

## LETTER FROM THE RECTORY



March is a month dominated, in the church, by Lent, as we continue to remember the time Jesus spent in the wilderness after his baptism. The month contains several notable saints days too. The most famous is probably St David, the patron saint of Wales, who we remember on 1st March. A sixth century monk and bishop, David founded a monastery in the city which now bears his name. He lived a strict life of prayer and discipline and expected his monks to do the same, but he was also known for his kindness to the poor and the sick.

On 2nd March the church remembers St Chad, a seventh century priest and monk who became Bishop of Lichfield. Chad was known for his holiness and for his humility and the cathedral he founded is dedicated to him, along with the Virgin Mary. During the past year a new shrine has been built in the cathedral to commemorate St Chad and as a place for a focus of prayer, where people can find that their faith is renewed and where they may be strengthened before going out to spread the good news of Christ in the wider world. If you happen to be anywhere near Lichfield, do go to the cathedral and visit the shrine.

These saints remind us of aspects of the calling which is there for all Christians, helping us to think about sharing the good news which is the Christian message with all people, and about caring for those who are in various ways vulnerable or in need. Doing this effectively can be demanding and is not always easy, especially in the world of today. This is one of the reasons why we gather as Christian communities on a regular basis. We meet to worship, but also to be re-charged and to encourage one another as we seek to do God's will. Being a Christian need not be a solitary thing – you are welcome to join us whenever you like as, together, we follow God's call.

# LUDLOW ROTARY CARES '23



'Ludlow Rotary Cares' is the name the Club has given to a scheme aimed at encouraging funding applications from charities and other organisations supporting community life in and around Ludlow which could benefit from a modest grant of up to £500.

Over the past 8 years the Rotary Club of Ludlow has been able to invest over £40,000 from funds it has raised in over eighty-five local community projects through this scheme. After two years when fundraising has been difficult due to Covid restrictions, the Club is delighted to be able to invest again in our community.

The Club intends to be very open minded about the types of activities it will support so long as the project or programme responds to a community need in, or within, fifteen miles of Ludlow and meets its criteria on the giving of grants. What the Club will need to understand is exactly what the money will be used for, who will benefit from it and how much difference it will make.

Organisations which meet the criteria will need to get their applications in by **Monday 17th April 2023**. There will also be an opportunity to meet other applicants as well as members of the Rotary Club. Cheques will be handed out very soon afterwards!

#### BEFORE THE COFFEE GETS COLD BY TOSHIKAZU KAWAGUCHI

In Tokyo, in a back alley, a small basement, windowless, café has been serving coffee for over a hundred years. It also has a resident ghost. If you manage to sit on the chair at the back of the café when she vacates it to go the toilet, you can go back in time. However, there are several rules which are frequently reiterated. You cannot change the past. You cannot leave the chair. The person you are meeting in the past must have been in the café at the same time as you. You absolutely must be back before the coffee you are drinking gets cold. Or you will turn into a ghost.

The four interwoven stories in the book involve people who have always wondered, 'what would have happened if..?' The owner of the café is Nagare Tokita, her cousin, who manages the café with his wife Kei, ably helped by his cousin, a student waiter, Kazu. In addition to the ghost the café has several regulars. Fumiko Kiyokawa, a successful businesswoman, came to the café hoping that her lover, Gora Katada, an engineer, has invited her to meet him for a serious conversation. She is hoping he is going to propose marriage. She is bemused when he tells her he is going to work abroad for three years and leaves. Fumiko wants to go back in time to understand why things didn't turn out as she had hoped and encourages the waiter Kazu Tokita to help her do it.

