

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Church News



Letter from the Rectory

At the end of this month, we will mark Ascension Day on Thursday 26th May. There will be a service of Holy Communion at Broadstone Chapel at 7:30pm. This is one of relatively few evening services at Broadstone and a good chance to come if you haven't been to a service there before and don't fancy getting up in time for the usual 8:30am Communion service on the third Sunday of the month! The chapel is a Chapel of Ease, there to make it easier for people to go to church without having to face the long walk to the parish church at Munslow. We know relatively little about its history - we know it was there in 1589 and that for much of the 18th century it was used mainly for agricultural purposes, before being restored to its current form in 1844. Approached across a field it can be a really lovely spot on a summer evening, so we hope for fine weather. Do come and join us for what is always a very special service.

As we enjoy the beauty that surrounds us here it can be difficult to comprehend the scale of the events we see reported from Ukraine and we wonder how people can inflict suffering and destruction on others in this way. The diocese of Hereford has partnered with Citizens UK to help make links between people who might be willing to host refugees and the refugees themselves. If you would like to be involved as a host, please let me know and I can send you details of the scheme.

We hope to have a more 'normal' summer in which it's possible to have a variety of events. By the time you read this the Diddlebury Plant Sale will have happened and we'll be turning our thoughts to Saturday 28th May when Sam Oldham, an Olympic Gymnast, is coming to talk about his experiences. The talk will be given in Diddlebury Church and will help us raise funds for the group of churches. We look forward, too, to various events to mark the Jubilee and to summer fêtes later in the year.

Kentish Cake

Another new contributor this month.

Ingredients

175g/6oz sugar 175g/6oz butter 175g/6oz self-raising flour 40g/1.5oz desiccated coconut 40g/1.5oz ground almonds 75g/3oz grated dark chocolate 3 eggs Pinch salt

Method

- 1. Cream the sugar and butter.
- 2. Stir in the coconut, chocolate and ground almonds.
- 3. Add the flour and eggs alternately and give everything a good mix.
- 4. Pour into a 7"/20cm tin and bake at 160°c for approximately 40-45 minutes or until a skewer comes out clean.

Optional: before the cake cools completely, cover the top with 80g of melted chocolate and scatter with flaked almonds.

Funding for farmers and landowners in the Shropshire Hills AONB

Launched last summer, the Farming in Protected Landscapes programme has so far awarded £176,529 to 14 projects in the Shropshire Hills AONB. The grants support one-off farming projects which deliver benefits to nature, climate, people, and place.

The Shropshire Hills AONB Partnership is providing support and administering the programme locally. As we approach the second year of this 3-year funding programme, we are encouraging farmers and landowners in the Shropshire Hills to take a fresh look at the land they own or manage.

Are there areas that are difficult or expensive to farm? Could these spaces be better managed for wildlife? Are there areas suitable for 'slow the flow' measures which help with natural flood management? Could repairs help to conserve an historic site or monument, or are there opportunities to interpret a site of interest and/or encourage appropriate public access?

We would love to see this funding used to deliver large nature, climate, or access projects across several farms, and we are encouraging farmers and landowners to think beyond their boundaries. Example projects might be work to restore an area of upland peatland and manage it extensively with cattle, or habitat creation and management for a specific threatened species.

Looking at your land in a different way can be a daunting task. A good starting point is to make sure you know what you already have in terms of good and potential wildlife habitat, historic monuments, or what public rights of way or watercourses cross your land. We can help with this, or you can access the information yourself on MAGIC maps, an online mapping tool, which highlights priority habitats, Sites of Special Scientific Interest (SSSIs), historic monuments etc

Footpath Maintenance Group

Despite difficulties in getting stock for repairing the footpaths, and difficulties related to the pandemic, in 2021 across the county the various P3 footpath groups amassed over 8000 volunteer hours. Here, in the Corvedale, our local group completed 373 of them!

After a break during December, we started off the year in January adding two stiles to the footpath that runs between Broncroft Lodge Farm and Bouldon, in the field just south of the lane where new fencing had been added circling the field. As you see from the photo, the new stile is set back from the lane. We trimmed the hedge on the other side to make room for a new fingerpost to waymark the continuing



path. We continue to repair the stiles between Heath and Upper Norncote and have added another couple of new steps.

