



Used Stamps

They use the stamps to raise funds towards the treatment of leprosy, a disease which affects about 3 million people around the world, with about 200,000 more cases being diagnosed each year. Any stamps are suitable: British and foreign, unusual and ordinary. We collect the stamps throughout the year but in the coming weeks we will all receive many more stamps than normal as cards are sent and received. Please tear off the stamps from the envelopes, leaving a small margin of paper around the stamp, and place them in the boxes in church - an easy but effective way of helping others. Thank you.

Shop Online and Help Our Local Churches

The Corvedale churches are part of the 'Easy Fundraising' scheme, which raises a small donation each time you shop online, if you register with the site. 

Munslow Church Stained-Glass



Still Life by Sarah Winman

This was a new author to most of us and the book itself had been found by chance last year in Waterstones (other bookshops are available!) on display as their fiction book of the month. It was a hot, sunny day and a combination of the setting, Italy, and the effusive reviews prompted the purchase. It proved to be a good one.

Still Life is a story of interconnectedness which starts in 1944 in the Tuscan hills and ends in the late 1970s. It introduces us to a wealth of lively and vivid characters whom we come to love and care about. It is a story of love, friendship, family, and art. It is a beautifully crafted story which, despite its humour and humanity, doesn't let us forget the realities of war, loss, and devastation. It is full of witty conversation which bring the characters fully to life, glowing descriptions of the art of Florence and very realistic portrayals of disaster, in particular the floods of Florence in 1966. It takes us through four decades of social change, fashion, and music.

There are several stories with the main characters at their heart. These stories are skillfully woven together and kept us compelled and engaged throughout the book. We meet Evelyn Skinner in war torn Italy in 1944. She is an art historian described as a spinster but who has had deeply significant relationships during her life. She also has a deep affection for Florence, a place she first visited as an eighteen-year-old and where she encountered a young E M Forster gaining inspiration (we presume) for his book 'A Room with a View'. She also experienced love for the first time.

In 1944 Evelyn meets Ulysses Temper, a young British soldier, and together they accidentally discover a repository of hidden artworks. The experience is to weld them together for life, though they don't yet know this.

Each survives the war and returns to England, Evelyn to her teaching post and Ulysses to his two old friends,

Col, and Cressy, who run a pub in London's East End. He also returns to Peg, his wife, who now has a child, Alys, from an affair with an American soldier. They divorce but maintain a love and attraction that never really goes away. Ulysses becomes a father figure to Alys and Peg leaves her in his care, feeling unable to offer the child the love she deserves. The relationships between these friends and the community are, we thought, the most well drawn in the book. Their loyalty to one another is very moving.

Ulysses participates in a chance rescue while in Florence at the end of the war and saves the life of a recluse, Arturo. Ulysses becomes a hero never to be forgotten by the people living in the little square, Santo Spirito. Arturo later leaves Ulysses his home in Florence. Ulysses decides to move there taking with him Alys, old Cressy, and Claude the parrot. Here they swap their old community in London for the people of Florence. Some of them find love and all of them find a home where art fires their imagination and a new family of loyal friends is created.

All the characters and the people they encounter are beautifully drawn; funny, idiosyncratic, and come together to build a compelling story of love, friendship, family, and loyalty. The book reminds us how chance encounters with people can have lasting influence. It is a story about ordinary lives surrounded by extraordinary art and a chronicle of the intertwining of those lives. It is a celebration of beauty; a story of what Evelyn describes as 'Continuity. Memory. Family'.

A thoroughly enjoyable read, highly recommended.

The book we will be discussing on Thursday 8th December is *Shuggie Bain* by **Douglas Stuart** which won the Booker prize in 2020 and which The Observer described as a 'a novel of rare and lasting beauty'.

Winter In The Churchyard

The Churchyard Task Team works until the first week in December. The following week we enjoy a Christmas lunch at a local pub and then we take a break. We return in the second week of January... and each time we do, it always feels different.

While we have been away, the winter will have stripped even more leaves from the trees: nothing has grown, the hibernators will still be asleep, and all is very still. It is a chance, too, for you to take a closer (or do I mean clearer?) look at the area that is the church and churchyard.

