

LETTER FROM THE RECTORY

In July we remember several saints amongst them, on 15th July, St Swithun, the 9th century bishop of Winchester, famous now in connection with the weather. He had asked to be buried simply, outside his cathedral, and this wish was granted when he died in 862. However, when a larger cathedral was built just over 100 years later, Swithun's remains were moved inside, despite dire warnings that moving his bones would cause terrible storms. Legend tells us that forty days of rain followed, and, after the year we have had so far, we certainly know what that looks like! As I write this it is difficult to believe that July is on its way: it has rained for much of the day and it's still surprisingly chilly. Only the fact that it stays light so late reminds us that we really are in the summer months.

Whatever the weather, however, summer is here, and we have a variety of events taking place in the churches over the next few months. **Saturday 6th July** sees the Fête and Dog Show at Diddlebury, whilst on **Monday 8th** the Corvedale Choir will be giving their concert in Diddlebury Church, where there will be a warm welcome, whatever the weather may be doing outside.

As a councillor representing your community, you will help to keep it a great place to live and work. Councillors

individually, can and should be very different in their skills base, experience and work status, all of which contribute to a good and balanced representation of the parish. The ability to take the initiative, be creative and have time to give to the role are all very important aspects of being a good councillor.

You will need to attend ten parish council meetings a year with occasional additional meetings to look at urgent matters such as planning applications. You will need to set aside an additional few hours per month to read material before a meeting or attend training etc.

CARING FOR GOD'S ACRE



THE MONTH OF JULY

So what am I going to write about for your July Magazine? My first idea was to see what the poets might have had to say about the seventh month. The answer was – nothing! Lots for May and June and August and even September, but not a verse could I find for July.

So what next for this month? Being a religious journalist, saints sprang to mind. St Swithun, I have written about before, leaving this earth in 862 and buried in Winchester Cathedral. And even today we worry if it rains on his feast day! Other noteworthy saints (or people we have heard of!) include St Mary Magdalene on the 22nd. Often depicted clutching a pot of ointment, her cult began with fervour in the 8th century. In England she was so popular that at least 187 ancient churches are dedicated to her (three in the Shropshire Churches Tourism Group have her name). The 25th is the feast day of St James, very famous today for his home in Santiago de Compostela in Northern Spain, which is now a popular pilgrim destination. The following day is the feast of St Anne, the mother of Mary the mother of Jesus. Very few churches are dedicated to her – no idea why.

So what next for July? I started looking in some history books. We have on the bookshelves a very large and heavy book called *CHRONICLE* of the 20th Century (that's how it's written). All sorts of things happened in July, although most of the stories from all over the world are probably long forgotten. However, here are a few that might still resonate. In July 1901 Rudyard Kipling spoke out against the Boer War: 'We have 40 million reasons for our failure but not one

excuse'. He could be saying that today, I think. On a lighter note Picasso ventured into Cubism in 1907 and Baden-Powell started the Scout Movement with just twenty-one boys. Back to war: a young Serbian opened fire in Sarajevo; the first shots of World War I. In 1925 the Scopes 'Monkey' trial came to an end, with John Scopes' conviction for teaching evolution. It was a week after the publication of Mein Kampf! Eighty years ago the Allies were advancing after their June arrival in Normandy. In 1948 (the year George Orwell wrote '1984') the Olympics were taking place in London, an event we repeated in 2012. I got quite absorbed in all these happenings.

By the time you read this, you will probably have made up your mind about what you might do to get July 2024 off to a start. Yes, 4th July will be a big celebration in the USA as they celebrate their independence from Great Britain. Meanwhile, we will all be trotting off to the local school or village hall to cast our votes in the General Election. The election will be exciting for me as my son is a candidate (not locally, though), but it's a new experience for me, never mind whether he gets elected or not. What I want is peace and love but maybe that's the old hippie coming out. Do not forget to vote if you do not have a postal one. We owe it to all those who fought for our democracy, not least because I am writing this on the anniversary of D-Day.