In February, we made a start on repairing the stiles

on the footpath from Munslow to Broncroft Lodge farm, but due to the heavy rain we have had, the water table is too high to dig deep holes in many low-lying fields and we have had to abandon that for the time being. However, we managed to make a start on the dilapidated stile in the corner of the field at Milford Top and replaced the stile frame. In March, we completed the stile and added a flight of steps up the steep bank from the lane. Only minutes after

the chaps had cleared the tools away, a group of lady walkers came along the lane and happily posed for a photo.

We are incredibly lucky to have such a large network of footpaths in our local area and I feel privileged to be able to live in and enjoy our lovely countryside. You may have noticed that



some of our newest stiles have been made 'dog friendly,' however, we can only do this if we have the consent of the landowner. Beautiful as our countryside is, our farmers look after it and must make a living from it, so we should be grateful and respect this aspect by closing gates where necessary and keeping dogs on a lead, most importantly, when there is stock in the fields. At the end of February there was a most regrettable incident near Munslow when a dog running free, in the company of its owner, mauled five lambs and a ewe. Sadly, the animals did not survive. The farmer tells me that he has lost 14 animals this way in the last five-year period. The dog is an animal too, and, clearly, is often predatory, so we do have a responsibility to keep them under control.

This isn't much to ask given the bounty that we share, so enjoy your walking in 2022!


We were reminded about the coffee morning to be held at Lorraine's home Heath House, Munslow on Saturday 7th May at 10.30am in aid of our Local Refuge.

Field and other names that you might know

I have rather changed what I was going to write about this month, as I was greatly inspired by a talk given by Doctor Jayne Carroll from the English Place Name Society at Nottingham University, on the Field Names of Shropshire. Thanks also to David for suggesting this

If you think this is a rather dusty, moth-eaten old subject, think again! It's certainly alive and dynamically producing lots of new research, giving the very origins of our English local heritage a fresh coat of paint.

The reason I say this is that a large proportion of the names that we are likely to encounter comes from the old English language, that is, the tongue the Angles, Jutes, Saxons and others brought from the continent when they arrived after the Roman occupation of Britain finally failed. Three to four hundred years afterwards, England (as it was then becoming known) underwent a massive change. The first settlements of the 'folk' (their word), were rather ephemeral and transitory and shifted and morphed. Later on, in the 800s AD particularly, permanent settlements, which became the precursors of our modern villages, started to form. At the same time some of the field names were created and these have been passed down to us. Of course, not all of the names are from this far-off time, but a goodly number have such ancient origins and studying our field and other names is a direct link back to more than a millennium ago.

It's likely that permanent colonisation in Shropshire was quite late compared to other counties and coincided with this consolidation phase i.e. some names we encounter may be from the earliest times of England as we understand it. Such names are also a wonderful source of English words that otherwise would have been completely lost to us.

Our county is particularly lucky in that in the last century, a man called George Foxall transcribed all the field names for nearly all the parishes in the county onto a series of 'Tithe Apportionment' maps which were made in the middle of the 19th century. If you go into the County Archives in Shrewsbury and ask for the 'Foxall Maps', you are beginning a journey to an ancient place. Today we hear a great deal about 'data', whereas in the past people passed on information by reference to the natural world and the way it had been shaped by the people in it.

Where fields occur, then as now, hedges are present which we might think of as linear woodland containing tree species. It turns out that almost all these species names come from Old English, as does the name hedge itself. If we stand in Hawthorn Leasowe in Wheathill, or move onto Mayblowe pasture (referring to the May blossom), in Cleobury Mortimer, these names we can be sure are

far more than a thousand years old. Other tree names for fields are also common: apple, or hazel, or something more unfamiliar, such as Bannut (Walnut) Meadow in Bitterley or Maple Furlong (Culmington) may delight us.

Two of my favourite ancient field names occur in the former Saxon deer park of Earnstrey on the Corvedale flank of the Brown Clee. Here Thirsty Lawn and Further Lawn are found. This is not the modern use of the word: 'lawn' refers to clearings in wooded hunting country where the animals of the chase were pursued.