The gravestones stand out more starkly in the winter light. Have a look at the wall. If it has been there for a long time, it will be a dry-stone wall, one that has been built by careful selection of stones, and no mortar or cement to hold it together. It is, after all this time, as solid as the rocks that make it. A wall built a couple of centuries or so later may have a lime-based mixture holding the stones in place. This made it easier for the builder as the selected stones could be stuck together, and he could use a wider collection of shapes and sizes too.

Many churches are built on mounds and, if round, are likely to be places of earlier pre-Christian origin. Historical evidence shows us that as far back as Bronze Age times (5,000BC - 800BC) burial places, or barrows as they are called, served not just as burial sites but for combined communal, secular, and religious/spiritual purposes too. When Christianity arrived in Britain the then Pope, Gregory I, instructed his missionaries very carefully, telling them to be sympathetic to previous religious practices and to build on, not destroy them. And so, our present-day church buildings in Shropshire and surrounding counties, most of which are around 1,000 years old, are built on older spiritual sites. If your parish church is mentioned in the Doomsday Book (1086AD) you can almost guarantee your site is older than Christianity.

While you ponder what you see before you, remember that despite the peace, an awful lot is still going on. Those



choosing to hibernate (dormice, hedgehogs, and bats, which might all be found in your churchyard) spend winter in deep sub-consciousness but also moments of light activity. It is a survival technique. Other small mammals, like shrews, slow down, hunt less and sleep more. Badgers do something similar, but they are not small! Some insects, butterflies, ladybirds, and some bees, overwinter in a state of torpor but can occasionally be roused on bright, warm(ish) winter days. Frogs, toads, and newts all change their behaviour as soon as the frosts start. They look for secluded spots to shelter from the elements. Compost heaps are extremely popular with slow worms! So, lots of life is there, but it's just not obvious.

Come the New Year and change will start creeping in. But in the meantime, have a very happy Christmas.


Autumn Thoughts

Autumn has come to an end and our gardens should now be tidied up and ready for the winter - a season which seems to start later each year.

The gutters need to be cleaned of leaves to lessen the chance of water overflowing gutters and running down the walls. The debris of leaves and small twigs should be removed from drain gullies and any streams bounding our properties to avoid flooding from water not flowing away quickly enough.

At this time of year the bird feeders come out to supplement the birds' food pickings after the autumn berries have disappeared, but have you thought about making a bird box to protect the wild birds from a harsh winter?

Bird boxes are simple to make using a single piece of wood - 150mm x 1400mm x 15mm thick.



The 32mm hole in this diagram is ideal for sparrows but by differing its size and placement different birds can be attracted to your garden.


Once the bird box has been made, find a bird-friendly spot under the house eaves or high up on a wall. The box needs to be at least three metres from the ground and it should face between north and east to stop it getting too hot or too wet.

The rubber strip in the diagram could be made from a piece old bicycle tube but roofing felt, or damp-proof membrane would work too. If you don't want to build a bird box, why not buy a ready-made box, and paint it yourself? Children would enjoy the painting.

Materials needed: plank of wood, saw, pencil, tape measure, nails or screws, drill, rubber strip, and water-based paints.

From his upbringing in his father's jewellery firm in St. Petersburg, Fabergé has been the most revered name in jewellery ever since Peter Carl Fabergé became official goldsmith to the Russian Imperial Court. The house created exquisite jewels and objects, including the legendary series of lavish and ingenious Imperial Easter eggs.

Enlightening and informative as this was, members thoroughly enjoyed hearing how Mrs. Fox attended the WI's Denman College many years ago to study the art of egg decoration. She developed her skills in blowing eggs from various birds, pigeon, hen, goose, and ostrich and just recently a swan's egg (a generous donation from a friend). From blowing to sterilising the egg she then builds up a decoration and in keeping with Faberge's ethos that each egg should hold a surprise; she cuts out little doors to show another scene inside. Mrs. Fox had brought with her a selection of her favourite eggs, from her first attempt depicting Tenbury Wells, with blossom leaves and apples on the exterior and scenes of Tenbury's Pump Room and Market Hall on the interior. Everyone gasped at the intricate scenes that lay hidden within each egg, for example, the Queen Mother's 100 years celebration where there was a drawer with a silver horse and a fly-fishing rod. The centre piece was a collection of family photographs of her husband, mother-in-law Queen Mary and her two daughters. Another egg that Anne had made was a Scottish heather with two flaps that opened to show a golfer one side and the green and putting hole the other.