Fusagi is one of the regulars. He sits at a table drinking coffee and reading a travel brochure. His wife, Kohtake, works long shifts as a nurse but often meets him there. He is beginning to develop dementia and is gradually forgetting the people around him. He would like to go back in time to give his wife a letter he has written. Another regular, Hirai, has left her ancestral home and abandoned her younger sister to help her parents in the family inn. Hirai runs her own successful bar in Tokyo. Her sister visits regularly to try to see Hirai, who avoids her thinking she will be called home, away from the life she has made for herself. Hirai comes to regret the lack of contact and returns to the past to try to understand more although she knows she will not be able to make amends. Kei decides that she would like to use the chair to go to the future rather than the past to re-solve an anxiety in her mind about her child.

Each of the stories begins with the scene being set, the characters described in detail and the rules repeated. The author, a playwright, is setting the stage. He cleverly pulls together the concerns of all the characters, their hopes, and fears, within the rules and rituals the café must follow.

Members of the group initially found it a little difficult to adjust to the style and pace of the book. Nevertheless, we had a lengthy and enjoyable discussion. As the book progressed and the stories wove together, the form made a little more sense. It was memorable. We found it intriguing and thought provoking. The dilemmas it raised made us reflect on issues in our own lives and we discussed whether we would like to go back in time – and, if so, why? The book was a gentle read, humorous in parts and quite intriguing. It left more questions unanswered than it solved. There are other books in the same series, so perhaps one day we might read the sequel?

When we meet on Thursday 9th March, we will be discussing

a quite different style of book: Bewilderment by Richard Powers. This is the story of the relationship between a father and son, set within the context of the impact of climate change on the planet.

# PARISH FLOOD ACTION GROUP



It has been several weeks so far in 2023 with little significant rain. But we should not be complacent, it was during the second half of February in 2020 when the last major flood event happened.

Any heavy rains create problems, from the volume of water struggling under the bridges, and in particular the Pye brook at Bouldon and the Diddle brook at the B4368 and in the village alongside Glebe Cottage. These choke points either are incapable of allowing the volume of water through them or become blocked by debris. The result is the backed-up water levels rise and then flood outwards into neighbouring properties.

Another area of high risk is at points where the watercourse turns causing the water to 'pile up' on one side as the water swerves round. Hopefully, the widening work done by the Malthouse in Diddlebury will encourage the water from the weir to flow away more efficiently.

The new building development at Bache Mill has significantly built up the immediate banks of the Diddle, restricting its ability to spread out. The effect of this on the previously flooded properties remains to be tested. Please let me know immediately of any issues relating to this.

Recently Sharon Constable and I attended an online conference hosted by CIRIA (Construction Industry Research and Information Association). An idea which came through was that whole communities should help, not just the ones which are liable to flooding. Volunteer roles which anyone in the community can help with are Water Walkers and Puddle Watchers.

A Water Walker is a person, possibly a dog walker, who regularly walks a stretch of water - a river, stream, or ditch. The person takes ownership for reporting any issues on their patch.

The Puddle Watcher is a person, who keeps an eye on things like blocked drains and gullies along a stretch of road. Again, all the volunteer needs to do is report to the Flood Action Group who will instigate the appropriate actions.

A Flood Helper, a person who can help a vulnerable person during a flood event, checking the person is okay. Does the person need any furniture moving / raising to limit the damage?

Remember our Flood Action Group covers not just the village of Diddlebury but the whole of the Parish. If anyone is interested in helping in any of these roles, please contact me at happy4clive@gmail.com

# MEETING OF THE PATIENTS PARTICIPATION GROUP. FEB 7TH 2023

Many of you in the Corvedale are patients of Brown Clee Practice and use the surgery in Ditton. However you may not be aware of the current issues faced by the practice.

As a result of these issues about 40 people, including Dr Railton, attended the meeting on Tuesday to express their concern and support.

The issues were summarised by Tina Ranson, Chair of the PPG.

