





CHURCH NEWS

LETTER FROM THE RECTORY



The big event at the start of May is clearly the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III. It's 70 years since the last Coronation, so for many of us this will be the first we have ever known. As I write this the full details of the service in Westminster Abbey have yet to be announced, but as I watched the Queen's funeral last year, I was struck by the way in which the crown, orb, and sceptre were taken from her coffin and placed on the altar of St George's Chapel. At the start of the Coronation Service, they will be on the altar in Westminster Abbey before they are given to the King.

All this, along with the readings we heard on the Sunday after Easter about the apostles being told to proclaim the good news about God, prompted me to thoughts about God's call to all of His people. God calls many of us to serve Him in various ways. It is because of God's call that I was ordained as a priest and that I came to the Corvedale, but God calls us to do many different things in various places. What perhaps unites the various calls is that God calls us to lives of service, serving Him and serving others.

Later in the month, on Thursday 18th, we will mark Ascension Day. We remember the risen Christ ascending into heaven and returning to God. Having had Jesus with them for three years or so, the apostles were left to get on with serving God by themselves, without the constant presence of Jesus physically there beside them. Even so, they knew - and we know - that God walks with us through all that we do and all that we experience, strengthening us and helping us as we seek to serve Him. Even with the presence of God alongside us, service can sometimes be hard and can sometimes be lonely. That is why we gather as Christian communities, Sunday by Sunday, to worship, to pray and to strengthen one another. It is also why on the eve of the Coronation, there will be a service of Compline in Munslow Church in which we will pray particularly for our King as he prepares for the next stage in his journey of service. You are welcome to join us at that, or at any of our services.

DAFFODIL DAY AT SPARCHFORD COTTAGE

Jeremy and Val Hardwick would like to thank all those who came to admire the lovely display of daffodils on 19th March, and for their generosity. A total of £470 was raised for the Corvedale Benefice. Thanks to to all those lovely ladies who baked cakes and helped serve teas. Together with the lovely calm weather the whole afternoon was a great success.

ST MICHAEL'S, MUNSLOW

Once every five years the church buildings have a 'Quinquennial Inspection' by an architect. It gives us



a report on the current state of the church building and advises us about works required now and in the future. This spring both Broadstone Chapel and Munslow Church have been inspected. Amongst the things we are advised to do some need specialist contractors, but others are suggested as things that can be done by volunteers. At Munslow these include removing vegetation growth from the French drain and from some of the walls, cutting down ivy growing on the building, clearing water gullies, cleaning/de-rusting/ decorating cast iron floor grills, applying linseed oil to the doors, and helping to clear rubbish from the tower. To start to tackle some of these jobs we are inviting anyone who would like to help to join us for working parties on Saturdays 13th and 27th May and 10th June, starting at 10am. SUMMARY OF PATIENT GROUP MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 4TH APRIL 2023

- Over 200 people attended the meeting of the Patient Group, with over 90 more recording apologies. Membership of the Patient Group is now nearing 400 people. Attendance will be limited in future, so pre-booking of a place at the next meeting will be needed.
- Dr Railton's family commitments mean she needs to give up being a Partner with the Practice at Christmas this year, but she will continue to be a Locum GP for as long as it takes to find a new GP.
- Patients were asked if they could help make the Practice vacancy more attractive, by offering free housing for 6 months, or other in-kind benefits. Please contact the Chair if you are willing and able to offer anything.
- Patients were asked to spread the word of a vacancy at Brown Clee to any Doctors in their family or social circles.
- Shropshire Council and the Shropshire, Telford and Wrekin Integrated Care Board have both pledged to help Brown Clee in its search for new GPs.
- A demountable building will be installed shortly outside the Ditton Priors Surgery, creating two new consulting rooms and a small waiting area. This will replace the current file storage building, and will enable additional services to be offered, e.g., Counsellor or Physiotherapist.
- The Care and Share Pantry, which is sited at Oak Farm, is now open 7 days a week and is being well used. Toiletries are particularly useful, and donations can be made to collecting boxes in the Church porch or the Medical Practice foyer.