Letter from Westminster

Although it is still early in November as I write this, I am looking forward to Christmas.

A warming climate has been high on the agenda this past year, not least at the UN conference COP27 which has yet to conclude as I write, but after the UK has handed over the Presidency to Egypt. It is clear that 2022 will go down as the warmest year on record with drought conditions and record temperatures over 40 degrees leading to some of our rivers running dry in their upper reaches.

We've had the warmest and driest autumn since records began and as I write, have not yet had the first frost. Of course, I cannot predict what will happen for the rest of the year nor whether we will enjoy a white Christmas - I will leave that to the papers - but I have no doubt that our climate is changing around us.

It is reassuring that our changing climate and the contribution we have made to our planet's warming is now near-universally recognised by global leaders, 110 of whom attended the COP27 Climate Conference in Egypt in December, including our new Prime Minister Rishi Sunak.

In November, I had the opportunity to ask the Prime Minister, now that we no longer have the COP Presidency as our forcing mechanism, how his Government will secure the necessary cross-departmental working to ensure our national net zero ambitions are achieved. He gave me a resolute response with a personal commitment to ensuring all government departments work towards decarbonising our economy.

Ahead of the COP27 Conference, our new King, HM Charles III hosted world leaders, business figures, environmentalists, and NGOs at Buckingham Palace. King Charles has been a leading figure in the environmental movement for half a century, long before many others had awoken to the developing crisis. We are fortunate to have both a Prime Minister and a Monarch fully committed

to a sustainable future and the protection and preservation of our natural environment.

As Christmas approaches, like me, many people will be looking forward to spending time with loved ones, watching younger family members open their presents from Father



Christmas and catching up over the Christmas Turkey.

But Avian Influenza, more commonly known as bird flu, may put our Christmas dinner at risk. At the time of writing, there had been 220 outbreaks since October 2021, 88 of which were during October this year.

Bird flu is a very virulent disease with turkeys particularly susceptible. The poultry industry is taking what steps they can to protect their flocks. I have joined colleagues in calling on the Government to harness our best scientists and virologists to develop a vaccine with the same urgency as we saw during the Covid pandemic.

Poultry farmers are not always highlighted for praise, but avian flu can completely devastate their business. The sector provides over 50% of the meat that we eat. Not to mention how critical they are to our traditional Christmas meal which dates back to Henry VIII who is thought to be the first person to eat turkey on Christmas day.

I hope that our poultry growers can provide the 10 million turkeys thought to be eaten each year at Christmas so that we can all enjoy the festive period and our Christmas Dinner to the full! Have a wonderful Christmas.

Scrummy Squash Soup - Sara Thompson

Ingredients (Serves 4-6)

50g butter

1 medium onion finely chopped

1-2 tsp cumin seeds, to taste

butternut squash or pumpkin, (about 750g, peeled and diced) 200g potato, peeled and diced 900ml vegetable stock

salt & pepper

single cream, to serve

Method

- 1. Melt the butter in a large saucepan and cook the onion until soft.
- 2. Add the cumin seeds and cook for one minute.
- 3. Add the squash/pumpkin and potato. Cook for a further minute, stirring all the time.
- 4. Add the stock and season to taste.
- 5. Cover and simmer for about 25 minutes or until the vegetables are soft.
- 6. Blend the soup until smooth, then return to the pan and heat gently.
- 7. For a touch of luxury serve with a swirl of single cream.

The speakers had been the Emergency Planning Team for Shropshire Council. She would lay a wreath at the war memorial on 11th November. She encouraged support for the Extraordinary AGM for the Beambridge Club Room Committee.

Shropshire Council - Cllr Motley was unable to attend but provided a report: The Local Government Boundary Review Committee wanted divisions to be composed of populations of 3,500 +/- 10%. The present number for the Corvedale division is 3,100. so there may be some changes to boundaries. They would give their reaction to Shropshire Council's initial proposals for going up to 76 members on 8th November. The sixpractise health hub proposed in Shrewsbury had not been well received. DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL

Summary of the draft Minutes of Diddlebury Parish Council's Meeting held on Wednesday 26th October 2022 at Diddlebury Village Hall

Present: Cllr D Hedgley - Chairman, Cllrs A Watson, R Povall, T O'Boyle, A Rattu, C Martyn, R Morgan, T Pardoe and S Povall.