- Dr Railton intends to resign the Partnership as soon as practicable (this was initially going to be Christmas 2023, but there may be a little more flexibility in this now)
- Dr Railton will continue to work as a part time GP for 2 years after she has resigned from the Partnership.
- Dr Bassett intends to continue to serve for a maximum of another 5 years.
- Dr Jones will continue to work for a maximum of another 3 years.
- The Practice anticipates that it will be difficult to recruit suitable GPs who will be able to take on the Partnership for the longer term.
- In order to attract GPs they want to dispose of the Practice buildings (to relieve any subsequent Partners from the associated expenses and stresses). Ideally they would like some form of local or community ownership of the buildings to provide some guarantee of the continued provision of medical services in the area. The timescale for the change of ownership would be Autumn 2023.

It is intended to form a Steering Group to look at options for acquisition of the buildings. If you would like to be part of this Steering Group and contribute ideas, time and energy to this enterprise, please contact Tina Ranson at tina.ranson@outlook.com.

Rural medical practices are under considerable pressure at the moment and we have been informed that Highley Surgery is to close on 31st March. Brown Clee Medical Practice has consistently been rated one of the best in the country and we would urge you to support this effort, so we do not lose such an important local resource.

Romantic prose and poetry - with St Valentine's Day just around the corner - was the theme of retired Librarian Adrian Williams' talk to our February meeting at Stanton Lacy Village Hall. Once our short business session had finished, Adrian and his wife, Janet, shared the reading of material they had very skilfully researched and prepared - as Adrian said, 'taking romance in its widest sense, with some old, some new, some you will know and some fresh.' He quoted an extract from the Shakespearean play, Henry V; another from one of Shakespeare's 154 sonnets - all written with no particular recipient in mind - and there was this amusing poem (not written by William Shakespeare!): 'Twas in a restaurant they met, Romeo and Juliet. He had no cash to pay the debt, so Romeo owed, while Julie ate.'

Adrian went on to explain how Shakespeare is still at the heart of our language with many expressions, not necessarily romantic, still in use today: for example, when we say 'that's Greek to me' or something has 'vanished into thin air', someone hasn't 'budged an inch' or has become 'tongue tied', been 'a tower of strength', not 'slept a wink', 'insisted on fair play', or something's 'too much of a good thing', we will be quoting from Shakespeare. And there are many more! Janet then recited some poems, including one of the very funny poems by Pam Ayres, entitled Yes, I'll Marry You, My Dear, and the lovely Us Two from Christopher Robin.

They mentioned how many authors often included romance or romantic text in their novels, for example: Alexander McCall Smith, author of *The No. 1 Ladies Detective Agency*; Colleen McCullough in her novel *The Thorn Birds*; Robert James Waller in *The Bridges of Madison County* and the W H Auden poem *Funeral Blues* used in the film *Four Weddings and a Funeral.* Adrian further quoted an extract from Tolstoy's *Anna Karenina* and recited May Wedderburn Cannan's very moving poem *The Armistice – In an Office in Paris*, about the love and tragedy of WW1. With far too many extracts to mention, towards the end of the talk Adrian read a poem which he said, 'says something about love,' Janet narrated the short poem *So What Is Love?* and to finish, Adrian recited the poem *You're Never Too Old to Fall in Love!* 

The evening was very enjoyable and entertaining, and gave me, for one, lots of ideas of material to read, re-read or review on the big (or small) screen! Thank you once more Adrian and Janet! The meeting concluded after refreshments and some time to socialise.

# **CORVEDALE PAST & PRESENT**

#### **GOING AGAINST THE GRAIN?**

On the face of it, it is perhaps the craziest project that humankind has ever undertaken - the growing of grain. Anthropologists have long said that 'primitive' (the word seems less and less appropriate) hunter-gatherer peoples had (and have) large amounts of leisure time which they often devote to artistic, and what we might regard as philosophical, pursuits. In the early years of the western colonisation of Canada, French Jesuit missionaries, who were highly trained debaters, came across indigenous tribes. When they were able to communicate the Jesuits were dumbfounded when they realised that the best of the indigenous thinkers could run rings round them when it came to debating. Of course they could: those so-called primitives had spent their whole lives sitting in circles doing that very thing! They were apparently particularly excoriating in their criticism of French society which they found inharmonious, shallow, harsh, and cruel when it was in broad terms compared to their own. They noted how a large proportion of the lower order of French society spent huge amounts of time doing menial work in fields yet lived poorly. They no doubt compared the way the Europeans gained their nourishment with their own free-wheeling methods. They must have thought the whole system mad.