CORVEDALE GARDEN GROUP 🕏

EYTON HALL, EYTON UPON THE WEALD MOORS

The sun shone for our visit to Eyton Hall where Head Gardener Ann Holland, and the owner, Katherine Moynes, were so welcoming and informative about the garden which they have loved developing since 2017. It was a fascinating visit.

Potted History: Eyton Hall has a fascinating history, where its owners have participated in many eras of British history. A manor at Eyton was listed in the Domesday book (1087). It is situated northwest of Telford to the right of the Whitchurch road, in the area of the Weald Moors. The Eyton family, one of the earliest landed families in Shropshire, with their tenants, began to clear the Moors as early as 1232. Catherine Eyton founded the small Saint Catherine's church in 1336, to celebrate her husband Robert's safe return from the crusades. In 1579 Thomas Eyton constructed the Black Dyke, which separated Eyton from the parish of Preston. The family had to leave their home in the aftermath of the Civil War when Thomas Eyton had to pay £976 for supporting the monarchy. Eyton was captured in a surprise attack in 1644.

The current hall is a much-altered 18th century farmhouse, with a central house, two side wings and two further canted bow wings. This became the family home in 1816 when they moved to the country from Wellington. A galleried museum wing was created to house some of the most extensive, private collections of TC Eyton, a distinguished naturalist, author, and a close friend of Charles Darwin. He published a History of the rarer British birds in 1836. He was also known as the father of Shropshire cricket. His cousin, Reverend Robert Eyton, was a noted historian who wrote the Antiquities of Shropshire (ref. www:wellingtonla21.org. uk). The history continues, but I need space to write about the garden

We met in the village hall car park and made our way to the extensive drive, in front of the Georgian house, to view the cypress trees in the centre, the long border outside the walled garden and the well pruned ancient wisteria. From there, Ann took us into the walled garden, which has been renovated with large double perennial beds, restored sunken garden, glass house, an elderly mulberry tree, many espaliered fruit trees and an internal colourful parterre. In addition to roses and beautiful peonies we were very struck by the black Dianthus 'Sooty',

a Lochroma Andean Snow White. There was also a pollarded Paulonia (Foxglove



tree), sister to a full size one in the woodland. From there we walked on to see the recently established pond, pretty with candelabra primula. Crossing the extensive south lawn and admiring the cows beyond the ha-ha, Ann pointed out the newly built folly at the end of the restored oxbow lake which she is currently planting for visitors next season. In the woods we admired huge swathes of foxgloves and woodland plants as the understorey to some magnificent trees. We had missed the annual February snowdrop walk but the swathes where they had been, looked extensive. Back to sit on the terrace for tea and mulberry Victoria sandwich, then the agonies of which plant to buy. This garden is open under the Shropshire Historic Churches Trust or see The Gardens at Eyton Hall on Facebook and Instagram.



CORVEDALE BOOK GROUP

UNSETTLED GROUND BY CLAIRE FULLER





In Unsettled Ground, Claire Fuller describes how middle-aged twins, Jeanie and Julius, have lived with their mother, Dot, in a run-down cottage in rural isolation since their father died in a farming accident when they were 12 years old, thirty-eight years previously. They lived hand to mouth, earning little money, growing vegetables in the garden, no television and with little contact with the outside modern world. Jeanie has a heart condition following a bout of rheumatic fever as a child. She had little schooling, was unable to leave home, and Julius had to stay to help care for her. Dot dies at the beginning of the book, and we learn the impact this has on the twins and how they struggle to cope with all that is expected of them subsequently, with particular insight into how Jeanie copes. They've been led to believe, by Dot, that their father died because Spencer Rawson, the landowner, and their landlord, didn't fix the king pins on the tractor properly and believed he was the cause of their father's death.

They learn that they owe money. Mrs. Rawson tells Jeanie that they owe £2,000 in rent arrears. The twins had been told that the cottage was rent free as compensation for their father's death. Dot's funeral will cost a lot of money. Dot had borrowed from Stu, Dot's friend Bridget's husband and they owe the local market gardener for money advanced on the vegetables they supplied to him. Things go from bad to worse: they are evicted from their cottage and learn of many other things that their mother had lied about or hidden from them. Julius finds them a filthy, smelly caravan. She becomes homeless, while Julius has an affair with a local woman. Bridget, Dot's friend, attempts to help, and does help and advise Jeanie, but Jeanie is stubborn and proud, hates asking for help and sees Bridget as a nosy parker. Jeanie cannot read or write, which compounds her inability to cope in the modern world and its technology.