A new Group has been formed (BCMP Community Group) to look at all the options available for acquisition of the Practice buildings by local people or a locally based charitable organisation. Patients can apply to become a Member of this Group by emailing: bcmpcommunitygroup@btinternet.com

MUNSLOW PARISH VEHICLE ACTIVATED SIGN (VAS)

Munslow Parish Council has purchased a mobile vehicle activated sign (VAS) with the help of a grant from the Police and Crime Commissioner. It can be moved to specific sites around the parish and is set to notify drivers when they are travelling above the speed limit. As you can see from the picture, at the entrance to Munslow village, this car has reduced its speed to just below the limit as a result of the flashing sign. It is hoped that this will help with reducing the speed of vehicles travelling through the parish. The Parish Council also owns the sign at the eastern entrance to Aston Munslow which was again purchased with the help of a grant from the Police and Crime Commissioner. The VAS at the western entrance to Aston Munslow is owned by Shropshire Council and is beyond repair so will be replaced by them.

CORVEDALE GARDEN GROUP

After a cold and wet Easter week we were very relieved that Saturday 15th April started bright and stayed dry for our visit to Lower House Farm, Sutton, which was hiding in the hills off the Bromyard road out of Tenbury Wells. Luckily, once we were just beyond Sutton, the NGS yellow boards were out to help us find it, up a rough, steep stone track. The views from old farmyard were lovely. The riding stables adjacent were busy and the field near the house was full of sheep and new-born lambs.



The barn to the right of the house had some mossy stone steps, topped with a grimacing lion, leading to the first floor. Entering the garden through a small gate in the hedge the borders under the bay window were filled with forget-menots, cowslips, primulas, and pink, yellow, and orange tulips. Roses were scrambling up the side of the window and up the porch pillars. Other beds were bright with loropetulum, (the pink Chinese witch hazel), purple pittosporum 'Tom Thumb', the pink/orange everlasting wallflower erysimum 'Winter Orchid', blue muscari and yellow and red tulips. The hedge formed a shelter bed from the wind and tucked into the border were two deer made of willow, who probably had watched the squirrels burying and then digging up the hazelnuts as we spotted several half shells scattered on the lawn. Turning a corner there was a small parterre, planted with white tulips.

A path then led into a fruit and vegetable patch with currant bushes and strawberry plants, herbs, and a potting shed. Beyond this was a pretty spring garden with apple and pear trees underplanted with yellow and white daffodils, hyacinths, and beautiful fritillaries in purple and white. The flower beds were home to a colourful metal chicken and a duck. In the corner, a fenced area catered for real chickens who were enjoying their corn and brassica breakfast. Returning to the main garden, a little path led past the water feature to extensive herbaceous beds where a colourful metal peacock warned off other birds. Bees and other pollinators were enjoying foraging on the pulmonaria, lunaria (honesty) and other plants slowly opening out after the earlier warmer days. The garden had several seating areas which we availed ourselves of for tea, scones, and homemade jam, buttered Bara-Brith, and Victoria Sandwich. People chatted in small groups.

After refreshments some of us walked across the field and around the large pond, surrounded by interesting trees and shrubs, more spring bulbs, and bright yellow king cups or marsh marigolds (caltha palustris). The pond surface was scattered with waterlily leaves which will be a very pretty area when the plants flower. Heads of reed mace (typha angustifolia) were white with cottony down, waiting to be blown away to set seed.

If you missed this visit Lower House Farm is open for the National Garden Scheme on 21st May, and 11th June. (Check www.ngs.org.uk before heading out for the day to confirm those dates still hold).

On **Saturday 13th May** we will be heading to **Hurdley Hall** near Churchstoke, SY15 6DY, to see Simon Cain's two-acre garden set around a 17th century house. The garden features include a Coronation meadow, mixed borders, ponds, topiary, a kitchen garden, orchards, and woodlands. Adjacent to the house is the 18-acre Rounton Nature Reserve to explore as well. Cost £10 including refreshments. If you would like to join us, please let me know by Wednesday 3rd May so I can send numbers for catering purposes.