Sometime in the middle of the Saxon period, organisation of the land and the people started to appear this made England what it is today and will be in the future. Not only did counties have their origin at this time but so



did 'Hundreds' which were subdivisions of the county. They took their names from a hundred families, each supported by a hide (traditionally reckoned as 120 acres, though this varied). Meeting places within the hundred were often trees, and the thorn tree with its unworldly shape and associations and profusion of spring blossom was a common choice. The name Round Thorn on the Ludlow to Bridgnorth road in Bitterley Parish was such a meeting place. Whilst that thorn is long gone, above is our weird thorn!

You may think it curious that when the English speakers came naming fields and habitations and organising divisions they did not attempt to change any of the topographical names around them, which therefore are likely to be even older, named by the ancient British people. Rivers are a really good example of this. So 'Teme' (coming from the same word-source as Thames), 'Onny' (Onn being an old 'Welsh' name for an ash tree) and 'Corve' were probably already fabulously old when the Saxons first put in an appearance in these parts. I hope you like that thought!

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Corvedale Garden Group

Maesfron Hall and Gardens

A beautiful drive through the rapidly greening spring countryside in and out of the English/Welsh border, took us to Maesfron Hall, near Welshpool. Dr Derek and Mrs Monica Owen couldn't have been more patient as our planned visit in earlier years had been cancelled twice due to lockdown. There was ample parking in a field at the entrance to the property and we all made our way up to the covered terrace where Dr Owen gave us a brief history of the property.

This small Georgian Gentleman's Residence is set on the lower slopes of Moel y Golfa (396 meters). Maesfron means a field on a mountain. The house is set in 6 acres of land and was built by Francis Allen around 1820. He was a local solicitor who had done the Grand Tour and embellished the gardens with a tower folly, chapel and a shell grotto. When he died in 1852, his daughter Mary Grace Allen gained the property. She had been married in middle age to a Liverpool businessman, William Fisher in 1854. They added the service cottages to the property in the 1860s and the two wooden conservatories. Mary died childless in 1893. The distant Canadian relatives who then owned it rented it out until it was sold in 1918. In 1927 JB Pristley used it as the setting for his novel 'Benighted' which was filmed in 1932 as The Old Dark House with Boris Karloff as the mad butler.

After a succession of further owners, the estate was sold and went into a decline, suffering some vandalism. Dr and Mrs Owen bought it in 1993 and have lovingly restored it since. The hillside approach is wooded with a selection of specimen trees, amongst them a Redwood, a Tulip tree, a 4 stemmed Monkey Puzzle all underplanted with spring bulbs. The steep steps down from the covered terrace which overlooks The Long Mountain, lead to a lawned area and a long colourful border. We were delighted to see a stunning purple flowered Foxglove tree, Paulownia Tomentosa, AGM, (also known as the Empress Tree or the Princess Tree), which was named in honour of Anna Pavlovna of Russia. The fragrant large flowers appear before the large leaves which can be 40 centimetres wide. These are very efficient at carbon capture. The tree grows to a spectacular 25 meters, its seeds dispersing so easily it is nominated an invasive species in North America. Interesting fact for a quiz night: the seeds were used by the Chinese in packing porcelain for export to Japan and America in the 19th century before the development of polystyrene.

The border leads round to the hanging garden which is in the process of being redeveloped, leads on to the Shell Grotto. Shell Grottos were popular in the 17th and 18th centuries, as a way to enhance the damp undercroft of larger houses, set up to mimic sea caves. Initially they had quite formal shell patterns, imitating the swirls of the Italian Renaissance, becoming less formal with the onset of the Romantic movement. Although James I is said to have built the first known version at Whitehall Palace in 1624, the earliest examples you can now visit are at Woburn Abbey (1626) and Skipton Castle (1627).

Moving up the hillside the terrace above the grotto features the Tower Folly with colourful stained-glass windows and stone circle on the lawned area beside it. The partly walled kitchen garden already had broad beans growing strongly in it and a host of young plants in the greenhouse waiting for warmer days to plant out. Other features included a rose walk, a tropical garden, and two well restored wooden conservatories. Behind the property it was possible to visit the chapel which held the Owen family bible and the housekeeper's rooms, full of interesting antiques.

We adjourned for refreshments and a sociable hour on the terrace, although sadly the sun didn't break through until later in the day.

Our next visit on **Saturday 21st May** is a great contrast as we will view the Japanese Garden at Tranquillity Haven in Whitton, near Knighton.

Corvedale Book Group

Our Spoons Came from Woolworths by Barbara Comyns

This Virago Modern Classic was written in 1950 about a couple who meet and marry in the 1930s. It is narrated in the first person by Sophia Fairclough who tells the story of her marriage to Charles, an impoverished artist, despite his family's loudly voiced misgivings. She has two completely unexpected pregnancies, Sandro, and Fanny. Sandro spends some of his life living with other members of the family, so although he is fed and clothed; Fanny dies of malnutrition and Sophia nearly dies of scarlet fever. The young couple have extremely limited life-skills or finances, little idea about how to develop a relationship and even less about how to become parents. Sophia recounts her day-to-day existence for the sad and painful eight years as she moved from early adulthood into learning how to be happy in a different relationship. In a way, the book recounts the suppressed flashback to those challenging times; the flashback which resulted from her sharing the story of her earlier life with her friend Helen who went home and cried when she heard it. As a piece of social history, it was fascinating and appalling in turns. As a result, the Book Group members had a 'marmite' reaction to it. Nevertheless, our discussion about the book was far

In the brief introduction by Maggie O'Farrell, who loved the book, she describes her search for information about the author who has another 10 books to her name. Barbara Comyns was born in Warwickshire in 1909 as one of six children, had an invalid mother with a pet monkey and a father who spoiled and frightened the children alternately. As the mother became deaf at 25, the children communicated with her using sign language. Barbara started to write and illustrate stories from an early age. Aspects of the book are autobiographical, as she too lived in a bedsit in London, married an artist at an early age and 'after two children and many troubles, parted amicably.' The description of the wedding and childbirth are particularly vivid and personal. It was useful to be reminded of the lack of options pre–Welfare State.

ranging and as often happens, we went home seeing the

book in a different light.

Despite the lapse of time between then and now, the relationship difficulties are sadly all too familiar. The impact of marriage, pregnancy, and childbirth on a woman's freedom to be herself, to have a voice, or to act independently of her husband without independent financial means, has not changed. Some men, as Charles did, refuse to provide for or help with the child, making Sophia feel that by getting pregnant 'as though I had betrayed him in some way... I had a kind of idea if you controlled your mind and said 'I won't have any babies' very hard, they most likely wouldn't come. I thought that was what was meant by birth control.' Poverty, malnutrition, abortion, illness, death all follow. They are recounted in a matter-of-fact way which conceals the level of emotional distress which must have occurred. In her way Sophia tried to do her best, continuing to fund the family as an artist's model, accepting meals from a man friend so she wouldn't starve (only to find he had another agenda and was grooming her). As someone commented, there was 'a hopeful hopelessness' to each chapter. Sophia did get, though, maturity and skills to hold down a job as a housekeeper, find a new relationship and

The sparse immediacy of the style makes it hard to 'get into' the book, but several people commented that the prose might be better read aloud. Indeed, elements of the book had the flavour of pantomime where the appearance of the mother-in-law could well have been preceded by a boo and a hiss. The book was not without a wry humour as the characters' names indicate Mr. Blunderbuss and Peregrine Narrow both appear. We wondered how it would have been received by the reader in the 1950s as the topics dealt with were about taboo, major life events.

survive in the end

For our May discussion we are reading *Himself* by Jesse **Kidd**, a story set in Ireland about a young man seeking to uncover the secrets of his past.


An Evening with Sam Oldham

A Guide to Shropshire's Churches



It's beginning to feel that things might be getting easier although it's still safer to be sensible. Many of us are wearing masks frequently less and even daring to go out a bit Perhaps more. we have reached the point when we can have a 'normal' day out. And you do not have to go far.

Shropshire Churches Tourism Group has just produced a new, 32-page booklet featuring 100 of the best and most welcoming churches in the county. Each church included is unique, with some dating back a thousand years and more. You will find evidence of Saxon stone work in places like Barrow, the oldest church in the county; Diddlebury has herringbone stonework in its north wall; at Stanton Lacy look at the exterior walls of the building.

Others may be younger but still have a lot to show off. The yew tree in Hope Bagot churchyard is about 1600 years old, so began growing around 400 AD - that's old! The sandstone church at Bromfield is a fascinating site, originally with a monastery, but quickly becoming a Parish Church with lots to see. Building started in Culmington in the early 1300s but was not finished until the spire was completed in 1967!