Most people thoroughly enjoyed the book and empathized with Jeanie's efforts to cope as her world falls apart with a sense of hopelessness as she reaches rock bottom. Even her beloved dog has disappeared. But she stubbornly carries on trying to survive amongst the chaos. There was much discussion of all the various issues raised in the story, not least about Dot and how and why she would do this to her children. Depressed following her husband's death? Anxiety about her own future and being left alone? Or was

she merely selfish? As with many other issues, the reader is left to speculate. There is much detail in the book and the various characters are fascinating as individuals. Whilst most were extremely moved by the twins' plight, there were moments of joy. One of their pleasures was to sing and make music, Julius on the fiddle and Jeanie on the guitar. They sang and played well, and this was recognised at Dot's 'wake' and gained them some respect from the community. Also apparent was, the twins' love for each other. Jeanie became angry when Julius let her down, but always forgave him and blamed herself. As for the 'secrets' that were kept from them, there are inevitably some between parents and children, but in Unsettled Ground, these are extreme. There is positive resolution at the end of the novel, and I particularly enjoyed Jeanie's journey as she grew and developed as a person. However, we do not really find out how she felt about her mother in retrospect having discovered how she misled them, and the biggest secret of all, that Jeanie did not, in fact, have a heart condition. Unsettled Ground is well worth a read. It is a powerful novel about betrayal and resilience, love, and survival.

BATHING THE BABY

Bath the baby, certainly, but don't forget the ancestors!

This month's ranting was sparked by a visit to the Celtic northwest of Britain, the remarkable island of Iona. Celtic and northern European culture, which so dominated the culture here and in other parts of West Britain, was animalistic, believing animals and plants had spirits, quite distinct from their bodies... let's call them 'souls'. 'Ask the beast and it will teach thee, and the birds of heaven and they will tell thee' Job 12:7.

The ancient Greek philosopher Aristotle believed that our bodies lived within our souls, massively different from what we may believe today and certainly what was believed in the Middle Ages. Then, the soul was assumed to reside inside the body, being released on death. Let's call Aristotle's idea the 'soul containing body'. Some believe today that soul moulds body: let's call that a 'soul shaping body'. A crazy idea? Well, hang on a bit.

René Descartes and his followers started a new trend in thought. In the Middle Ages people had never questioned that this was God's world and this idea extended towards nature, earth, sea and sky, and no doubt the whole cosmos.

R.D. begged to differ. His was the dream of a mechanical world governed by 'laws' of nature. It turns out that even



before his time in the 17th century the mechanical view of the world had been creeping up on us. Yes, God had started the world off, but he was now resting on his laurels. Perhaps the rot set in with the clock. Previously, time had been measured in seasons and days and cycles and that sort of thing. What a shock to the system when it could be measured by some

monstrous clockwork thing, like the mediaeval clock in Wells Cathedral.

This mechanical view really hadn't changed much by the time that most of us were at school. We were told that matter was composed of atoms like billiard balls; the nucleus like a sun, the electrons like planets. Do you remember? This mechanistic assumption works well for technology and for the science that it has bent to its will, but not for people.

We look around us today, walk through countryside, town, and city. In an often troubled world we know the world (more or less) and we can control it, subjugate it: we just have to get nature to follow our rules.

I wonder how many of us continue to believe this stuff. The tragedy is that this suffocating narrow clockworkism has penetrated our societies, just like 'Blackpool' through a stick of rock.

Let's go back to the soul and body argument We start our lives as a single cell, we multiply, differentiate, migrate, and within a few weeks form a recognisable being. As far as I know nobody, be they biochemist, zoologist, geneticist or even embryologist can explain this miracle. Would Aristotle be surprised? I wonder. Anyone who's held a new-born baby would know that their souls had mingled. This is not provable, this is not disprovable, but we know it. Bizarrely, it would probably seem eminently reasonable to a new generation of quantum physicists who have such a gift for explaining their astonishment and wonder to us ordinary mortals. It seems to open such possibilities to understand ourselves – it turns this new pure science into philosophy. It's currency is colossal, energetic, and resonant forces, universes and dimensions.