Grain was surely a case in point. It takes a great deal of land preparation and care during growing and is prone to disease. Harvesting required the mobilising of large numbers of people and, this done, the trouble really starts! Grain is entirely useless to human beings until it is ground into flour. This process takes a huge amount of manual work or quite sophisticated mechanical processes. All these factors can be seen in the remnants of the medieval world that are everywhere to be seen in South Shropshire. I have previously talked about the growing of grain in medieval open or common fields so here is an opportunity to talk about another aspect of the process; milling, and in particular, water milling.

The Romans knew all about watermills and they were used all over their empire along with other forms of water engineering, even in that ridiculously isolated province in the north-west: Britannia! It is thought that for a long time after organised imperial control waned the technology was lost or forgotten. During the middle and later parts of the Anglo-Saxon period (we should now call this the 'Early Middle Ages'), when political, urban and village life became ever more organised, the watermill made a comeback. This, with the revolution in ploughing techniques and development of open fields that also happened at this time, is natural. Had we walked around England in 700s we would probably have seen watermills being constructed in many places.

The growing and grinding of corn is one of the things that would not have radically changed after the momentous events of 1066 AD and subsequent years. However, one thing that did happen was that our new king, William I, commissioned a huge survey of his new English possessions in 1086, what became known as Domesday, 'Doom' just meaning 'judgement'.

Scholars have identified comfortably over 5,000 mills in England at the doom time. This sounds pretty impressive but here I want to give some thoughts as to why this may be a huge underestimate.

Multure was the right to exact a payment for the grinding of grain and this was payable to the person receiving the flour. Additionally, the milling time had to be apportioned: to the Lord of the Manor, whoever had built the mill and even the person who owned the land from which the water flowed to power the mill, or the person who owned the mill-pond. Then there was the whole business of transporting the millstones - which often came from completely different parts of the country. What a tangled web of interests to sort out, and this before the poor peasants, needing their grain ground, got a look in!

Of course, the miller was at the centre of this web, and he often must have been the first peasant-capitalist. No wonder he became a dubious figure at best. Geoffrey Chaucer certainly 'had his number'.

You can't help wondering if all this fraught mess might have been too much for the Domesday Commissioners who tended to under-report mills.

In our area mills were recorded at Tugford, Clee St. Margaret, Aston Munslow and Stanton Lacy, but it is almost inconceivable there would not have been a mill at Stoke St Milborough, for instance, where there were plentiful hill streams, open fields, and a relatively large population.

# CORVEDALE GARDEN GROUP

#### BEE STEPPINGSTONES, A TALK BY DEBBIE VIVERS

Our Garden Group year started very well with almost thirty people attending our first meeting. Debbie Vivers gave a colourful and lively talk about the many different varieties of bees. She described how to identify them and encouraged us to pledge our support to change things in our gardens to provide food and water 'steppingstones' for bees and other pollinators as they fly up and down the Corvedale. Debbie recounted how her interest in bees had dated back to her degree in zoology at Reading University when she worked with the hives there and subsequently became a beekeeper. In 2019, on a walk on the Long Mynd, she noticed an unusual bee struggling to find enough pollen and nectar to gather, due to the 'food gap' between the flowering of different plant species being made worse by climate change. The bilberry bumble bee she found is rare in the UK. It evolved in heathlands. It forages on the Long Mynd and Stiperstones in early spring and summer. Bilberry (or whinberry) flowers are essential as an easy nectar source; in turn they pollinate the bilberries to enable the development of late summer fruit. This area is at the southernmost tip of this bee's range in the UK. The bilberry bee does not like the increasingly hot summers, so may disappear locally in due course. Volunteers are helping to watch where the bees are spotted across the South Shropshire Hills and to create flower rich meadow areas near the heathland to help to fill the hunger gap between whinberries flowering and the later flowering heathers.