The front cover of the new brochure features the east window of Whitton church, designed by the Pre-Raphaelite artist, Edward Burne-Jones, and there are more windows in other churches. Read the brochure and you could go on a 'hunt-the-stained-glass-window' outing! Talking of Pre-Raphaelites, you will be stunned by the interior of Jackfield church as these artists were big on tiles, too.

In the middle of the county, you could visit the Greek Orthodox Church on the edge of Shrewsbury or go to one of the oldest Unitarian Churches in the country, in Shrewsbury High Street. Augustus Pugin designed the Houses of Parliament but he also designed the Roman Catholic Cathedral in Shrewsbury.


In the north of the county Whitchurch, which traces its origins back to Roman times, is home to Shropshire's first grand classical church built in 1713. In Oswestry church you can still see evidence of damage from the Civil War of the 1640s. Moreton Corbet is, strangely, only the Church and a ruined castle but both are worth a visit.

You should find the new guide in churches in your area which are members of Shropshire Churches Tourism Group, the picture showing you what you are looking for! You can also view it online at www.discovershropshirechurches.co.uk or pick it up in Tourist Information Centres or some major tourist sites. Make the most of it and this year get to know even more about Shropshire.

MUNSLOW PARISH COUNCIL

Draft Minutes of the meeting of Munslow Parish Council, held on Thursday 7th April 2022

Present: Cllrs Barbara Archer (Chair), David Marston, Ed Povey, Nigel Dobson, Chris Meeson. In Attendance: H Coonick (Clerk/RFO).

Apologies for Absence: Cllrs Val Fotheringham and Antonia Bury, Cllr Motley (Shropshire Council).

Declarations Of Interest: None.

Public Forum: No members of the public in attendance.

Minutes from meeting held on 3rd March 2022 were approved and signed.

Matters Arising: Cllr Marston reported that the broken manhole cover that he had reported to Shropshire Council had now been cordoned off.

Planning Matters: 22/01354/LBC - internal alterations to form an additional staircase, The Swan Inn, Aston Munslow, Craven Arms, Shropshire, SY7 9ER. The Council resolved to not make a comment about this application.

Rowe Lane: Cllr Meeson had received a report of building works that may not have the appropriate planning authorisation. The property is in Stanton Long parish, not Munslow.

Land near The Chains, Munslow: The planning applicant has applied to the Land Registry for adverse possession of the small area at the front of The Chains. It is not clear who owns this land and the Parish Council resolved not to investigate this issue further.

Reports: Chair's Report - Cllr Archer said that she attended the Parish Council Chairs meeting on 24th March which was attended by John Campion, West Mercia Police and Crime Commissioner. He reported that there were 400 more officers now than in 2017. Pippa Mills became the new Chief Constable last September. There are 16 Speed Watch teams across Shropshire. There is a trial of number plate recognition speed cameras that if successful will be rolled out further. John Campion does have a budget for road engineering schemes. He did warn about the increases in fuel theft.

Shropshire Council - Cllr Motley had sent a report which the Clerk read out. The bid for improvements to public transport that Shropshire Council had made to the Department of Transport was not successful. Her team are looking at increasing the services based in libraries.

Beambridge Village Hall - Cllr Dobson reported that the updating of the electrics for the hall had not yet been completed.

Finance: The Annual Accounts and Bank Reconciliation were discussed and agreed. The bank account held £12,451.40 as at 31st March 2022. There are ring-fenced holdings with £7,404.65 of unspent money of which £5,500 has been allocated to speed calming measures in the

forthcoming financial year. Cllr Dobson signed the bank reconciliation. Clerk's pay scale for 2022-2023 - it was resolved that the Clerk will

align with point 10 on the NJC scale which is £11.28 per hour.

Payments - resolved to pay Mr R Lane (Munslow Burial Ground Maintenance) $1/8/21 - 30/11/21 \pm 102.00$.

Highways: The Parish VAS sign has been replaced. Cllr Archer agreed to investigate the new guarantee.

Maintenance and Repairs of Speed Signs: The Clerk has reported both of the faulty Speed Signs to Shropshire Council.

