CHURCH NEWS



Just under half of the church year is taken up by specific seasons, such as Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter. At these times of year the altar and other hangings are in a specific seasonal colour, and services are structured to reflect the mood of the season. In Lent, for example, the hangings are purple, and services have a penitential feel, whilst at Easter hangings are gold or white, and services are more celebratory.

The rest of the year, that part of the year which is not a specific season, is the time referred to as 'Ordinary Time'. During Ordinary Time the hangings and vestments used are predominantly green, and readings from the gospels are mostly chosen to take us through the life and teaching of Christ. This is the part of the year we will move into this month, and it will last until the day before Advent Sunday. During this part of the year there are still things which vary the pattern – perhaps especially saints' days, along with events such as Remembrance in November.

My dictionary defines 'ordinary' as 'with no special or distinctive features; normal', but it leaves me wondering about designating any period of time as 'ordinary'. Living here we are reminded all the time of the changes that happen around us. Today I noticed that the oil seed rape around the house has lost the brilliant yellow it had only a day or two ago – by the time you read this it will be different again. Every day brings something special or something new to notice. Each week in church our readings remind us of something that Jesus did or said, something that his followers thought was important enough to write about, so that 2000 years later we can hear about it too. Should we really describe any of this as having no special features or as normal?

I am reminded of one of the ways in which we can sometimes begin services in church: *This is the day which the Lord has made – let us rejoice, and be glad in it!*

HOLDGATE CAKE WALK

On 22nd April we held the Corvedale Cake Walk in association with the Marches Long Distance Walking Association.

The association organise everything and provide marshals for the two routes. The walk is listed on the internet on January 1st and participants enrol and pay online from all over the country. This year we had 150 entries (30 more than last year and booked to capacity). The walkers start at Holdgate and either do a 'short' walk to Clee St Margaret village hall (10 miles) or a long walk which continues to Eaton-under-Heywood (22 miles) both routes returning to Holdgate. We provide refreshments - drinks and sandwiches and cakes for which we have earned a considerable reputation! We find that participants want to re-book immediately for the following year. We haven't received the final figure yet, but we should raise in the order of £1,500. This fundraising is vital to church finances.

All this would not be possible without the help of the help and enthusiasm of our team of helpers. MIDSUMMER AGAIN

It is nearly midsummer day. Where did that year go? At the end of the month half the year will have happened already! According to history and tradition, midsummer day falls on 24th June – but history and tradition have a lot to answer for!

1752 is a very significant year because before then we followed the Julian calendar, and on that calendar midsummer day was definitely on 24th June. But astronomers and mathematicians had learned a lot more about the relationship between sun, moon and earth and the new Gregorian method of dating was much more accurate, and so it was decided that Great Britain would adopt it. So, in 1752 the 2nd of September was followed by the 14th of September, and the start of the year changed from March to January. The Gregorian calendar is the most common and used more widely than any other today.

But what about midsummer day and all the fun and frolics that went with it? It soon became clear that, to ordinary people, midsummer day was on the 24th of June with midsummer eve the night before whichever calendar was used; and so, it continued. This was a time of sun worship and light. Bonfires were originally 'bone fires': yes, bones were being burned. With alcohol flowing, leaping over the fire was a happy pastime. If you leapt without harm, you were blessed with luck which would protect you from the evils of witchcraft!

People from the village would sit up on midsummer eve in the church porch to see the spectres of those who would die in the following year. The ghosts would arrive and knock at the door in the order of their dying. It must have been a bit of a shock to see your own spectre!

More exciting for the young women of the village was their annual chance to assess the future of the current boyfriend. This involved picking flowers and putting them in a pot, leaving them overnight and then checking. If the stalks had fallen to the left it was time to dump him: if they fell to the right, then happiness was guaranteed for life.

St John's Wort, a pretty yellow flower found in many local churchyards, was also gathered on midsummer eve, the feast of St John the Baptist falling on the 24th of June. It would be left near the door or window, giving protection against spirits and the dangers of thunder. You have been warned.



This year, eve and day fall on Friday and Saturday so do not be surprised to spot Morris dancers and more. For churches dedicated to St John the Baptist it's a double celebration. The patronal festival can be marked by a special service while the rest of the time is free for music, dancing, singing, and drinking and having an enjoyable time socially. Is it too late for your village to organise something?