The bilberry bumblebee (Bombus monticola) has a large fiery orange-red tail, covering more than half its abdomen. It has yellow bands at the top and bottom of the thorax and is smaller and rounder than some other bee species. It is found near or on upland heath where heather and bilberries grow.

Debbie moved on to talk about key differences between bumblebees and honeybees.

BUMBLEBEES	HONEYBEES
Fat with long hairs	Slim with short hairs
One queen hibernates	Workers and queen overwinter
Collect nectar and pollen	Collect nectar and pollen
Nests have 50-400 bees	Nests have up to 50k bees
Most are wild	Most are managed by beekeepers
Minimum food storage	Large food stores

There are eighteen species of bumblebee in the UK, differentiated by the colours of their bottoms. They are grouped by tail colour: white, yellow, red, or ginger. Queen bees, worker bees and male bees are varied sizes with different markings. Looking carefully at their abdomen, thorax, wings, antennae, and pollen baskets can help too (see the very helpful leaflet 'What's that bumblebee?' by www.bumblebeeconservation.org). Bees prefer flowers that are blue, white, and yellow with single rather than double

flowers. Different bees have different length tongues so growing a variety of flowers helps. They tend not to like over bright and over bred flowers.

Debbie encouraged us to help by thinking about how we can have bee-friendly plants in our garden which flower every month of the year to provide nectar and pollen for bees and other pollinators. A lack of the right plants in the winter months, early spring and late May-early June can cause hunger gaps. Having water available in the garden is good too. Planting an area as an annual wildflower meadow would be beneficial. We were also encouraged to leave our gardens a little untidy over winter to provide hibernation sites. Bees prefer untouched areas on north facing slopes in leaf litter, log piles, hollow trees, under tree bark or in plant pots. Other bees like mouse holes on south facing slopes or long tangled grass, compost heaps and bird boxes. Some plants which we may know as weeds can be especially helpful as they flower early, for example the dandelion. Leaving lawns a bit longer in early spring, until more flowers are out, allows bees to forage on dandelions and daisies before they set seed.

The Royal Horticultural Society Magazine, 'The Garden' in January listed plants we could grow for each month of the year for 365 days of bees. How many of them do you grow?

January	Winter heather, aconite, hazel, clematis cirrhosa, viburnum tinus
February	Salix caprea (goat willow), snowdrops, naturalised species crocus, cherry plum tree
March	Lungwort (pulmonaria), primrose, flowering currant, dandelion, hellebores
April	Apple trees (malus), aquilegia, phacelia, bugle, wood spurge, berberis, cherry
May	Campanula trachelium, ceanothus, rosemary
June	Lambs' ears, alliums, thyme, cardoons, blackberries, foxgloves
July	Roses, lavender, marjoram, sea holly, linaria
August	Scabious, echinops, cat mint, fuchsia,
September	Salvia 'Amistad,' buddleja, dahlias – single flower, ceratostigma
October	Ivy, devil's bit scabious, perennial wallflower
November	Winter flowering honeysuckle, sarcococca, fatsia japonica, autumn crocus
December	Mahonia japonica, gorse, stinking hellebore

The 'Bee kind tool' on the Bumblebee Conservation Trust website gives many other suggestions to help us to make Corvedale 'Bee -ewe-ti-ful' this year.

On **Saturday 11th March** the Garden Group will be visiting The Vern Garden, Marden. 

# **MUNSLOW PARISH COUNCIL**

DRAFT MINUTES OF A MEETING HELD ON THURSDAY 2ND FEBRUARY 2023 AT BEAMBRIDGE CLUBROOM

**Present:** Cllrs Barbara Archer (Chair), Antonia Bury, Nigel Dobson, David Marston, Ed Povey, and Graham Williams. Cllr Cecilia Motley (Shropshire Council), H Coonick (Clerk).