It is really only in the western world and in recent centuries that we have got stuck in cloying narrowness. Our ancestors worked, danced, sang and storified together: now we do it only by proxy through speakers and headphones and power tools. Yet our soul-forming bodies are still there.... a direct link to our ancestors.

If you are in touch with children under the age of 10, ask them: they understand and take for granted the universe before (dare to say it? I will) it gets educated out of them!

Today we seem to have thrown away the baby – but look how useful the bathwater is; couldn't do without it!

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

The meeting held on 13th June welcomed speaker for the evening, Graham Short, who came from Birmingham to tell everyone about his role as a celebrated Micro Artist. Graham's talk was entitled, Hands of Genius - and that is no understatement! As an engraver, Graham initially explained his modus operandi in terms of the time he works – between midnight and 5am in order to avoid vibration from passing traffic - the elements he takes (magnesium and potassium) plus beta blockers to lower his heart rate to twenty beats per minute and his use of a stethoscope to monitor his heart. All of these preparations are required to enable him to perform the very delicate job of engraving complex designs and texts on often exceedingly small items with exceptionally fine needles - between heartbeats! He also explained that every three months he attends a clinic and undertakes a course of Botox injections into his eyelids to ensure there is no distraction from eye nerves and muscles while he works.

Graham's presentation was littered with amusing tales about celebrities he has met and worked with during his career, such as Ronnie Barker who, for example, wanted to buy his paperclip with the head of Shakespeare engraved on disc within it; Neil Armstrong; Uri Geller; Stephen Fry; Kim Kardashian; the current national Poet Laureate Simon Armitage (2019 - 2029); Simon Rattle, former music director of the London Symphony Orchestra and the Royal Family during his thirty-year role as Chief Engraver for royal palaces and castles. To give other examples of Graham's amazing skill, he engraved a portrait of Queen Elizabeth II on a small disc in the eye of a needle and in 2023, he completed his 'signature piece' – the one he wants to be remembered for: his exquisite engraving of 'The Lord's Prayer' on a speck of gold inside the eye of a needle, which earned him international recognition as the world's leading micro-engraver. It really sounds impossible, but clearly is possible with the right preparation and his extraordinary skill! Our competitions at the meeting were: 'the best flower from a member's garden' and 'the most interesting / unusual item beginning with the letter 'M.' The winners were: Annie Jones in 1st place for both competitions with her peach-leafed Bellflower and 'Mouse' - well done Annie! In 2nd place for the flower was Sue Parker with her pink rose and in 3rd place Joyce Randle with her peony. In 2nd place for the item was Eileen Pritchard with a mop and in 3rd place Jennette Arnold with a packet of Maltesers! Well done everyone!

The next meeting will be held on **Thursday, 11th July** at 7:30pm with speaker Claire Tatler, who will offer her talk *Gardening in Historic Places*: a look behind the scenes and the horticultural decisions made by professional gardeners. Using real life experiences, Claire will take us through the key drivers behind how professional gardeners make their decisions and the, often surprising and funny, compromises that have to be made!

As usual, we look forward to seeing our members, any visiting members from other branches and to welcoming members' guests, any prospective members and indeed anyone interested in hearing our speaker. Members and prospective members are welcomed free of charge; for anyone else an entrance fee of £5 would be much appreciated towards the cost of the evening's entertainment, with refreshments and biscuits to follow.