ORGAN MOVEMENTS

PART 1: MUSICAL CHAIRS AT MUNSLOW

We tend to expect churches, and indeed chapels, to have an organ. These may be noble instruments like Ludlow's great Snetzler, or humble harmoniums, but all are a muchloved feature of our places of worship. Readers may be surprised to learn that this has not always been the case, for although before the Reformation most churches had some kind of organ, these were comprehensively destroyed by Puritan fanatics in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. In country parishes like ours in the Corvedale, the Georgian period was the heyday of village bands and singers, and organs only began to return in large numbers during the nineteenth century. However, not all of them have stayed in the same place.

Munslow was most probably the first church in the Corvedale Group to have an organ. When the church was re-pewed in 1840, an organ was shown on the plan in the north-eastern corner of the aisle, and in 1845 the Vestry voted a salary of £2 per year to one Thomas Clifton for 'playing the music'. Unfortunately the church records contain no mention of when the organ was acquired, which suggests that it had been given to the church, possibly by the vicar or by Mr Pemberton of Millichope. Clifton continued to play for five years, and then, in 1853, a Mr J Newnham took over 'conducting the singing'. The wording seems significant, as I am fairly sure that the organ was no longer in church. My reason for saying this is that the detailed plans for the major restoration and re-seating of the church which were drawn up in 1868 show no organ, but do have seats for the choir on the north side of the Chancel. Had the donor removed the instrument in a fit of pique? We shall probably never know.

I do not know when the church acquired its next organ, for again the Vestry Minutes and the Churchwardens' Accounts are silent. As the new instrument was made in 1859, and it is not shown on the 1868 plan, we may assume that it had already been in another church before coming to Munslow. The

organ was placed in the same position as its predecessor, and remained there until the east end of the aisle was converted into a Lady Chapel in the 1980s. It was then moved to the back of the church, where its successor stands today. The instrument was made by Daniel Gray, who operated a factory in Ely Place, Southwark. I believe he was a member of a distinguished family of organ builders in nineteenth century London, but presumably he struck

out on his own when the family firm amalgamated with another business to form Gray and Davison (we shall meet them in connection with Diddlebury next month). He made a similar organ, which was purchased by the chapel of St. Stephen's House, Oxford, in 1984, and where it is still in use.

The closure of so many churches in recent years has seen an increase in the number of church furnishings moving to new homes, and in 2017 Munslow acquired the organ from the redundant church at Dulas in Herefordshire. Munslow's Daniel Gray organ went to Tugford, while Tugford's harmonium found a new home in Broadstone Chapel. Munslow's 'new' organ is in fact something of a treasure in its own right. It was made by John Fincham, an organ builder and pipe maker in London who set up business in 1837. Although he exhibited a small organ at the Great Exhibition in 1851, it seems that he made very few organs which were actually installed in churches. Indeed, the Dulas organ was made for Dulas Court, and was only placed in the church there 50 years later in commemoration of members of the Fielden family of Dulas

Court. Other members the Fincham family emigrated to Melbourne, where they became one of the leading organ builders in Australia. The firm held this position well into the last century. A Fincham organ at Slinfold in West Sussex which installed in 1868 (two years after the Dulas / Munslow instrument), claims to be the only surviving example of his work. Munslow has therefore exchanged comparative

rarity for another. There have, however, been other organ migrations from the Corvedale, and I will deal with these in next month's magazine.



CORVEDALE BOOK GROUP



TREACLE WALKER BY ALAN GARNER



Treacle Walker was nominated for the Booker Prize in 2022. octogenarian Garner lives in medieval Toad Hall at Blackden on Alderley Edge in Cheshire. He has had a lifetime writing for children and adults. His books reflect his interest in myths and legends, philosophy, history, and archaeology. His earlier children's books include The Weirdstone of Brisingamen, The Moon of Gomrath, Elidor, The Owl Service, and Red Shift all of which are woven with fantasy, myth and geography.

