





## **CHURCH NEWS**

#### LETTER FROM THE RECTORY

Each year the children from Corvedale School come to church for an Easter service. During the service they are given a Palm Cross, and, on several occasions, I have talked about the Palm Cross and an Easter egg, reminding them that we can only celebrate Jesus coming back to life on Easter Day because he had died on the cross on Good Friday. If we forget that the two are linked, we miss the point. 'God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.' (John 3, 16) and 'No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends' (John 15, 13).

In order to fully appreciate what it is that we celebrate at Easter, we need to have thought about what comes before. I say this not to discourage you from joining us at Easter, but to encourage you to join us in the services that lead up to it, particularly during Holy Week when we think about Jesus' arrest, trial and crucifixion before we come to the celebrations of his new life – and think about what that means for us and for our relationship with God.

Each year people tell me that Christmas is my busy time. In fact, Easter is busier, with five consecutive days of services which mark very specific events. It is a week which brings highs and lows as we celebrate Christ's journey into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, think about his death and burial and then celebrate his rising to new life. It is a story which includes both the miraculous and the very human reactions and behaviour of ordinary people. It is a story which has changed the lives of countless millions of people – and can change ours, too, if we let it. Do join us as we explore the story of what happened in a week in Jerusalem and think about its meaning.

And, when we get there – Happy Easter!

# WOMEN'S INSTITUTE



#### **HAYTON & DISTRICT WI**

At February's meeting we were incredibly pleased to welcome our first speaker for 2024. Mellie Lewis, who lives in Clun, is the holder of the National Collection of Aeonium Species, of which she has around one thousand plants and over three hundred varieties, all quite different and individually beautiful. Her talk entitled 'Aeoniums in Habitat and at Home' told us how she started collecting the genus Aeonium back in the 1980s after a friend drew her attention to a small plant left on a compost heap - a moment in time that set off her fascination for these species. She actively began her research and collection, learning how Aeoniums are incredibly hardy, succulent, subtropical plants with a wonderful botanical history. In 2018, Mellie applied to be recognised as having the National Collection of Aeoniums and became the first person in the UK to receive this status. She has studied Aeoniums at home and in their native habitats, most of their varieties being native to the Canary Islands with some found in Madeira, Cabo Verde, Morocco, East Africa, and Yemen, where they evolved to adapt to the different environments. ## THE CORNEWALLS OF DIDDLEBURY

#### PART ONE: HOME IS THE SAILOR

In my piece on the Cornewall hatchments in Diddlebury Church (Corvedale News, December 2023) I promised to deal in some future articles with the family and its involvement with the Hall and its estate. The Cornewalls were an ancient and illustrious Marcher family who claimed, perhaps dubiously, descent from Richard of Cornwall, a younger son of King John. The family's fortunes were considerably augmented in the fourteenth century by the acquisition of the former Mortimer estates of Burford, where a magnificent collection of the family's monuments may be seen in the church. Branches of the family were established at Berrington and Moccas in Herefordshire, and it is from the former that the Diddlebury family was descended.

Captain Frederick Cornewall, who purchased Diddlebury in 1752, was the youngest of the three sons of the Reverend Frederick Cornewall, Vicar of Bromfield from 1702 to 1746, and his wife Anne Trice. Young Fredrick set out on a naval career, following the example of his uncle, Admiral Charles Cornewall, and his cousin James. In 1734 he was made a Lieutenant, and ten years later he was serving as First Lieutenant on his cousin's ship HMS Marlborough. On 11th February 1744 a Spanish fleet, which had been blockaded in Toulon by the Royal Navy, sought, with somewhat

lukewarm French support, to break out of the port. The British commander, Admiral Matthews was also less than enthusiastic, and allowed the enemy to escape. However the *Marlborough* had sailed into the heart of the battle and engaged the enemy flagship. Captain Cornewall, echoing the fate of that other Shropshire hero Admiral Benbow, had his legs blown away by chain shot and was killed. His nephew, First Lieutenant Frederick, despite having lost his arm in the conflict, took command and sailed to safety.

This inglorious defeat had a number of repercussions. Admiral Matthews was court martialled and dismissed from the service, as were seven of his captains. The Cornewalls, however, became heroes. Captain James was accorded the honour of a funeral in Westminster Abbey, and a sumptuous monument 36 feet high paid for by Parliament (sadly truncated and moved to the cloisters in 1925). First Lieutenant Frederick was promoted to the rank of Captain, backdated to the day of the battle. Unfortunately his first ship, HMS *Colchester*, ran aground on sandbanks off the coast of Kent, but no doubt his previous heroics served him in good stead. The pilot responsible served twelve months in prison!

Frederick Cornewall, at the age of forty, was in a position to take a wife and set himself up as a country gentleman ready for his retirement from the sea. In May 1746 he married a Bromfield neighbour, Mary, daughter of Francis Herbert of Oakley Park, and in 1752 he purchased Diddlebury Hall and estate for £10,000. The Baldwyn family, who had lived in the hall for several centuries, first as stewards for the Earls of Shrewsbury and latterly as owners, were gradually becoming more focussed on their property at Aqualate on the Staffordshire border and decided to quit their Diddlebury estate. Like those naval officers who pass through the pages of Jane Austen's novels, Frederick now had a base on shore while still a serving officer.

When Frederick purchased the hall, it was an ancient timberframed structure, and the new owner's first action was to commission a more up-to-date replacement. For this he commissioned two Warwickshire brothers, David and William Hiorn, who had learned their craft under the more famous William Smith of Warwick. The Hiorns provided the captain with an inexpensive and somewhat unostentatious house which cost £1,757 excluding the stable block. (Delbury Hall is the most fully documented of all the Hiorns' works, and readers can find more details in Gareth Williams' superb book The Country Houses of Shropshire). While these works were being conducted, Frederick pursued his naval career, and took part in the Battle of Minorca in 1756. It was Cornewall's evidence in the subsequent court martial of Admiral Byng for cowardice which sealed that unfortunate man's conviction and execution 'to encourage the others.' Cornewall secured his last command in 1761, a seventy-gun ship of the line named HMS Cornewall in honour of his dead cousin. With the return of peace in 1763, the Captain was ready to return to Shropshire and the life of a country gentleman.

## **VANESSA AND HER SISTER BY PRIYA PARMAR**

This book made a good start to the book group year. There was an excited buzz all evening as everyone chipped in with comments about the impression the book had made on them. Most of us had found it hard to put down and were sad when it ended. We even hope for a sequel!

The book recounts an imagined period in the lives of the artist Vanessa Bell and her sister Virginia Woolf when they were

young adults. Although Vanessa is not known to have written a diary, the author has used her imagination and information from other records available to recount an engaging and entirely believable account of day-to-day life in Bloomsbury. This approach integrates a 'mélange' of biography, memoir, and fiction. Within the novel, facsimiles of letters, postcards, and telegrams, to and from members of the group, help to carry the narrative forward, in and out of the wider context in which they live.


The four Stephens children, Vanessa, Thoby, Virginia and Adrian, lost their stepmother, Julia Duckworth Stephen, in 1895, then their father, Sir Leslie Stephen, in 1904, before moving from Kensington to Bloomsbury to set up home together in 1905. In their early twenties they resolve to defy convention and have a home where friends are encouraged to drop in and talk of philosophy, art, literature, relationships. People mix freely and easily together unchaperoned. Relationships are formed and reformed. Dress is informal; refreshments are simple; alcohol is abundant. They scandalise the older, more conventional, generation by staying up till all hours.

Thoby is at Cambridge and the core of the group is formed

from 'his set' and their friends there. Lytton Strachey, E.M. Forster (Morgan), Maynard Keynes and Clive Bell are frequent attendees. Leonard Woolf is a corresponding member, regularly updated by Lytton. From an initial informal party, the Stephens then create 'at homes' on Thursdays to talk about life and love, citing philosophy, literature, and history as sources. Virginia is ebullient, witty, pithy, has a way with words and can hold centre stage. Vanessa, attending to the practicalities and the finances, feels her wish to encourage reflections and discussions on art are sidelined. A Friday gathering for artists emerges to encourage them to comment on the thrilling new movements which are emerging in Paris and elsewhere in Europe. The cast of characters at the beginning of the book is fascinating. Other people who attend intermittently, or are mentioned, include Rupert Brook, Robert Cecil, Roger Fry, Duncan Grant, the Lamb brothers, George Mallory, and Lady Ottoline Morrell. From time to time members of the group go to the country together, to Cornwall, to Europe, then reconvene in Bloomsbury. It was a community buffered by wealth and privilege, trying to challenge custom and respectability: to question, to learn, to develop.

The dynamics between the siblings are well portrayed. Virginia, the baby of the family, is demanding, needy, wanting Vanessa to parent her, to love her, to be hers exclusively. The novel alludes to previous dark periods and the threat of future unravelling. As time goes on the family face health challenges as do those around them. Things change. Relationships change. There is love and distress. There are echoes of previous losses. Vanessa's developing relationship with Clive Bell excites Virginia's jealousy and her destructive side. Vanessa is hurt but grows in emotional maturity and learns to live for herself.

We all commented on how believable the diaries were and how credible the account of their daily lives, their concerns, their emotions. It is a book which would bear reading time and again.



## OTHER MINDS: THE OCTOPUS, THE SEA AND THE EVOLUTION OF INTELLIGENT LIFE BY PETER GODFREY-SMITH

February's book was a quite different and more complex read than January's: non-fiction, philosophy, and evolution. Remarkably interesting, but not a bedtime read. No-one in the group managed to finish it in the three weeks available since the last meeting, so due to that, and weather and other commitments, there were to have been very few attendees,

so the meeting was cancelled.

The book was well reviewed being a non-fiction book of the month at Waterstones and shortlisted for the Royal Society Science Book Prize. We needed to give it more time and attention and possibly to read it more than once.

The author, a philosopher, and a scuba diver, investigates the theory that cephalopods (octopus, jelly fish, cuttlefish, and their family members), five hundred million years ago formed a separate branch of the family tree of living things. He explains this and cites their intelligence, communication, and investigative skills as exceeding those of most species other than humankind. He likens the octopus to an intelligent alien. He explains they evolved to develop nervous systems from clusters of seaborne cells under the sea. The book was thought provoking as it questioned what we understand about sensing, feeling, and communicating. Apparently the eight tentacles of the octopus are so well endowed with neurons that they can almost 'think' independently. The world might have become a vastly different place if their evolution had overtaken ours.

Our next read is *Dove Keepers* by Alice Hoffman. This is the story of four strong women. It is set in ancient Israel. As ever, if you would like to join us to discuss this book on **Thursday 14th March** at 7.30pm at Diddlebury Village Hall you would be welcome.

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## **CORVEDALE PAST & PRESENT**

#### THE TROUBLE WITH CURRANT BUNS!



It is so instantly recognised by residents and visitors to Shropshire. Stokesay Castle is remarkable in many respects. Historically it is described as a fortified manor house, none better anywhere in the country we

might say. That, however, is a bit bloodless. I've always thought of it as an emblem of massive change, surely bewildering to all who lived through it, This concept probably rings a bell!

English Heritage, in their wonderful notes on Stokesay, point out that in the 13th century the Great Hall was built by one Laurence de Ludlowe. Whether it was because of sheep breeding, or 'terroir,' March hill climate, or careful management, in the 12th and 13th centuries wool from the Welsh Borderlands was the crème de la crème. Carefully washed and packed and sent across the North Sea to the burgeoning industrial areas in the Low Countries, it was wrought into the finest cloth, the best in Europe, and was sold around the Mediterranean and Middle East where it competed with fine fabrics coming from Asia. The merchants involved became fabulously rich, and our friends the de Ludlowes formed a remarkable dynasty.

This trade was the stimulus for financial changes that form the basis of contemporary money systems. It had to be so: the wool passed through many hands, traded by people of many languages, dialects and currencies. The northern Italians were at the forefront of producing new cashless trade arrangements provoked by wool commerce.

Lawrence, the most famous of the de Ludlowe merchants, amassed great wealth and became perhaps the third most powerful and influential man in the country in the reign of Edward I.

It's often argued that the Middle Ages produced only three types of men; those who fought, those who prayed and those who worked. Men like Laurence were blowing this system apart. His family name tells us a lot. Ludlow was a new, planned, town, designed to raise the whole local

economic temperature and make money. It was a merchant town, so different from neighbours like Shrewsbury, Wenlock and Hereford which were heavily controlled by monastic organisations. How the old families must have despised men like Lawrence; nouveau riche, threatening the very fabric of their world. Laurence's acquisition of Stokesay? An outrage. An upstart merchant of peasant stock aping nobility, becoming an aspirant Lord with his own household and manor. Whatever next?

Do you suppose Lawrence got his comeuppance, when, on the king's business, he, his wool and newfound money sank to the bottom of the North Sea off the coast of Suffolk?

You might cough and splutter a bit if I argued that the modern world with its distorted wealth and money systems and its seemingly unstoppable technical innovation had its global origins in Stokesay, but, just maybe, there is a tiny grain of possibility there! Certainly, the dogma that we need even more wealth and new things has been become baked into our psyche like currants into a bun!

Now, even leaving aside war, we face climate instability with its terrible brothers: nature destruction, soil and water degradation and spiralling chronic disease. You may think these are only symptoms of a deeper crisis of the mind and soul of humanity which will never be cured by the same paradigms that caused all the problems in the first place!