SWEET POTATO AND BACON FRITTATA

Recipe from Ian Davies • Prep 15 mins • Serves 2

INGREDIENTS

1 sweet potato
1 red onion
50g smoked bacon
25g butter
3 large eggs
chopped parsley
handful cheddar cheese
salt & pepper

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Peel the sweet potato and chop into very small dice.
- 2. Finely dice the smoked bacon.
- 3. Melt a thick slice (about 25g) of butter in a small, shallow-sided pan. Fry the bacon in the pan for a couple of minutes, then keeping the heat quite low, add the sweet potato and cook for 7-10 minutes, until golden.
- 4. Preheat the grill. Peel and finely dice red onion, then add it to the potato and continue cooking until it has softened about 3-4 minutes.
- 5. Chop a handful of parsley and stir it in.
- 6. Beat the eggs, lightly seasoned with salt and pepper, then pour over the potato and onion mixture. Once the egg starts to set add the grated cheddar. Then transfer to the grill to finish off cooking.

Serve with a green salad.

Present: Clirs Barbara Archer (Chair), Ed Povey, Nigel Dobson, Val Fotheringham, Chris Meeson, two members of the public and H Coonick (Clerk/RFO).

Cllr Barbara Archer welcomed everyone to the meeting.

Apologies for Absence: Cllr Motley (Shropshire Council).

Notice convening the Meeting: In accordance with Statute, the notice convening the meeting had been duly published on the Council's notice boards and website.

Annual Reports: Chair's Report - Cllr Archer said: 'It has, once again, been a busy year for the council and I would like to take this opportunity to thank a number of people who work both on the

council and behind the scenes. Thanks to Antonia Bury, who has served on our council for a number of years but is now stepping down from the post. Thank you to Cllr Motley and all our Councillors for their continuing help and support. Thanks to God's Acre, Richard Lane, and the Commonwealth Graves Commission for the upkeep of our closed churchyard. The Parish Council do get a grant from Shropshire Council for Environmental Maintenance, which we match. This enables us to contract Dave Lewis, our lengthsman, who clears ditches and cuts back undergrowth on our side roads. Also thank you to the footpath group who have given us money which will be spent on appropriate items relating to footpaths.

As you are aware we now have two mobile Vehicle Activated Signs for use in the parish and thanks to the Police and Crime Commissioner we have just been given another grant which will enable us to buy another sign. We continue to push Shropshire Council to reduce the speed of traffic along the B4368.

During the year we have dealt with a number of planning applications and maintained the defibrillator in Munslow.

We have two councillor vacancies advertised and we will co-opt if there is no election called. So, we look forward to some new members of the Parish Council. Please note that all your parish councillors are volunteers and we do consider seriously all that comes before us. We also remind you that each council meeting has a short public session at the start which you can come along to, just for interest or to bring concerns about something that is on the agenda that month. The agenda is always posted on the website and on our local notice boards. This is the final year before the election of all the Councillors in May 2025.'

Beambridge Village Hall Committee - Cllr Dobson reported that the committee needed new members and a new chair as Mr Alan Golden had moved away. The Council would like to thank him for his time on the committee.

Shropshire Council - Cllr Motley had sent her apologies.

Parish Council's work to reduce the speed of vehicles through the Parish: Cllr Povey said that the Shropshire Council report, instigated by the Parish Council, made proposals around buffer zones between the villages. There was still concern about the lack of speed restrictions in Beambridge and in the section of the B4368 near the Seven Stars pub. Due to Shropshire Council's budget restraints it was unlikely that the changes proposed by the report would be implemented in the near future, so any improvements were likely to be dependent upon the Parish Council.

Infrastructure Projects to include in the Place Plan: A defibrillator site in Aston Munslow: Cllr Archer will investigate possible sites.

Open Forum: Issues raised a. concerns about amendments to planning applications after they had been agreed and the Parish Council was not consulted on them b. support for another defibrillator c. satisfaction with the effects of the mobile Vehicle Activated Devices, but there was still concern about the speed of traffic when they were not present.

Next Meeting: Thursday 6th June 2024 at Munslow Village Hall, starting at 7.30pm. Members of the public are welcome.

Appointment of Representatives: Munslow Village Hall – Cllr Dobson (Cllr Dobson requested that the 'Beambridge Club Room' should now be referred to as Munslow Village Hall as this was the name used on the Charity Register). South Shropshire Area Committee – Cllrs Archer and Meeson.