He subsequently wrote a novella about four generations of his family who have lived in Cheshire as craftsmen and story tellers since at least the 1500's. He then rewrote three books of British folk tales and several adult novels. The novel Treacle Walker took Garner 8 or 9 years to research and write. It is only 150 pages long and each word and idea has been pared back, almost to abstraction, but continues to reflect Garner's interests in the passage of time, words, rhymes, and legends. A boy, Joe Coppock, appears to have been ill and lives alone in a cottage near a train line, where his daily method of telling the time relates to whether 'Noony' the one-way train has passed. He spends his days reading comics with his good eye, his 'lazy eye' covered with a patch. One morning, he hears the call of a Rag and Bone man, Treacle Walker, outside his window and exchanges an old pair of pyjamas and a lamb's shoulder blade for an old pot and a donkey stone to clean the doorstep and protect the house from unwelcome visitors. The intriguing old man, who talks in strange-seeming rhymes and riddles becomes a mentor to the lonely boy. The exchange of items gives Joe the ability to shift in time and between worlds.

'Treacle' as a word derives from earlier Latin, Greek, Old French, and Middle English to mean a healer. Treacle Walker is trying to heal Joe's vision, not only his outwardly lazy eye but also his inner way of seeing the world. He tries to help Joe grow up, in a way, to learn that 'seeing' the world is not the same as seeing what the world is. Joe visits the optician. His reading of the eye chart leads him to an adventure in the local copse where he looks for the cuckoo, to add an egg to his collection, but instead meets Thin Amron, a bog-man. The book was an interesting read, continuing to reflect Alan Garner's interests of our perception of time and ageing, the weaving of our personal stories with human history in general, and change and repetition.

It was a book which required a great deal of thought and concentration. As a group we reflected on whether it might have made more sense to hear than to read. The writing was poetic, and the book would bear re-reading several times to continue to consider what it meant and what one might learn from it. The group was split in its response. Some people

disliked it or had found it too difficult to read and felt the links to mythology were unknown to them. It had felt frustrating and annoying. Other people enjoyed the language, the three main characters and what it made them think about. None of us found it easy to follow or to understand as a whole. The ideas connected but did not easily flow as a story might generally do. The language used was rich and full of images, and it could be read on many levels. It raised questions but didn't give answers. As with theatre or cinema, this was a book where you had to enter into the author's world and go along with it, trusting and suspending disbelief.

When we meet on **Thursday 11th May at Diddlebury Village Hall at 7.30pm** we will be discussing **Company of Liars by Karen Maitland**. Set in 1348 this is a novel about the plague and its impact on the medieval travellers who journeyed from Melcome on the south coast to the Wash. We will learn about the views and beliefs of the different travellers and whether they survived the pestilence.

MUNSLOW DEFIBRILLATOR

Munslow Parish Council is delighted to report that a defibrillator has been installed in Munslow Square. It is attached to the entrance to The Old School. The defibrillator (AED) and cabinet were donated to the Parish Council by the Henry Angell-James Memorial Trust, whose aim is to buy as many AEDs as possible and to install them across the West Midlands and beyond. Henry Angell-James suffered a fatal cardiac arrest on his regular train journey home from Birmingham to Shrewsbury: he was only 54. The trust was set up in his memory.

There are more than 30,000 cardiac arrests in the UK each year and the overall survival rate is just 1 in 10. Every minute without CPR and defibrillation reduces a victim's survival rate by 7-10%. If an AED is used within 3-5 minutes of a cardiac arrest survival rates will jump from 6% to 74%. The AED cabinet is locked but you will be informed of the code when you contact emergency services and are advised of the nearest AED to your location.

The Memorial Trust relies on donations to be able to provide the AEDs. If you wish to donate please go to the website: www.hajmt.co.uk/donations/hajmt/ where you can donate from as little as £5.





DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL

SUMMARY OF THE DRAFT MINUTES OF DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL'S MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 22ND MARCH 2023 AT WESTHOPE VILLAGE HALL

Present: Cllr D Hedgley - Chairman, Cllrs R Povall, A Watson, T O'Boyle, A Rattu, C Martyn, R Morgan, S Povall, T Pardoe.