Apologies for Absence: Cllrs Fotheringham and Meeson.

**Declarations of Interest:** Cllr Bury (item 12).

**Public Forum:** No members of the public were in attendance.

**Presentation by Janet Cobb, Restoring Shropshire's Verges Project (RSVP):** Leaving the cuttings after cutting the verge encourage plants such as hogweed. The aim is to cut, collect and restore the verges allowing wild flowers to return and improve the habitat for insects. The clippings are being used in bio-digesters. Although the initial outlay is costlier the long term costs are reduced as the verges do not grow so high. In areas where it is important for road safety there are 1 metre cuts. Cllr Archer thanked Janet for the presentation.

**Minutes** of the meeting held on 1st December 2022 were approved and signed as a correct record.

Matters Arising from those minutes not covered on the agenda: Cllr Archer reported that the Vicar will investigate Heritage at Risk regarding Broadstone Chapel after the quinquennial inspection.

**Urgent Items for discussion at the discretion of the Chair:** The Council had become aware of an issue regarding the boundary of Washwell Cottage. The Chair will inform local residents that if they wish to challenge a change of boundary they can do so by contacting the Land Registry.

**Reports:** Shropshire Council: Cllr Motley reported that she is now portfolio holder for Adult Social Care, Public Health, and Communities. Shropshire Council asked the Boundary Review Team to increase their divisions from 74 to 75. They will hear back in April. As the number of residents in the Corvedale division is lower than that required by the Boundary Review Team there may be changes to the division. This process must be complete by October this year.

**Beambridge Club Room:** Cllr Dobson reported that the fire alarms and a fire blanket have been purchased and the signs, emergency lighting and fire extinguishers are being reviewed. The back door has been replaced and potholes in the car park have been filled.

**South Shropshire Area Committee:** Cllr Meeson had sent a report. The accounts for the committee have been frozen but a new Finance Officer will be appointed and SALC is currently paying invoices on behalf of the committee. The Legal Topic Notice regarding Vehicle Activated Signs was discussed. There are training sessions in June on planning.

**Planning: Update on Planning Application Chadstone Aston Munslow 22/05438/TCA:** The Vice Chair, Cllr Povey, and the Clerk decided that it would not be necessary to call an extraordinary meeting to discuss this application.

**Update on Planning Application, The Deans, Aston Munslow 22/05256/FUL**: The Chair, Cllr Archer and the Clerk decided that it would not be necessary to call an extraordinary meeting to discuss this application.

Installation of a Defibrillator at The School House,

**Munslow:** Shropshire Council Historic Environment has agreed that the wall of the entrance to The Old School House in Munslow is acceptable as the site of the defibrillator. It was agreed to pay IDP solutions £200 + VAT for the installation of an electricity supply to the cabinet at The Old School House and apply for a cabinet and defibrillator to the Henry Angell-James Memorial Trust. Fundraising for the trust could include a table top sale at the Club Room and an honesty box at openings of Millichope Park.

**Review of Environmental Maintenance and New Tasks:** The Clerk had reported to Shropshire Council several issues raised by the contractor regarding broken signs and blocked drains.

**Beambridge Club Room Lease:** The Council asked that Cllr Bury to stay for the discussion. The lease did not have the Parish Council as the Custodian Trustees. The lease will be returned to the Millichope Foundation and the Foundation would be asked why the previous arrangement had been changed. If necessary, the Council should become a member of Shropshire Community Resource who are able to advise on Village Hall legal arrangements.

**Jubilee Replacement Oak Tree:** The replacement has now been planted.

**Plans For The Coronation:** Cllr Bury intends to make Millichope Park available for the Coronation. The Clerk will contact Diddlebury and Abdon Parish Councils to find out what activities they are planning and invite them to a joint event at Millichope.

**Highways:** The replacement VAS at Aston Munslow has now been installed. The previously agreed amount did not include the VAT. It was agreed to pay Westcotec £5280.00 which includes VAT.