Standing Orders, Financial Regulations, Code of Conduct and Risk Assessment: The the Standing Orders, Code of Conduct and Risk Assessments were adopted and the new Financial Regulations would be considered at the next meeting.

Dates of the Ordinary Meetings for the forthcoming year: these would be: 6th June, 4th July, no meeting in August, 5th September, 3rd October, 7th November, 5th December, no meeting in January, 6th February 2025, 6th March, and 3rd April. The Annual Meetings would be on 8th May. They will all be at Munslow Village Hall, starting at 7.30pm.

Items raised at the Annual Parish Meeting (including Infrastructure Projects for the Place Plan): a. Defibrillator (a site needed to be identified before entry to the plan) b. more Vehicle Activated Signs: the Council now had the funding for a further sign c. buffer zones between the present speed limits: this had been submitted to the Place Plan for inclusion but was not presently included in the plan. The Clerk would contact the Place Plan Officer to ensure that this was entered into the plan.

Highways: A grant has been received from the Police and Crime Commissioner which will be matched by funds from the Parish Council for further Vehicle Activated Signs. The decision on expenditure was deferred to the next meeting.

The council could confirm that it had spent the grant from the Police and Crime Commissioner in accordance with the grant conditions.

Planning: 24/01174/FUL- Erection of two storey extension following removal of existing single storey, conversion of attached barn with extended roof alterations to form car port, boundary alterations to create vehicular access and addition of ground mounted solar panels at Rowe Farm, Rowe Lane, Stanton Long, Much Wenlock, Shropshire: It was resolved to make the following representation to Shropshire Council Planning Portal: 'At the Munslow Parish Council meeting the 9th May 2024 the council decided that there was not enough information on the application on the position of the solar panels or their visibility from the footpath and the visual impact of the scheme as a whole particularly as this development is in the National Landscape (AONB) area.

Finance: The Annual Report and Asset Register was adopted. Mr Kevin Adams (internal auditor) stated that in his opinion the controls in place were sufficient for the Council's purposes during 2023-24.

The Annual Governance Statement was agreed and signed.

The Annual Accounting Statement recorded that during 2023-24 the council had received a precept of £5,633 and £2,206 other receipts. Expenditure on staff costs was £3,071 and other payments of £5,858 producing a carry forward into 2024-25 of £10,125. The fixed assets stood at £15,396 at cost value rather than replacement value. The Statement was approved and signed

The Council confirmed that it did not have income or expenditure in excess of £25,000 and met the qualifying criteria for an Exemption Certificate in 2023-24. An appropriate certificate was signed.

The dates for the Notice of Public Rights were agreed to be from 1st July to the 9th August 2024. The Exemption Certificate, Annual Internal Audit Report, Annual Governance Statement, Accounting Statements, Analysis of Variances, bank reconciliation and the Notice of the period for the exercise of public rights would be published on the web. It was agreed to increase the hourly rate for the Environmental Maintenance contractor to £18.00.

There being no further business the meeting closed at 19:54.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

Present: Cllrs Price, Yarwood, Hartley, Lewis; Cllr Motley (Shropshire Council); Clerk: W. Richards and one member of the public.

Public Involvement: None.

Declarations Of Interest: None.

Minutes of the meeting held on 1st March 2024 were read by the Chair and approved as being correct.

Reports from the Parish Council and Members: The Village Hall is looking at repairs and the urgent need for a mirror. Cllr Motley's report: Shropshire Council has a £62m deficit, primarily due to higher interest rates, social care costs (including 739 children in care), and the elderly, healthcare costs from Covid and greater demand for children's mental health care. The acute care system has been in special measures for seven years. 75% of the budget

is used for social care. Staff numbers are being reduced and they are moving out of Shirehall. They have funding in for Climate Change, the Environment and Transport which has been used for the Biochar plant. There are now 300 electric car chargers available and the Council is looking at village hall installations. The Local Enterprise Partnership has been rebranded as Shropshire Economic Partnership. Village halls can often use the UK Shared Prosperity Fund and the Rural Prosperity Fund. The removal of analogue phones is imminent. Housing in rural areas is very restricted as Open Countryside only allows single plot affordable housing, but there are proposals for affordable homes, where two or three houses may be built together in a settlement. Bungalows are needed to house the local elderly so they can remain in the area. Proposals have been made for schools to have Special Educational Needs departments rather than children having to travel to Shrewsbury.