ORGAN MOVEMENTS PART 2: FURTHER ORGAN MIGRATIONS

As I mentioned last month, Munslow's were by no means the only Corvedale organs to have moved around, and I shall start by looking at Diddlebury. Like most country churches Diddlebury had unaccompanied singers in the eighteenth century, and these were joined by instrumentalists early in the nineteenth. Their replacement by an organ was not a traumatic event like that described in Hardy's Under the Greenwood Tree, as the impetus seems to have come from the parishioners rather than the vicar. In 1836 an organ fund was started, but it would seem to have taken a long while to raise the necessary funds, and indeed to find a place to put the instrument once it was acquired. The opportunity came when the church underwent a partial restoration in 1859-60. As the Cornewall family had ceased to live at the Hall, their family chapel (now the vestry) was turned into an organ chamber. The plan made at the time shows that the organ took up a lot less space in the vestry than its replacement, which was acquired in 1925.





The new instrument had been made in 1853 by the firm of Gray and Davison, whom I mentioned last month, and was a finger and barrel organ. Barrel organs played tunes from a roll with a fairly limited repertoire of metrical settings of the Psalms. The effect would have been similar to the fairground organs which may still be seen at vintage rallies and had the advantage of not needing a trained organist, only someone to turn the mechanism. A finger and barrel organ also had a keyboard, which could be used instead of the barrel if there was an organist available. Very few

barrel organs now survive in playable condition, for most, like Diddlebury's, were later converted to manual operations. Diddlebury retained its old instrument until 1925, when it was replaced by the present noble Nicholson organ. The old organ then migrated to Aston Botterell, where it remains to this day. It has a very handsome case in the Gothic style, and well worth a visit. It was only last summer, when visiting Kinlet church, that I came across another Corvedale organ. This is a much grander affair than any I have dealt with so far and came from the music room at Millichope Park in 1894. The church guide in fact contains a photograph of the instrument in its original home, where it looks quite majestic - as indeed it should, for a maker's plate announces that J C Bishop, the organ builder, held an appointment to William IV. This dates the organ to between 1830 and 1837, for later instruments bear plates of appointment to HM the Queen. The firm of J C Bishop was founded in 1795, and rapidly built up a reputation for work of the highest quality, which it maintains to this day. Charles Baldwyn Childe of Kinlet also owned Millichope, which he finally managed to sell in 1896, which suggests that he brought the organ to Kinlet rather than including it in the intended sale.



I had not realised that we had another migratory organ in the Corvedale group until I received an email from Andrew Pike to say that Culmington's organ had also done service elsewhere before moving to its present home, and I am most grateful to

Andrew for allowing me to use his notes for this article. The Culmington instrument dates from the late nineteenth century and was formerly in Aconbury church in Herefordshire. It was made by Ingrams, a Hereford firm which was established in the 1870s. Aconbury church had been made redundant in the 1960s and was for many years the diocesan store: one wonders what treasures lay behind its doors, and what has become of them. The organ was acquired by Culmington in 1971 and rebuilt the following year. Forty years later it had a second rebuild to bring it up to full working order once again.

The Corvedale is fortunate to have such interesting and historic organs in its churches – and even more fortunate to have skilled organists to play them. May this continue for many years to come.



CORVEDALE BOOK GROUP





COMPANY OF LIARS BY KAREN MAITLAND

This novel is set in the Middle Ages at the time of the plaque or the Black Death. People reacted very much as we did during the Covid pandemic with fear, superstitious remedies, lockdowns and 'bubbles'. One such bubble was formed by the group of characters in this book. An unlikely group of social misfits, displaced people, travelling together for protection and

company. They were all trying to stay ahead of their past: a conjuror with a horse and cart; a Camelot - a scarred trader in so-called holy relics; a midwife; a couple who are expecting a baby; a young, rune-reading girl; a one-armed storyteller; and two musicians who have seen better times. All have secrets they don't want to share. Together they make up all the criteria for the protected characteristics covered by The Equality Act (2010). The story is told from the point of view of the Camelot who assumes a level of leadership. The group need each other for their individual skills and resources. They are refugees, homeless and dispossessed. As they move north and east to escape the increasing spread of disease, each begins to reveal more about themselves and why they are all to some extent 'hiding in plain sight.' The stories (or lies?) they have woven around the versions of themselves which they share with the group gradually unravel. Some members come to blows, others support each other. Good and bad things happen.