In Attendance: The Clerk and four members of the public.

Declarations of Interest: Cllr Watson made a declaration relating to a S137 donation for the Corvedale Tots Group.

Public Involvement Session: Mr Jack Wrigley, developer of the five houses in Bache Mill, attended the meeting, having just had a site meeting with parish council representatives. They had received numerous complaints about the development, involving possible breaches of planning permissions and the inconvenience the site operations were causing local residents, especially in terms of the road being blocked by lorries and appointments missed as a consequence. Three affected residents also attended and all the issues relating to the site were fully aired. Mr Wrigley apologised for the inconvenience caused. It was agreed he will meet the residents and a parish council representative on site in an effort to resolve outstanding problems.

Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 22nd February 2023 were approved by councillors and two matters arising were dealt with.

Reports: The Chairman reported on working with the Clerk concerning the DVH car park works; he had attended the funeral of Mr Peter Drakes; he had spent time with Cllr Martyn and Mr Jack Wrigley considering the complaints received concerning the Bache Mill development and had reviewed all the planning documentation relating to it. He had reviewed and also discussed two other planning applications with councillors and the planning officers.

Flood Action Group: Cllr Martyn said the Bouldon/Peckledy flood gauge is still not working, despite his having reported it three times. He had attended a multi-agency flood action meeting. Contractors had been organised to start work in the Bouldon/Peaton area from 1st July.

Westhope Village Hall: Cllr Watson confirmed that a full schedule of events is planned at Westhope Village Hall on 7th May 2023 to celebrate the Coronation. Her efforts to get wi-fi connected to the village hall had failed due to lack of a broadband signal.

Diddlebury Village Hall: Cllr Rattu said negotiations with Munslow Parish Council about a possible joint Coronation

event at Millichope Park had not succeeded. At present no events are being planned at Diddlebury Village Hall to celebrate the Coronation.

Planning Applications:

23/00605/FUL was an application for alterations to the existing permission 19/03896/FUL - namely for conversion of the former malthouse building from storage to use as a residential dwelling at Delbury Hall, Diddlebury. The parish council made no determination on the application as it was deferred by the applicant: heritage/listed building consent issues needed to be included in the application.

23/01039/FUL for over-boarding at Lower House Farm, Middlehope, came in too late for inclusion at this meeting and will be dealt with on 26th April 2023.

Highways and Environmental Issues: The second Speed Indicator Device has been received and installed by Mr Ian Davies, for which the parish council thanks him. The original one will be returned to the manufacturer for recalibration and maintenance.

Communications & Correspondence: Ten items were considered. Cllr Stephen Povall proposed that Mrs Mary Hall, formerly of Westhope, be nominated by the parish council for the Queen Consort's Voluntary Award, in recognition of her 50 years of service to the Westhope/ Diddlebury community.

Finance Report: A donation of £100 was proposed and approved for the Corvedale Community Tots group to enable them to purchase equipment. The Finance Report for March 2023 was considered. Cheques totalling £4,472.59 were approved for payment. DPC holds a balance of £16,336.15 following payment of the approved cheques. Cllr O'Boyle approved the Clerk's reconciliation between HSBC bank statements and DPC's cash book.

Preparations for the Audit and Annual Return 2022-23:

Councillors considered and approved the revised Register of Assets, the Financial & Strategic Risk Assessment and the Financial Regulations. They also considered whether the council had an effective management and accounting system in place and agreed it did.

Next Meeting: Wednesday 26th April 2023, 7.30pm at Diddlebury Village Hall.

This was dealt with as a delegated matter by the Chair and Clerk and it was decided that it was not necessary to call an extraordinary meeting to consider this application.

23/00631/FUL: Erection of freestanding garden shed, Tudor Cottage Aston Munslow SY7 9ER. This was dealt with as a delegated matter by the Chair and Clerk and it was decided that it was not necessary to call an extraordinary meeting to consider this application.