Finance: Payment of the SALC membership fee of £148.41and £40.00 for the Information Commissioner were agreed. The Marquee has six bookings so far for 2024 (£75 a time from March).

Clerk's wages: the rate will remain at £15/hour, one hour a week.

Highway Maintenance Grant: The Clerk has applied for £1500 which needs to be match funded. This can be used for more ditching works.

Highway Issues: There had been reports of operatives' poor use of tarmac, rudeness, and inconsiderate closures/blocking of access for businesses. The Clerk would send images to Andy Wilde and Andrew Keyland. The Masseys Bank drain was still blocked, and the road at Lower Earnstrey Farm was very rough. Some notice boards need renewal or maintenance; Thanks were given to Cllr Hartley for Holdgate.

Correspondence: There would be a six week consultation on proposals to introduce an annual subscription fee of £52 for collection of garden waste, which would end on 20th May. Road closures were listed on the website. The School Library service consultation was open. The Hospitals Transformation Programmes continues its roadshows: details of dates and venues would go on the website. The planning update for the proposed barn conversion adj. 4 Brookhampton, Holdgate was discussed.

Item for consideration at the next meeting: HMO

Date of next meeting: The next meeting would be on 8th August 2024. There being no further business the meeting closed at 20:57

Minutes of the Annual Parish and Annual Parish Council meetings held on 7th May 2024 were approved and signed.

Community Governance and Boundary Review: The Clerk had received a reply from Diddlebury Parish Council on 16th May stating that the email about Seifton Batch would be passed to Cllr Povall to respond. Nothing further had been received. The Clerk would write to Shropshire Council informing them of the proposed boundary changes except the unresolved boundary at Seifton Batch.

Reports from Members: Shropshire Council - Cllr Motley reported

that the Council Social Care department was being assessed by the Care Quality Commission. There was a meeting regarding the Community Governance Review the following week when she hoped to find out the timescale for changes to Parish Boundaries.

Village Hall Committee – Cllr Mear said the AGM had been held on the 14th May and, sadly, some people had stood down. They had, however, welcomed some new people onto the committee. The main focus for the year ahead would be the plans for the new storage and bar, and marketing and promotion. The Beefy Boys afternoon had been very successful with lots of families attending. There would be D-Day celebrations on 6th June when the beacon would be lit.

 ${\it Flood\ Action\ Group}$ – Cllr Byng reported that there had not been a recent meeting.

Highways: Shropshire Council had replaced the post for the Speed Indicator Device with a larger one and the Clerk had now ordered the new sign which would be installed towards the end of July.

Following a site visit by Cllr Turley, Cllr Steele, the Clerk and the contractor there had been further discussions on the effectiveness of desilting Seifton Brook. It was agreed not to desilt the brook this year. An open-ended licence for future desilting had been requested from Shropshire Council. The contractor would be informed that work would not be required this year and a payment of £100 for his assessment would be made.

Cllr Motley reported that repairs to the manhole cover on Seifton Lane were on Shropshire Council's list for repair but there was no set timescale. The Clerk would request an inspection report from Shropshire Council.

A parishioner had reported the poor surface on the entrance to the ford on Seifton Lane and had been advised to report it on Fix My Street.

The Rights of Way officer for Shropshire Council (SC) had informed the Clerk that there were several issues on the footpath and bridleway, some of which would be addressed by the SC. Further issues were the responsibility of the landowner. He planned to revisit the site in the near future. Works to be undertaken by SC had been delayed due to staffing issues.

Councillors considered an Affordable Housing Local Connection Criteria request and confirmed that the applicant fulfilled the criteria. The Clerk would write to the applicant stating that the Parish Council confirmed that they met the criteria for a Local Connection.

Planning: (Cllr Byng left the meeting) 24/01651/FUL Removal of rendering to the south side of the church tower and re-render, repair and restore stonework and pointing; new rendering of north, west and east elevations of tower to match south side, All Saints

Church, Culmington, SY8 2DB. The application was supported. Cllr Byng returned to the meeting.

Emergency Officer Role: Cllr Mear reported that the issue was on the agenda for the next meeting of the Village Hall Committee. She would report back to the next Council meeting.

Finance: The new Financial Regulations and Internal Controls were adopted.

In Attendance: The Clerk, Shropshire Councillor C Motley and one member of the public.

At the Annual Parish Meeting reports were received from the Chairman, Shropshire Cllr Motley, Cllr Martyn for the Flood Action Group, Cllr O'Boyle for the Louisa Powell Almshouse Charity, Cllr Martyn as Website Manager, Cllr S Povall for Diddlebury Village Hall and Mrs K Worthington for Westhope Village Hall.

Appointment of Chairman and Vice Chairman: At the parish council meeting which followed the Annual Parish Meeting, Cllr David Hedgley was appointed Chairman for 2024-2025 and Cllr Robert Povall was appointed Vice-Chairman for 2024-2025.

Appointment of Representatives for 2024 - 2025: The following were appointed to represent DPC: Louisa Powell Almshouse trust – Cllr O'Boyle, Tree Warden – Cllr S Povall, Diddlebury Flood Action Group – Cllr C Martyn, Diddlebury Village Hall – Cllr. S Povall, Manager of DPC's website – Cllr C Martyn, SALC South Shropshire Area Committee – Cllr R Povall.

Declarations of Interest: None were made.

Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 24th April 2024 were approved by councillors and three items of Matters Arising were considered.

Reports: The Chairman said he had held further site meetings about the public playground in Diddlebury. The two picnic benches had arrived: one had been assembled by Cllr. Pardoe for the new playground and he and Mr Bartell had assembled and sited the second in Bouldon. He had completed the SC Empty Homes consultation and dealt with complaints about fireworks being let off after midnight in Diddlebury.

Shropshire Councillor Motley reported that the general election being called for 4th July had caused problems at SC as the staff were still in the throes of setting a budget and implementing the changes wrought by the Constituency Boundary Changes. She advised that 17,000 responses had been received to the consultation about the proposed closure of the recycling centre in Craven Arms: SC have still not taken a decision on the matter. She had discussed the proposed changes to the parish boundary between Culmington

and Diddlebury parishes. She felt the issues were best left to the Place Plan review.

Planning: An outline application for an open market house in Corfton (24/01809/OUT) had been received too late for inclusion in the May Agenda. An extension of time has been applied for to deal with it at the July parish council meeting.

Highways/Environmental Issues: The Chairman reported there had still been no action from Highways about the longstanding bridge problems in Bouldon.

Communications and Correspondence: Eleven items were considered and dealt with.

DPC's response to Shropshire's Local Plan Examination Consultation: The Chairman would consider this matter: Cllr Motley felt it mostly applied to urban areas.

Public Access Playground In Diddlebury: A quotation for the surfacing works and an additional piece of play equipment totalling £13,115 plus VAT was approved.

Finance Matters: The Finance Report for May 2024 was considered and cheques totalling £4,446.30 were approved for payment, after which DPC held funds totalling £33,935.21. Cllr R Povall verified the reconciliation between DPC's cash book and HSBC bank statement 381.

Audit 2023 - 2024: The Audit Report prepared by Mrs J Griffiths dated 5th May 2024 was considered: she was satisfied that DPC's accounts were correct and no adverse comments were made as to its accounting procedures. The various Annual Governance Accountability Return documents had been examined by Mrs Griffiths and found to be correct. The parish council therefore voted its approval of the AGAR documents: they will now be open to public examination and would be available to view on DPC's website or on application to the Clerk. The Certificate of Exemption would be sent to PKF Littlejohn, the external auditors.

Any Other Business: The Chairman reported the recent death of Mrs Sally Woodhouse and sent the parish council's sympathies to Mike Woodhouse. Sally Woodhouse had been deeply involved in many aspects of Diddlebury life and the parish council was grateful for her service. She would be sorely missed by the community.

There being no further business to conduct, the meeting was closed at 9.10pm

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
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