**Mobile Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS):** The NALC Legal Topic Notice was considered. A grant of £1005 from the Police and Crime Commissioner has been received. It was agreed to purchase a mobile vehicle activated sign from ElanCity for £2,726.51 including VAT. The Council will ask for new posts for the mobile VAS at East Munslow and Hungerford Layby.

The Traffic Engineer has informed the Clerk that the B4368 Traffic Calming Report is now complete and he is discussing potential funding for the proposals with Shropshire Council.

**Finance:** The Clerk reported that the bank account holds £20,334.17. Holdings for the Neighbourhood Fund, Environmental Maintenance Fund, Traffic Calming and the reserves leave an underspend of £3,819.08. The report and expenditure against the budget were accepted and Cllr Povey signed the bank reconciliation.

**The Following Payments Were Approved:** D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) Invoices 271 and 275 – £238.00, IDP Solutions (defibrillator electricity supply), Westcotec (Replacement VAS) £5,380 including VAT and ElanCity (mobile Vehicle Activated Sign) £2,726.51 for 2023-2024.

It was agreed to appoint Kevin Adams as the Internal Auditor for 2023-2024.

SUMMARY OF THE DRAFT MINUTES OF DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL'S MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 25TH JANUARY 2023 AT DIDDLEBURY VILLAGE HALL

**Present:** Cllr R Povall - Vice-Chairman, Cllrs A Watson, T O'Boyle, A Rattu, C Martyn, R Morgan.

**Apologies** were received and accepted from Cllrs D Hedgley, S Povall and T Pardoe.

**In attendance:** The Clerk, Unitary Cllr Cecilia Motley and seven members of the public.

**Minutes** of the Parish Council Meeting held on 23rd November 2022 were approved by councillors.

No Declarations of Interest were made.

#### **Reports:**

There was no **Chairman's Report** but Cllr R Povall said he and Cllr Martyn had made a site visit to the old milking parlour featuring in planning application 22/05525/FUL, along with the applicant.

**Clir Motley** advised DPC to take no further steps with its boundaries review as it was possible the Divisional Boundaries Review might result in parish boundaries in the Corvedale being adjusted.

The government's financial settlement was better than anticipated; Social Services are actively tackling the hospital bed-blocking situation. There have been a lot of thefts from farmyards, and other Shropshire parishes are setting up footpath groups to work with farmers and landowners to make footpath diversions which avoid farmyards. She urged DPC to join such an initiative.

**Cllr Rattu** requested that footpaths be made more dogfriendly and that the FP21 by the school be re-instated: it has been ploughed up to the boundary.

**Flood Action Group:** Cllr Martyn said he had reported various blocked drains and potholes to Fix My Street.

**Westhope Village Hall:** Cllr Watson is still in negotiations with Airband, exploring the possibility of a free Broadband connection for the hall.

**Diddlebury Village Hall:** Cllr Rattu said bookings for DVH were good, although the Rugby Six-Nations event was poorly attended. Neither hall has anything planned yet for the Coronation.

#### **Planning Applications:**

**22/05525/FUL** was an application for the conversion and extension of a derelict milking parlour into one dwelling, with the installation of a package treatment plant, on land

to the north of the B4368. Due to difficulties interpreting the nature of the application, the issue of whether it was in Bache Mill or Diddlebury, and in the face of numerous objections, the applicant withdrew the application in order to seek preplanning advice.

**22/02425/FUL** was an application for a house to be built in the garden of The Tithe Barn, Diddlebury. DPC had supported the application in June 2022 but SC had refused permission. It was now going to appeal (under reference **23/03104/REF**) and DPC had to decide whether or not to submit any views to the Planning Inspector. The matter was debated. Due to the provisions of Standing Order 7 the application could not be re-considered at this meeting; furthermore, the Tithe Barn is currently up for sale. It was agreed that DPC would take no further action in relation to the appeal.

**Highways/Environmental Issues:** Cllr Watson said the recent re-surfacing works to the B4368, which had caused huge inconvenience to both residents of the Corvedale and all traffic, were already breaking up at the verges and pot holes were appearing. Cllr Rattu agreed the work appeared to be shoddy. Cllr Motley advised DPC to contact Mr Andy Wilde at Highways to ascertain whether the works were guaranteed and what he proposed doing about the matter.

**Communications And Correspondence:** Sixteen items were considered and dealt with.

**Finance Report for December 2022/January 2023:** Cheques totalling £3,580.50 were approved for payment. DPC held a balance of £21,246.98 following payment of the approved cheques. Cllr O'Boyle approved the Clerk's reconciliation between HSBC bank statements and DPC's cash book.

**202-24 Precept Budget:** Councillors considered DPC's 2023/2024 Precept Budget and a budget of £6,660 was approved, which is £1,995 less than for the 2022/2023 financial year. A copy of the Precept Budget for 2023/2024 is available to view on DPC's website.

**Any Other Business:** The Clerk reminded everyone that at the March meeting donations would be considered, so any groups or organisations seeking a modest donation should apply to DPC before the March meeting, which will be on 22nd March 2023.

**Next Meeting:** Wednesday 22nd February 2023, 7.30pm at Diddlebury Village Hall

It was agreed to support both of these applications.

**Correspondence:** Anonymous letter about bonfires: Cllr Steele left the meeting during this item due to a conflict of interest. Bonfires are not an issue that the Parish Council has responsibility for. Concerns regarding bonfires should be reported to the Environment Agency.

**Community Governance and Boundary Review:** Consideration of Potential Changes to Parish Boundaries at Sparchford, Elsich, Vernold's Common, The Pheasantry and Seifton. Stanton Lacy had responded to say they would defer this to the next meeting as advised by Cllr Motley as the changes to division boundaries may affect the parish boundaries. Discussion will be deferred to the next meeting.

Application for funding for a second vehicle activated sign and powers to purchase: The clerk will meet with the Shropshire Traffic Engineer to look at a site for the new sign. By the next meeting it is hoped that the powers to purchase the sign will have been clarified.

**Update on Parking at the Laundry Works:** The Clerk is in discussions with the Shropshire Traffic Engineer looking at options.

**Update on Black Poplar near Development Site:** The response from Shropshire Council Planning's Tree Officer

stated that they were not in a position to take action. The Clerk will forward the drainage plans for the development to Clr Seabrook.

**Update on Environment Agency and Fire Service visit to Laundry Works:** A joint visit occurred on 3rd February and a report should be available from the Environment Agency Officer by the next meeting. The Fire Officer had no concerns.

**Update on Flooding on the B4365:** The Clerk has reported this issue (and the blocked drains in the village) to Shropshire Highways.

#### **Reports from Members:**

**Clir Motley** reported that Social Care's finances are very difficult. They are trying to improve the discharges from hospitals. She paid tribute to the officers in the Social Care teams. There is a new Veterans Centre at the Robert Jones and Agnes Hunt Hospital in Oswestry.

**Clir Mear** reported that the village hall is still closed for most meetings. The Insurance Assessors have found more damage than was initially thought.

**Clir Byng** reported that there had not been a recent meeting of the Flood Action Committee but a multiagency meeting was being held on 9th February.

**Clir Steele** reported that he attended the zoom meeting of the South Shropshire Area Committee. There was considerable discussion about the Fresh Water Mussels in the river Clun, which is very important ecologically.

**Finance:** The bank account held £8,338.42 as at 28th December 2022. The forecast of expenditure for the rest of the financial year is £1,012.35. Cllr Steele signed the bank reconciliation.

Payments were authorised to D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) Invoices 268 and 276 totalling £153.00.

**Internal Auditor for 2023-2024:** Mrs Disley was approved as internal auditor. She will not require a fee.

Complaints Policy, Data Protection and Privacy Policy and Delegation Policy: Timescales for responses will be added to the Complaints Policy. With this amendment the policies were adopted.