23/01018/VA: Variation of Condition No. 2 (approved plans) attached to planning permission *20/01195/FUL* dated 28th October 2020, Barn known as Clee View Barn, Munslow. It was agreed to support the application with the proviso that the footpath remains open during the works.

23/01280/TCA: Prune 1no. Yew to clear western edge of building by 1metre within Aston Munslow Conservation Area, White House, Aston Munslow SY7 9ER. No observations would be made.

Update on the installation of a Defibrillator at The School House, Munslow: The Clerk reported that the defibrillator had been installed and is now registered with The Circuit and is emergency-ready. The code for the lock will be given to callers to emergency services within the vicinity of the defibrillator. The Clerk is looking into training for members of the public in the use of the defibrillator.

The Clerk will write a letter of thanks to the Trust and an article for Corvedale News. A table-top sale will be held later in the year to raise funds for the trust.

Litter In The Parish: The high-visibility jackets and litter pickers will be held at the village hall for use by volunteer litter pickers. Parishioners are encouraged to report litter to Shropshire Council via Fix my Street. This matter will be put on the agenda for the next meeting.

Environmental Maintenance: The contractor had reported blocked drains in various areas of the parish and the Clerk would report accordingly to Shropshire Council.

The Council confirmed that the grant from Shropshire Council for Environmental Maintenance for 2022-23 has been spent in accordance with the grant conditions and agreed to apply to Shropshire Council for matched funding for 2023-24 of £500.

Beambridge Club Room Lease: The Club Room Committee had signed an interim licence while the Millichope Foundation drew up a new lease. Once the new lease was available the Club Room Committee would consider whom to approach to act as Custodian Trustee(s). The Parish Council would act as Custodian Trustee if required.

Expenditure for the Coronation: It was agreed that the Council would donate £3 per head with an upper limit of £150 to the Women's Institute to assist with the provision of food for the Coronation event at the Club Room.

Plaque for the Washwell, Aston Munslow: Consideration was deferred to the next meeting.

Correspondence: Climate & Ecology Bill: Councillors had had difficulty accessing the documents and consideration was deferred to the next meeting.

Highways: The Mobile Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS) had been installed by Cllr Dobson in Munslow and was already affecting traffic positively entering the village. The Clerk would write an article for the Corvedale News.

Update on the B4368 Traffic Calming Report by Shropshire Council: The Clerk had written to the senior traffic engineer and informed Cllr Motley of the lack of a report from the survey carried out by Shropshire Council in Spring 2022.

Update on Application for Funding for 2nd Vehicle Activated Sign and Powers to Purchase a Vehicle Activated Sign: The Police and Crime Commissioner is considering the application made for funding for a second sign. SALC will advise the Council on the legal powers to purchase a sign in the next few weeks. The Clerk will remind Shropshire Council of the request to erect a post for the Vehicle Activated Sign if the application is successful.

Update on Environment Agency Visit to Three Counties Reclamation, The Laundry, Seifton: A report from the Environment Agency, which included a statement by Shropshire Fire and Rescue Service, had been received by the Council. The Fire and Rescue Service were satisfied with the fire alert and fire prevention measure in place. The Environment Officer reported that he was now satisfied with the storage, drainage and dust at the site. Members of the public with concerns can report issues directly to the Environment Agency on the incident hotline 0800 80 70 60.

Environmental Maintenance Grant & Grant Application for 2023-24: The Council confirmed that the grant for 2022-23 was spent in accordance with the guidelines and agreed that an application be made to Shropshire Council for matched funding of £1,000 for 2023-24.

Desilting Seifton Brook in Summer 2023: The Council will review the level of silt in the brook during the early Summer and reassess the need for desilting.

Action on speeding vans and use of verges on Seifton Lane: Seifton Lane has the national speed limit of 60mph so there is little that the Parish Council can do to reduce the speed of vehicles or prevent damage to the verges.

Correspondence: Jack Nuttall, who owns the land opposite the village hall, wished to update the Parish Council on his plans for the site. It was agreed that the Clerk would write to Mr Nuttall informing him that the council would not support any development except affordable housing within the parish as it is in 'Open Countryside.'

Reports from Members:
