/RFO).

As both Cllrs Steele (Chair) and Pike (Vice Chair) had sent apologies Cllr of fuel it was agreed that the hourly rate paid to the Environmental Byng was elected to chair the meeting. Maintenance Contractor be increased to £17. The Council confirms that

Apologies for Absence: Cllrs Steele, Pike, Holland and Mear.

Declarations of Interest Relating to this Meeting: None.

Public Involvement Session: No members of the public were present.

Minutes: The minutes of the Annual Parish and Annual Parish Council meetings held on 3rd May 2022 were approved as being correct.

Matters Arising: *a*) the Clerk reported that Shropshire Council will contact the landowner regarding an unsafe tree near Copper Beeches *b*) Cllr Alderson reported a very serious vehicle accident near Burley. It was agreed that the Clerk will write to Shropshire Council asking for verge trimming to be carried out earlier and a road sign to be positioned in the vicinity to warn of the bend in the road.

Community Governance and Boundary Review: As no members of the public were present this matter was deferred to the next meeting. The Clerk will write to the owners of The Pheasantry to gauge their view on the Parish boundary.

Reports from Members: *Shropshire Council*: Cllr Motley reported that a Local Government Association Team is reviewing Shropshire Council's procedures. She has recently met with the NFU and CLA. The cabinet will be discussing the number of deaths in the River Severn. The Council is also considering banning Chinese lanterns.

Village Hall: Cllr Mear sent a report which the Clerk read out. She thanked the Village Hall committee and volunteers who made the Jubilee such a success. The AGM is on 7th July when they would welcome new members. The committee is considering an extension to the hall but this is in the early stages. The Flower Show schedule is due out next week and a promises auction is planned for the Autumn.

Flood Committe: Cllr Byng had nothing to report.

Planning: 22/02014/FUL - erection of an extension to existing outbuilding to provide annexe accommodation ancillary to main dwelling. Tudor Lodge, 11 - 12 Culmington, Ludlow, Shropshire, SY8 2DB. The Council resolved to support this application with the condition that vehicle parking be included in the plans as there are already issues with parking on the road in this area of the village.

Finance: The Finance Report and Bank Reconciliation were reviewed. The council has received a £1,000 Environmental Maintenance Grant and £690.54 refund for VAT. The bank account as at 31st May 2022

Environmental Maintenance Contract: Due to the increasing costs of fuel it was agreed that the hourly rate paid to the Environmental Maintenance Contractor be increased to £17. The Council confirms that the grant was spent in accordance with the conditions during 2021-2022.

Desilting of Seifton Brook on Seifton Lane: The Council resolved to desilt Seifton Brook with the total cost of the contractor and ecologist being no more than £1,000. Cllr Turley was thanked for agreeing to take the spoil from the work. The Environmental Maintenance Contractor will be asked to strim verges on Seifton Lane and ensure that the hedge around the brook is clear to allow the desilting to take place. Cllr Motley will discuss with Shropshire Highway the installation of a pipe on Cllr Turley's land to increase the flow of water away from Seifton Lane.

Payments: D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) Invoices 144 and 149 £82.50, H Coonick (Clerk) Salary £747.76 for April - June and back pay from 1/4/21-31/3/22 and reimbursement for stationery and software £37.80, and Stanton Lacy Parish Council (Reimbursement for software) £22.22.

Review of Standing Orders and Financial Regulations: Both were reviewed and adopted.

Funding for a Speed Activated Sign: It was agreed to apply for funding from the Police and Crime Commissioner for another Vehicle Activated Sign for the Eastern entrance to Culmington village and to request that the 40 miles an hour speed limit be extended to Clay Lane. It was agreed that monies from the Parish Council reserves could be used to match this funding if necessary. This was agreed unanimously.

Update on Laundry Works: The Environment Agency is planning a third visit to the site to look at fire safety and issues with wastewater. West Mercia Police is following up a report they made to Shropshire Council regarding the parking of lorries outside the Laundry Works.