In Attendance: The Clerk, Unitary Cllr Cecilia Motley and eight members of the public.

Declarations Of Interest were made by Cllr O'Boyle and Cllr Watson.

Minutes of the meeting held on 28th September 2022 were approved by councillors and two matters arising were dealt with.

Request for an Asset of Community Value registration relating to **the Sun Inn, Corfton:** This issue was raised at the September meeting. Subsequent research indicated if The Sun is a pub, an ACV can be applied for from SC, but there is some question whether it is currently a pub. The matter was deferred by the Chairman to the November meeting for further research to be conducted.

Reports: Chairman - the Chairman reported that the white line marking works on the resurfaced car park/play area at the school and DVH had been agreed, together with some additional works. They had been carried out at a cost of £2,150 plus VAT. Some small necessary remedial works would be carried out. He had discussed with residents of Bache Mill the parking and access problems which they had been having due to the development works. He had discussed the matter with Jack Wrigley. He had thanked Eddie West and Steve Smith of SC for the CIL payment of £11,713 which had now been received.

Unitary Cllr Motley said her Cabinet role had changed from Culture and Tourism to Communities, a wide-ranging brief which encompassed rural issues. She had stood down as Chairman of Rural Services Network after an eight year tenure but remains an executive member. SC is looking to go into the New Year with a £35 million budget deficit: cost savings are being sought in case there is no extra funding forthcoming from government. She would discuss DPC's Highways issues with Derek Buchannan, the recently appointed Traffic Engineer, whose brief covered the whole of Shropshire's highways.

Flood Action Group: Cllr Martyn reported that the Flood Forum Meeting scheduled for 8th September (which had been cancelled) would now take place on 31st October. The recent clean-up of the Diddlebrook in Mill Lane had been successful and he thanked all who had helped.

Planning Applications: 22/04074/FUL - Application for change of use of land and erection of a timber cabin as an annexe to Boscage Lodge, Corfton, SY7 9JZ for craft/leisure pursuits. DPC supported this application.

22/04411/FUL - Application for demolition of existing garage, to be replaced by a two-storey side extension and garages at 16 The Moors, Diddlebury, SY7 9JZ. DPC supported this application.

22/03784/FUL & 22/03785/LBC - Application for internal improvement works to Grade II listed Glebe Farmhouse and conversion of three outbuildings to form three holiday letting units, plus listed building consent for the works proposed. DPC supported both applications.

22/04566/FUL - Application for the erection of an agricultural shed for the storage of sheep, at Pinstones Farm, Corfton SY7 9LB. DPC supported this application.

Highways/Environmental Issues: Corfton residents' concerns about speeding on the B4368 raised at the September meeting were further considered and debated. It was agreed that Cllr Rattu would draft an application to Shropshire Council for a Community Led Concerns request identifying five areas of highways related concern. It was also agreed that DPC would purchase a second mobile speed indicator device.

Communications And Correspondence: 12 items were considered and debated.

Application from Westhope Village Hall Committee for a grant towards its refurbishment works: The WVH's financial situation was investigated and the refurbishments works it had funded were considered. It was agreed to provide financial support towards the cost of replacement exterior doors and a ramp. A grant of £5,000 was agreed, to be ring-fenced and applied to capital/refurbishments works only. The grant will be paid from DPC's Neighbourhood Fund.

Finance Report for October 2022: Cheques totalling £5,305.20 (which included the WVH grant) were approved for payment. DPC held a balance of £26,486.22 following payment of the approved cheques. Cllr O'Boyle approved the Clerk's reconciliation between HSBC bank statements and DPC's cash book.

Any Other Business: It was agreed not to proceed with changing the website host from Web Orchard to Hugo Fox as the cost benefit no longer exists. DVH committee is being asked to provide the Clerk with key. Cllr R Povall is continuing to negotiate with Culmington PC re the boundaries review.

The meeting closed at 9.45pm.

Next meeting: Wednesday 23rd November 2022, 7.30pm at Diddlebury Village Hall.