The characters were well drawn and those who listened to the book on Audible enjoyed the narration by David Thorpe. Others found the written version overly lengthy and repetitive, lacking editing, and presenting an unreal picture of how people reacted to things. Just how many times could you fall into an icy river in winter with no ill effects when starving and with poor shoes and clothing? Despite that, it is a page turner, professionally written, and raising a number of philosophical questions: Who are we? Which version of ourselves is real? How does it differ in different company? What is truth? Is lying ever justified? When, where, why and how do we all lie? For what? Are there times when you don't, or can't, protect the old, the sick, the disabled, children, pregnant mothers? Which values matter most and why do we hold them? How do we react when they are challenged by dislike, hunger, cold, lack of shelter, extreme fatigue or poor physical or mental health? What is the 'home' they were all looking for, and how would they know when they found it?

It's a fascinating book although the content at times is miserable, horrible, grotesque and bleak. There is also a great deal of care, teamwork, support and sharing, overlaid with magic, superstition, and dread. People then, as now, lived with a great deal of prejudice and managed it in ways we, mostly, now wouldn't. The people who were supposed to help, the priests, the well-to-do, those in power, those with homes, food, other resources, very often didn't.

The story in some ways is a 'who done it.' There are clues throughout the book to the disrobing of each character. There are a number of grand reveals, some of which we spotted coming and could make sense of, but some of which we couldn't. The book weaves in mythology, allegory, and contemporaneous language to help create the dramatic tension. In that day and age superstition and ritual had power to protect, people hoped, against the strong sense of malevolence which some characters seemed to exhibit. The church, which was supposed to protect and save the vulnerable, didn't live up to expectations. Who takes the difficult decisions about what they have to do to survive? Which of the nine survive and how? You will have to read it to find out. It's worth it.

When we next meet on **Thursday 8th June** we will be discussing **The Marriage Portrait by Maggie O'Farrell**. It is the story of Lucrezia Borgia, another tale about facing and overcoming evil and about marriage not always being what it seems to the outside eye, even when you appear to live amongst plenty.

CORVEDALE PAST & PRESENT

AN ENGLISHMAN, A FRENCHMAN AND... WELL ANYBODY YOU LIKE, REALLY

To some it's an intriguing daydream. Yes, although we are told the wandering mind is a bad thing these days, it can be sometimes highly creative.

You may love to saunter through our local countryside and wonder what it was like 100, 200 or 300 years ago. Myself, I like 800 and 900 years ago, but we all have our little ways! If you are a 6,000 to 7,000 years ago person, you will speculate on how man first came to cease tribal hunting, foraging, and wandering to settle to an agrarian life. Some would have us believe that by so doing they thereby enslaved themselves to the land. It's interesting to speculate, in south Shropshire or anywhere else. whether the pattern we see in the countryside today is the ultimate reflection on the decisions of pioneer farmers or the later planning by power wielding big shots; Saxon, Norman or Angevin etc. Traditionally, the switch to settled farming is seen as a single event: others, though, have criticised this view and have found evidence to show it was a far more nuanced, variable, untidy and interesting transition.

Now, what may seem a bizarre change of gear - please forgive! How we see the world and even how we speculate on the past is governed by our senses. These largely rely on twelve pairs of nerves, and these tell stories and give instruction directly to and from the brain. They are called cranial nerves and they are captivating. They are given Roman numerals – I to XII - and two of these nerves intrigue as they may have played a really big part in our past and have a massive future of potential interest. One is unique and one is simply bizarre! Cranial nerve I, olfactory in name, is unique as it gives smell and taste information directly to the brain without going to a 'relay centre' where it would have to negotiate with other senses, sight, sound, hearing etc. These non-olfactory, mutually supporting senses you might think of as part of the 'mystic harmony linking sense to sound and sight'. Our smell and taste are, so you therefore might think, primal, a 'sense extraordinaire', not part of the harmony of the senses, but an all-important solo voice.

The bizarre nerve (actually there are two, one on either side of the body) is X – vagus. Nothing to do with slot machines and roulette in the Nevada desert, the word comes from the same root as vagrant.... wandering. All of the cranial nerves are paired, right and left, and apart from X, deal only with our heads and necks. The vagus, the wilful beast, originates in the brain like the others but wanders off into the chest, talks to the lungs and heart and then enters the belly where it had (and perhaps still has, for all I know), a mainly negative connotation. It was regularly surgically cut in the past as it appeared below the diaphragm to reduce acid production in the stomach, when peptic ulcers were far more fashionable than they are today. Fortunately, we may now think, this procedure (vagonotomy) was not a terribly effective operation and I think fell off theatre lists some years ago.

As to why these two blighters, nerves I and X, might be so important... that will have to wait till next time: I feel your editor's breath on my neck.

On the Englishman and Frenchman etc: Jean-Jacques Rousseau, an enlightenment thinker, characterised our fardistant human past as a naïve, enchanted simplicity, eventually dispersed by farming, money, rulers, their standing armies, and temples and priesthoods. A very contrary view had been expressed in a book in 1661 by Englishman Thomas Hobbes 'Man's life was solitary, poor, nasty, brutish and short...the primitive or natural state of mankind is violent and cruel.'

Interestingly these two eminent men reached entirely opposite conclusions, both using **their** senses to observe the world and no doubt read many other varying opinions from many other people also using their senses, interpreting what they saw and heard and probably considering little no objective evidence. Do you think it is the Hobbesian view that still lurks in our minds most prominently?

These days things are far different and new discoveries in archaeology and anthropology may make us think very differently about our origins and probably reject these extremities.

CORVEDALE GARDEN GROUP

At last, the sun came out and it was warm, really warm, after a cold week with heavy thundery showers, for our visit to Hurdley Hall, Churchstoke on Saturday 13th May. Despite the unexpected roadworks challenging everyone's navigation skills and their knowledge of the roads in and out of the Welsh border, we all arrived to find the most exquisite garden and a fabulous setting below Roundton hill.

The grade two listed timber framed house was built around 1630, with the porch as a later addition. This is inscribed with a carving 'John and Elizabeth Jones: ano 1718'. The front of the house also has a 'Sheela-na-gig,' a carving of a naked human figure thought to be a fertility symbol (like the one you may have seen on Church Stretton church).

The two-acre garden has been created from a largely derelict farmyard by the owners since 2005. The front of the house, facing Roundton hill, is formal, graveled with walls and paths of recovered local stone and topiary. It sets the scene for the tranquil atmosphere which this garden holds. The main pond, now flaked by 'lakes' of soft blue camassia, was dug out in 2006 and faces the drover's road of the Kerry Ridgeway which runs along the Welsh/English border. Nearer the house is a more formal rectangular pond with fish. The long, herbaceous borders were planted in 2008 and other shrub and perennial borders added in 2012. There was a beautifully tended vegetable patch.

After buying additional acres beyond the formal front garden the owners created Montgomeryshire's Coronation meadow. (The scheme was started by Charles, Prince of Wales to create a new meadow in every county). Seed was collected from Montgomeryshire's wildlife meadow at Ty Brith, Llansantffraid. By following the mown paths, we could see the wildflowers and grasses beginning to populate the grassland, now free from over-grazing. It was lovely to see the lilac ladysmock (Cardamine praetensis), glowing in the sun. To the left of the meadow the walk follows the lower slopes of Todleth hill through ancient woodland alongside Roundton brook. To the right, the orchard of seventy-four named fruit trees was planted in 2016 and, beyond, a mown track rose up the hill between a further five acres of bluebell and cowslip meadows. Heading back to the house from the orchard, the mown path follows through the meadow and turns into a narrow path through woodland with knee-high grasses and native flowers, full of blossom and bird song. This path emerges halfway up the steep drive and crosses over into the bank above the formal garden, coming down to the lawns and fishpond below. Tables and chairs were scattered through the formal gardens and on the terrace. Everyone collected drinks and made difficult decisions about which of the delicious cakes we should try and we sat and chatted in the sunshine, not wanting to leave this peaceful haven.

Hurdley Hall is open for the National Garden Scheme on Sunday 11th June and Sunday 9th July when Simon Cain and Simon Quin would be delighted to share their garden with you. Ian Fotheringham is also running a trip from the Corvedale there this summer - see the article on page 7 for details and contact Ian if you would like to join them.

On **Saturday 10th June** the garden group will be visiting Hereford Cathedral and its gardens. We have been lucky enough to have been given a slot to visit not only the cloister gardens but also the rarely seen Bishop's gardens and Vicar's gardens. Following a brief comfort break/drink we will then have the opportunity for a guided tour of the cathedral, the chained library and Mappa Mundi in small groups. The discounted visit will cost f19 (or f7 for gardens only). If you would like to join us, please confirm with me by 6.00 pm on Wednesday 24th May. Replies after this date will not be allowed to join the group as volunteer guides will have been especially requested to attend for our visit. Please arrive before the start time of 10am so you can be allocated to your groups.

CULMINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

DRAFT MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL PARISH MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 2ND MAY 2023 AT 7.30PM

Attendance: Cllrs I Steele (Chair), A Pike, M Holland, M Seabrook, J Turley, J Mear and J Watts; Cllr Motley (Shropshire Council) and H Coonick (Clerk).

Apologies for Absence: Cllr C Byng.

Notice Convening The Meeting: In accordance with Statute, the notice convening the meeting has been duly published on the Council's Notice Boards and elsewhere throughout the Parish.

Annual Reports of the Parish Council and other groups/ committees for the year 2022-23

Chairman of the Parish Council: (Full report available on the Parish website or by contacting the Clerk) Cllr Steele commented on the very different year compared to the previous 12 months, having now come out of lockdown. He thanked Cllrs Mear and Byng for representing the Council on the Village Hall Committee and the Flood Action Group. He also thanked H Coonick (Clerk), Cllr C Motley (Shropshire Council), Dave Lewis (Environmental Maintenance), Jeff Williams (Parish Paths), and Hugh Disley (Flood Action Group). He also thanked the councillors for attending the meetings and having a say in how our community is being run.

Shropshire Council: Cllr Motley reported that it was indeed a very different year coming out of Covid but also the changes at National Government level. She thanked the parishes for their efforts to provide 'Warm Welcome' events and this demonstrates the strong community spirit in the parishes. There is pressure from National Government for County Councils to become more involved in devolution. The council's finances are difficult but there are no plans to make dramatic cuts to services. Her role has changed during the year, and she is now portfolio holder for Adult Social Care, Public Health and Communities. She is impressed by the teams running the Children and Adult services, and the Mobile Health and Welfare Hub is visiting cattle markets to make health care more accessible to farmers. The council has applied for money under the levelling-up fund but was not successful for the Craven Arms area. Despite this they are trying to get demand-responsive public transport for rural areas. The Boundary Commission has proposed that Cardington be included in the Corvedale division. She proposes a meeting between chairs and clerks to discuss the parish boundary review which will need to be complete by October this year.

Village Hall: Cllr Mear reported that the village hall had returned to normal after the Covid lockdowns and she thanked all of the committee members for their efforts in making that possible. They have obtained planning

permission for an extension to have a bar, so will be fundraising (including a parish ball) and applying for grants. They had a very successful promises auction and tractor run last year which raised money for the MS society. They have improved contacts with other local groups, have a Facebook page and have events planned. A burst pipe damaged the hall during the winter, and it has been closed since, but will reopen in mid-May. The AGM is on 20th June.

Flood Action Group: Cllr Byng had given her apologies. Cllr Steele reported that the Group continued to monitor drains and ditches and regularly attended the National and Shropshire Council Flood Forum meetings.

Culmington Footpath Group: Mr Jeff Williams sent a report. A grant had been obtained from Shropshire Council footpath team and some more tools had been purchased. After the break for his hip operation the team replaced a stile on Mulberry Lane in Lower Hayton followed by a series of stiles, and a footbridge on the Culmington to Hayton footpath at Barracks Farm with the Shropshire Ramblers. There is one more stile to replace at Lower Hayton before they concentrate on footpaths around Burley and Medley Park. He has tried to advertise for help in Ripples but has had no response. He thanked Andrew Pike and new recruits Hugh Disley and John Preston.

Community Governance and Boundary Review: Cllr Motley had mentioned earlier in her report that the Boundary Commission had not agreed to Shropshire Council's request to increase the number of divisions and had proposed that Cardington parish join the Corvedale division. Members of the public can make comment upon this proposal. Culmington Parish Council will continue to consider its parish boundaries including Vernolds Common, The Pheasantry, Sparchford, Elsich, and Seifton Bache.

Parish Plan: The last plan was completed in 2016. Cllr Motley suggested that the Local Plan officer is asked if anything has changed which may require the plan to be updated. Infrastructure Projects for Inclusion in the Place Plan: this item will be included in the agenda for the next meeting. Potential projects include flood prevention, speed limit extension, village hall extension, transport service, faster broadband for the village and village hall and improvements to the sewage and drainage systems in the village.

Open Forum: There were no members of the public present.

DRAFT MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING ON TUESDAY 2ND MAY 2023

Attendance: Councillors I Steele, Mr A Pike, Mrs M Holland, Mrs Jo Mear, Mr M Seabrook, Mr J Turley, Mrs J Watts. Cllr C Motley (Shropshire Council) and H Coonick (Clerk).

Election of Chairperson and Vice Chairperson: Cllr Steele stated that he would not stand for chair again this year. Cllr Motley thanked Cllr Steele for his work over the last six years, especially as it had been a very difficult time due to Covid. No nominations were received for the position of Chairperson. Cllr Pike was elected as Vice Chair and chaired the meeting.

Apologies for Absence: Cllr C Byng.

Declarations of Interest relating to this meeting: None.

Minutes of the meeting on 4th April 2023 were approved and signed by the Chair.

Appointment of Representatives: Village Hall – Cllr Mear. Flood Committee – Cllr Byng. South Shropshire Area Committee – deferred to next meeting.

Standing Orders, Financial Regulations, Code of Conduct and Freedom of Information Publication Scheme: These were all reviewed and adopted.

Matters raised at the Annual Parish Meeting: The Parish Plan and Boundary Review would be on the next meeting agenda.

Infrastructure Projects for the Place Plan: These would be deferred to the next meeting.

Finance: Annual Report: The income for the year was £6,785.54, plus a carry-forward of £7,028.08. Expenditure was £6,700.50 leaving a carry-forward of £7,113.12. The holdings for environmental maintenance and parish paths total £3,443.78 leaving a reserve of £3,669.34. The reserve includes money set aside for repairs, particularly for the Vehicle Activated Sign (which is no longer under guarantee). The council assets total £6,119 with a replacement cost of £8,635. The Parish Council continues as the Custodian Trustee for Culmington Village Hall, but this is only for the purposes of holding the property title. The Annual Report was accepted.

Council's Assets and Insurance: The insurance is sufficient to cover the assets, and payment to Zurich of £363.83 (fixed) was authorised.

Payments were authorised to: Diddlebury Village Hall £20.00, D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) £42.50, J Williams (parish path tools reimbursement) £61.98, H Coonick (clerk – reimbursement, stationery, inks, domain, antivirus software). The precept of £4,864.96 had been received from Shropshire Council.

Dates of the Ordinary meetings for the forthcoming year were agreed.

Update on the Vehicle Activated Sign for the Eastern Entrance to Culmington: The Police and Crime Commissioner had authorised the grant to purchase the sign. Shropshire Council's highways engineer had proposed a site for the post which the council would prefer closer to the speed limit sign. The clerk will request that the engineer reconsiders the site of the post.

Items for the next meeting: a. Election of a chairperson, b. Items for the Place Plan, c. Consider renewal of the Parish Plan d. Vehicle Activated Sign.

Next Meeting: The next meeting will be on Tuesday 6th June 2023 at Culmington Village Hall, starting at 7.30pm.

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MUNSLOW PARISH COUNCIL

DRAFT MINUTES OF THE MUNSLOW ANNUAL PARISH MEETING ON THE 4TH MAY 2023

Present: Cllrs Barbara Archer (Chair), Ed Povey (Vice Chair), Nigel Dobson, David Marston, Val Fotheringham, Chris Meeson, Graham Williams.