Parish Council Website and Planning: The Clerk reported that Web Orchard and Shropshire Council have been unable to resolve the issue regarding the planning updates on the Parish Council website. It was decided to cease using Web Orchard and use a free website host. The Clerk will liaise with Mr J Williams regarding the transfer.

Police and Crime Commissioner Online Survey: Cllr Alderson agreed to complete the survey.

DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL

Summary of the draft Minutes of Diddlebury Parish Council's Meeting held on Wednesday 22nd June 2022 at Westhope Village Hall

Present: Cllr D Hedgley - Chairman, Cllrs A Watson, R Povall & R Morgan.

Apologies were received and accepted from Cllrs S Povall, T O'Boyle, T Pardoe and A Rattu.

In attendance: The Clerk, Unitary Cllr Cecilia Motley and four members of the public.

Declarations of Interest: None were made.

The Minutes of the Annual General Meeting, the Annual Parish Meeting and the Parish Council Meeting (all held on 25th May 2022) were approved by councillors and signed by the Chairman.

Matters Arising: It was confirmed that the Clerk had sent requests for further information about drainage issues relating to the developments at Bache Mill and the old poultry sheds. Responses are awaited. Cllr Motley had taken up the issue of the chaos on the B4368 caused by poor diversion signage again: she said the lack of suitable diversion options were the root cause of the problem.

Reports: *The Chairman* reported he had in the past month attended to Jubilee celebration signage, delivered a Certificate of Recognition of Service to Geoff Neden, had been involved in election issues and had spent a considerable amount of time preparing for the planning application 22/02425/FUL.

Unitary Cllr Motley said she has written to Eddie West and Tracey Darke at SC about DPC's outstanding CIL payment. She hopes the resurfacing works can be carried out in the October school holiday. She reported on her attendance at an LGA meeting. She has urged SC's emergency team to share with town and parish councils their comprehensive emergency plan so parish councils have clear lines of communication and knowledge of what powers they possess in the event of any major emergency.

Westhope Village Hall: Cllr Watson reported that works had commenced on replacing the roof of Westhope Village Hall. As asbestos removal is involved some events have been cancelled for health and safety reasons.

Community & Governance Review: Cllr R Povall reported on the continuing negotiations about possible revisions to DPC's boundaries. Seifton and Culmington issues remain to be resolved.

Planning: 22/02425/FUL - An application for the erection of a single

storey dwelling with fully integrated solar panel roof and detached garage/car port to be built on land to the east of The Tithe Barn, Diddlebury.

The applicant and two neighbours who had raised objections to the application were in attendance and given opportunities to address the council. The Chairman and Councillors present had read all documents filed in connection with the application, including the pre-application advice, the detailed objections and planning law, regulations and training session planning advice relating to this application and Diddlebury's 'open countryside' SAMDev designation in particular. Research had revealed a few exceptions to the 'open countryside' planning prohibition, which had not applied to the applications at The Moors, but which did relate to this application. After long and detailed discussion, and by a majority, DPC voted to support the application, with provisos relating to access and privacy issues.

Highways/Environmental Issues: The issue of excessive speed (of up to 90mph) and dangerous overtaking by vehicles and motor bikes on the B4368 in the Corfton area had been raised by a resident, who sought DPC's help in putting in place remedial measures, including double white lines on the highway. The Clerk will approach Highways about the white lines and DPC will consider purchasing speed activated signs for the Diddlebury stretch of the B4368. A request from Bouldon residents for signs asking motorists to slow down around horses was considered and signs will be purchased.

Correspondence & Communications: 11 items of correspondence were considered.

Finance Matters: The Finance Report for June 2022 was considered and payments totalling £311.80 were authorised, following which DPC holds £40,506.18. The cash book/bank statement reconciliation was verified by Cllr Watson.

Election of a New Councillor: The Clerk said three applicants, to her knowledge, had applied for nomination packs and an election is scheduled for 21st July 2022. It is optional whether or not polling cards are printed and sent out to all households – it would cost DPC approximately £300. It was agreed SC should be asked to send out polling cards so all parishioners are aware of the election.

AOB: No matters arose and the Chairman closed the meeting at 9.05pm.

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
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