My own feeble effort is to learn and increasingly to relearn how the human frame is put together and functions (there is so much more to consider nowadays), because that changes everything: our whole relationship with ourselves, our food, other people and the natural world!

## **CARING FOR GOD'S ACRE**

#### **MAINLY ABOUT ROOKS**



Over the land freckled with snow half thawed
The speculating rooks at their nests cawed
And saw from the elm-tops, delicate as flower of grass,
What we below could not see, Winter pass.

Here's a poem by Edward Thomas. It comprises only four lines, but I think it's very clever, reminding us that other species can have the edge over us humans. Edward Thomas (a favourite poet of mine, probably because my Dad was fond of him) enlisted in the First World War in 1915 and was killed in 1917 at the age of 38.

Thomas had been part of a group of poets called 'The Dymock poets,' Dymock being a small village in North Gloucestershire, close to the Herefordshire border; other poets in the group included Robert Frost, Rupert Brooke (another sad loss in WWI), and Eleanor Farjeon. The death of Thomas saw the disintegration of the group.

But back to 'Thawing,' as the poem above is called. I was in Stanton Lacy recently enjoying the annual carpeting of the churchyard by thousands of snowdrops and still worth a visit at the start of March.

My recent trip to Stanton Lacy offered more than snowdrops. From the sky, above the trees in the churchyard, came a cacophony of noise. The rooks were preening themselves as they landed on the high branches hoping to attract interest

from one of the female rooks, perching nearby and looking coy (I had binoculars!).

Many rooks were already paired up, and they pair for life. They are also very sociable, forming large colonies and returning to their chosen nesting places each year. Rooks are very sharp when it comes to building. A bit of warm weather and they are collecting twigs. As we know, this January was the hottest on record so by the end of February the nests will be ready for eggs. While building and renovating some of the nests from last year to use again, these intelligent birds do not need a DIY shop: they just work together and create nests for all. This month, they will lay about 3 – 5 eggs and baby rooks will leave the nest next month. They will stay close to mum and dad until autumn when they will join the colony as they stay together in their winter lodgings.

Edward Thomas's little poem sums up the activity and the racket that rooks can make. But he also points out that they know more than us humans. They rise above us in flight and can see the weather that is coming before we can. The subtle way the poet enjoys the role of the rooks here is lovely. They take it for granted; they know that winter is gone. From their point of view winter is well on its way out. They may not know it's March, but they know spring is arriving and they are ready for this new season. Shall we humans join in?

# DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL PRECEPT 2024-25

Following the council meeting on 24th January, the precept for the next financial year was set at £7,500. This is an increase of £840 on last year's but still over £1,100 less than in the previous two years. This will result in an increase of approximately £3 per household.

The council made a conscious decision to try to keep the precept low but had to absorb wage rises for the clerk/ financial officer of approximately £260 and other inflation-related increases in running costs. We have reduced asset management costs by work being undertaken by councillors and local people volunteering their help. We are always happy to accept such volunteering with painting, light repairs and cleaning of assets. We continue to financially support the infrastructure of village halls, local charities and work such as the Flood Action Group where possible. The money received

this year from the Shropshire Council Neighbourhood Fund, derived from the Community Infrastructure Levy on new houses, has been earmarked to open up the play area in the school grounds to children and families. This was requested by parishioners in our Place Plan survey. The new playground area will be open even when the school is not in session and will provide an all-weather play surface. We have also earmarked £300 for an information board to sit alongside the War Memorial in St Peter's churchyard, which details the history of the names inscribed on it.

# A DIFFICULT TIME FOR SHROPSHIRE COUNCIL

I'm sure you will have read of the financial challenges that are causing major constraints for councils all over the country at present. I'm afraid that Shropshire is also affected by these.

Local authority finances have been seriously stretched by the ever-increasing cost of providing statutory services to local populations. Rocketing costs in service delivery are forcing many local authorities to consider deep service cuts in order to manage their budgets.

In Shropshire a whopping 80% of our disposable budget is sucked into the growing demand for adults' and children's social care services as well as increased temporary accommodation and pressure on Special Educational Needs transport. Shropshire's rising social care costs are exacerbated by our rural and sparsely populated geography, as well as the growing number of adults aged 18-64 who need care, and over 65s with increasingly complex needs, particularly dementia. Currently we have over 700 children in the care system and the number has kept climbing since the Covid pandemic.