In Attendance: Cllr Cecilia Motley (Shropshire Council) and Heather Coonick (Clerk).

Apologies for Absence: Cllr Antonia Bury.

Notice Convening the Meeting: In accordance with Statute, the notice convening the meeting had been duly published on the Council's Notice Boards and website.

Annual Reports: Chair's Report: Cllr Archer reported this has been a very busy year for the council which had held ten parish council meetings. Members had a number of planning applications to consider, some large and some small, but they had all been looked into carefully. One of the major issues which was still ongoing was, of course, speeding along the B4368. On a positive side they had changed the Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS) at the North end of Aston Munslow and the new one appeared to be working well. They had, with the help of a grant from the Police and Crime Commissioner, bought a mobile VAS which was, at the moment, being used in Munslow, but would be moved around the parish every few weeks. After many requests to Shropshire Council, the VAS sign at the south end of Aston Munslow, which apparently was now beyond repair, would be replaced with a new one within 4-6 weeks. The parish now has a defibrillator in Munslow. Please look out for information as to when there would be a training day on how to operate it. The defibrillator was donated by the Henry Angell-James Memorial Trust. Finally, a reminder that the Parish Council was there to serve the community and residents were always welcome to come to the meetings.

Village Hall: Cllr Dobson reported that the village hall (aka Beambridge Clubroom) was slowly picking itself up after Covid. There had been a change of most of the committee. There had been coffee mornings as part of the 'Warm Welcome' initiative raising £113. There had been various improvements to the building, including the drainage. £400 was raised for the village hall at the Millichope open gardens.

Shropshire Council: Cllr Motley reported that it had been a hectic year, especially with the changes in government, the cost-of-living crisis and industrial action. A Levelling-up Shared Prosperity Fund bid for Shrewsbury had been successful, but an application for Craven Arms had not been successful. The council had a historic debit of £50 million but was trying to reduce the debt without making major cuts to services. She thanked the parishes for providing 'Warm Welcomes' which had been very successful. Her role had changed, and she was now portfolio holder for Adult Social Care, Public Health and Communities. She remained on the executive of the Rural Services Network and was vice chair of the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. The transport manager for the council was planning a demand-responsive public transport service for rural areas. The Health and Wellbeing Hub had visited Ludlow cattle market offering health checks for farmers and would provide regular sessions. The Local Government Boundary Commission had not agreed to an increase in divisions and was proposing that Cardington parish join the Corvedale division. Members of the public could make comment upon these proposals. She would organise a chairs and clerks meeting in June to consider parish boundaries which needed to be agreed by this October.

Update on the Parish Council's work to reduce the speed of vehicles through the Parish: A road survey was conducted about 18 months ago after much negotiation with Shropshire Council and a lot of background work was done by the members of the Parish Council. This is still ongoing since the engineer who requested the survey is very unhappy with the report as it bears little relation to what he wanted doing. This has to be rectified but it is not known how long this will take. All the parishes along the B4368 were concerned about the speeding problem and the Council was in contact with them.

Updating The Parish Plan: Cllr Motley suggested that the clerk contact Vicky Turner, Shropshire Council Community Enablement Officer to check if funding is available to renew the plan.

Infrastructure Projects to Include in the Place Plan: There was concern over the lack of drain jetting in the parish. Also, the issue of traffic calming could be added to the Place Plan proposals. This will be added to the agenda for the next meeting.

Open Forum: No members of the public were present.

The clerk will write to the other parishes along the B4368 to inform them that the report on the survey carried out in 2022 will not be published and a request for another study is being investigated by the Shropshire Council traffic engineer.

Flood Action Group: Cllr Martyn said the Bouldon/Peckledy flood gauge has been repaired. He had liaised with a landowner in Bouldon about the collapsed retaining wall affecting the stream. He reported on the responses received to his two recent articles in the Corvedale News

Westhope Village Hall: Cllr Watson confirmed that events were planned at Westhope Village Hall on 7th May 2023, to celebrate the Coronation. Renovation works were progressing: three new exterior doors had been fitted and plumbing works completed.

Diddlebury Village Hall: Cllr Rattu reported that bookings were good and the Zumba classes were very popular. The DVH Committee AGM would take place the following week.

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