Update on the Joint Parishes Highways Proposals: Cllr Archer will follow up the report from Shropshire Highways. It had been noted that speed measuring tapes had been in place along the length of the B4368 over the last few weeks.

20's Plenty for Us: Cllr Archer reported that she had attend this meeting. It was agreed that this issue would be placed on the Parish Meeting Agenda.

Car Parking Charges Consultation: It was resolved to object strongly to the car parking charges as rural residents have no option but to travel by car into the towns due to the lack of public transport.

Risk Assessment: It was resolved to adopt the risk assessment with the addition of the Vehicle Activated Sign and the defibrillator (once it has been purchased).

Community Governance Review and Parish Boundaries: Cllr Archer will discuss the boundary of the parishes of Munslow and Diddlebury. specifically Aston Top, with Cllr Hedgley, Chair of Diddlebury Parish Council. This issue will be added to the Annual Parish Meeting Agenda.

Arrangements for Jubilee weekend of June 3rd to 6th 2022: The Village Hall Committee is leading in plans for the celebrations.

Update on the Queen's Jubilee Canopy: Cllr Dobson collected the tree from Shropshire Council, and it has been planted at The Deans with a plaque. Cllr Archer will add it to the Queen's Jubilee Canopy Map.

Action Regarding a Defibrillator: Cllr Dobson will discuss an electricity supply for the defibrillator cabinet with The Crown Inn. The Clerk and Cllr Dobson will look at the costs of defibrillators and cabinets and investigate grant-making organisations.

Items for the Next Meeting: Defibrillator costings.

Date of Next Meeting: The Annual Parish and Annual Parish Council Meetings will be at 7.30pm on Thursday 5th May 2022 at Beambridge Village Hall.

Payments to D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) of £45 for Inv 127 and H Coonick (Clerk) reimbursement for stationery, postage and domain registry

The Clerk reported that the Council has re-declared its status with The Pensions Regulator.

Reports from Members: Cllr Motley reported that the bid to the Dept of Transport for improving public transport had not been successful. They have been asked to form an enterprise partnership. There is an aim to increase the services based within libraries.

Cllr Mear reported that the Village Hall committee is continuing to plan the Jubilee events, and is looking for younger members to join the committee. There will be a curry night on 29th April.

Flood Committee: Cllr Byng reported that she will attend a flood committee meeting before the next Parish Council meeting.

Planning Enforcement Update: Cllr Motley agreed to look into this matter.

Community Governance and Boundary Review: Cllr Motley asked the Chair of the Council to discuss this with the bordering councils, put the issue on the Parish Meeting Agenda and encourage parishioners to attend to express their opinions.

Wilde (Interim Head of Highways). Shropshire Council are bringing a lot of Team who have cleared the trees. highways services back in-house which should improve the service.

Risk Assessment: The Risk Assessment was adopted with the addition of risks around the Vehicle Activated Sign being included.

Ownership of the Village Hall: The Clerk and Cllr Byng had met with Cllr Mear (in her role as Village Hall Committee Chair) and Avril Enston (Village Hall Committee Secretary) to look at the documents that they both hold. The Clerk will update the Parish Council contact details that are held by the Land Registry. The Parish Council is Custodian Trustee and the Village Hall Committee is responsible for managing and insuring the Village Hall.

Locked Gates on Bridleway: The Clerk has reported the locked gates to Outdoor Partnerships, Shropshire Council.

Flooding at the Church: Cllr Motley reported that she had met with Andy Trees Overhanging Church Walk: The Clerk contacted the Parish Paths

Road Closure and Informing Residents: Parishioners can join the Geoff Neden Google Group which has updates on road closures.

Plastic Waste at Laundry Works: The Clerk has re-referred the issue to the Environment Agency due to no response since December, as there are continuing concerns about the storage of plastic at the site.

Parish Council Website and Planning: The website is still not updating with planning applications, the Parish Council pay £220 per year for the website hosting. An alternative without planning updates would be free. Cllr Motley will follow this up but, if not successful, the Council will decide whether to cease the contract with Web Orchard and use a free website service.

Thanks: The Council would like to thank Cllr Seabrook for planting the Fallen Tree in Seifton Brook: The Clerk has reported this to the Environment Jubilee Tree in the church yard in Culmington. A commemorative plaque for the tree has been received.

DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL

Summary of the draft Minutes of Diddlebury Parish Council's Meeting held on Wednesday 23rd March 2022 at Westhope Village Hall

Present: Cllr D Hedgley - Chairman, Cllrs A Watson, G Neden, T Pardoe, S Povall.

Apologies were received and accepted from Cllrs R Povall, A Rattu, T O'Boyle, R Morgan.

In attendance: The Clerk, Unitary Cllr Motley and two members of the public.

A Declaration Of Interest was made by Cllr S Povall re planning application 22/00778/OUT and he left the room whilst it was discussed.

Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 23rd February 2022 were approved by councillors and signed by the Chairman.

Matters Arising: It was agreed the Clerk would investigate obtaining warning signs for the two areas of Mill Lane with no pavement to warn drivers of pedestrians using the lane.

Reports: The Chairman reported he has distributed Safe Neighbourhood signs; has investigated breaches of a S.106 restriction on agricultural vehicles using the DVH car park to access fields; has attended a seminar about CIL entitlements, how they are calculated and what projects they can be used for. He has investigated an Enforcement Notice relating to land at Corfton and he has held discussions with Cllr Motley and Mr Eddie West of Shropshire Council about DPC's £11,000 CIL entitlement, which he has been pursuing since 2019. SC will not clarify if this £11,000 is part of a payment of £17,896.83 which DPC is due to receive in April and SC are also refusing to explain to which developments in Diddlebury Parish the £17,896.83 payment relates, so DPC has no way of checking the accuracy of the payment. The Chairman is keen to go to the Shirehall to discuss this whole CIL matter with Mr West but Cllr Motley advised he does not work from the Shirehall: she advised the Chairman to write to Tracey Darke instead.

The Chairman thanked all those who had worked on the Ukraine appeal - which has raised £333 to date.

Unitary Cllr Motley reported on SC's current budget decisions, which include an expansion of library provision and a community organisation to deal with mental health issues. There is no response yet from government to the Transport Bill and in the meantime Arriva wish to scale back the Shrewsbury/Ludlow bus service as it is a loss-making route. She will chase SC's IT department re DPC's website problems with WebOrchard.

Cllr Neden gave the FAG report. He is arranging renewal of the indemnity insurance and requested a donation of £250 from DPC for

the 2022/2023 financial year. He is still chasing the National Flood Forum for a date for the next MAM meeting: he has updated the Flood Response Plan in a few details.

Cllr Watson reported for Westhope Village Hall and advised that the Jubilee celebration arrangements are under way. An appeal has been launched and fund-raising events organised. Grants are being sought to re-roof the village hall.

Planning Applications: 22/00595/FUL - Application for the erection of a farm building to store manure at Honeydene Farm, Mill Lane, Diddlebury. Councillors supported this application. SUDS and FAG require a flood risk assessment.

22/00778/OUT - Outline application for the erection of an agricultural worker's retirement dwelling, to include access, on land at Corfton Farm. Corfton. Councillors supported this application.

Highways: Highways were discussed, in particular the forthcoming series of closures of the B4368 in April. Cllr Watson outlined the chaos which had resulted during the last closure due to a lack of warning signs, diversion signs and Kier staff who did not know in which direction Bridgnorth lay. The Clerk will take this up with Kier.

Communications & Correspondence: Nine items of correspondence were considered including the notification of the £17,896.83 CIL/ Neighbourhood Fund payment. The Chairman suggested the sum could perhaps be put towards resurfacing the DVH car park, re-roofing WVH and obtaining permanent speed indictor devices on the B4368.

Finance: The Finance Report for April 2022 was considered and cheques totalling £724.99 were authorised for payment. The cash book/ bank statement reconciliation was verified. A donation of £250 for the FAG was approved.

Register of Assets: This had been updated by the Clerk and was

Grievance Procedure For Employees: A further draft of the Grievance Procedure was considered, approved and adopted.

AOB: Having had previous experience of civil defence emergency planning, the Chairman is concerned that there has been no information or advice from Shropshire Council about the ramifications of the Ukraine war, especially what precautions households should be taking now in case the war escalates. The Clerk will investigate whether emergency plans are available from SC and Craven Arms Town Council.