Unlike the NHS we are not allowed to carry forward a deficit budget but have to balance our budgets at each year end. The pressure on our 2024/25 budget means we must review all our services, both statutory and discretionary: some will change, some will reduce, and we may have to stop other services altogether. We know this situation will have a considerable impact on our communities, but we have no choice but to rise to the challenge.

Our budget decisions are likely to include:

- Reviewing the strategy for library provision
- Reducing support for leisure provision
- Reviewing and reducing the number of household recycling centres
- Charging for green waste collections. Households could opt out of this collection if they wish

- Reducing the number of council buildings and other assets and accelerating the move from Shirehall into alternative offices
- Reorganising the transport needs of children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities: a consultation on this has already begun

Significant changes will go through further consultation involving both public and council staff, but some redundancies will be inevitable to meet our savings targets. We are already exploring alternative ways of delivering or reducing non-essential services and we are determined to minimise compulsory redundancies.

The challenge would be much greater without the savings of £41.3m that we have already made in this financial year throughout the council, the highest we have ever achieved. My own portfolio responsibility, adult social care, has to date contributed over £13m of savings to the overall figure and this will rise further by the end of this financial year.

Throughout all this and alongside our Local Government colleagues we have been lobbying government hard for funding reform that takes account of the challenges faced by local government, and the unique set of circumstances that makes Shropshire's position even more challenging.

I will keep Corvedale residents updated on the budget situation. We are determined to continue to provide the best quality services possible to our residents, but the road ahead is likely to be bumpy.



## DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL

SUMMARY OF THE DRAFT MINUTES OF DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL'S MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 24TH JANUARY 2024 AT DIDDLEBURY VILLAGE HALL

**Present:** Cllr D Hedgley - Chairman, Cllrs R Povall, R Morgan, C Martyn, T Pardoe, T O'Boyle, A Watson.

**Apologies:** Cllrs A Rattu, S Povall and Shropshire Councillor C

Motley.

In attendance: The Clerk.

**Declarations of Interest:** There were none.

**Minutes** of the Parish Council Meeting on 22nd November 2023 were approved by councillors. Four matters arising were considered.

Reports: The Chairman reported he had met contractors to obtain a quotation for the fencing, and with the Clerk had met a contractor at the school to obtain a quotation for an all-weather surface for the proposed public access playground. They had also visited the Corvedale Inn, which was closed, and had viewed Jack's Cottage and the new development in Bache Mill. Cllr R Povall said the landlord of the inn was ill, but it would be re-opening when he had recovered. The Chairman advised he had been in touch with the owner of Jack's Cottage and had received assurances that he was actively seeking alternative parking arrangements, as the original space was now subject to legal proceedings. With Cllr Martyn, he had visited 4 Peaton Strand, Bouldon, to deal with the planning application 23/04974/ FUL. He had dealt with complaints about mud on the roads, and been in discussions with the War Graves Commission and the Hereford Diocese about the proposed information board to be sited next to the war memorial in Diddlebury. In addition, he had done all he could to progress the outstanding highways and bridges works in Bouldon.

**Flood Action Group Report:** Cllr Martyn reported on the recent National Flood Forum meeting which he had attended. Mr Bellis was considering repairs to the leaky dams as he had funds available, and was liaising with Shropshire Wildlife Trust on the matter. Although the recent torrential rain had caused road and field flooding, no properties in Diddlebury Parish had been flooded. Run-off had flooded sections of the B4368, in part as some gateways had been sandbagged, preventing run off into the fields and ditches.

**Planning Applications:** The Chairman reported that application 23/04974/FUL, for the erection of a two-storey extension and outside cladding at 4 Peaton Strand, Bouldon, had been dealt with via DPC's Standing Order 27 procedure and had been supported.

Two councillors advised that No 5 Mill Lane had recently changed hands. It was not currently being occupied but extensive works appeared to be under way, including removal of the flat roof and its replacement with a pitched tiled roof, plus it appeared that an extension was being built at the back. DPC had not received any planning applications about this property. The Clerk was asked to contact the planning department to ascertain whether planning permission was needed.

Councillors also raised concerns that aspects of the planning permission granted for the development in Bache Mill were not being followed in terms of the wildlife strip, the gardens and the fencing.

**Highways/Environmental Issues:** The Chairman, Cllrs O'Boyle and Rattu had attended a meeting at the Beambridge Clubroom to discuss, with other parishes, the report on speeding measures on the Corvedale stretch of the B4368 prepared by Highways Engineer Nick Newton. The bottom line was that there was no money available for anything but cosmetic measures. It was left

that each parish would write up and submit to Highways a wishlist of what it would like to see in its parts of the Corvedale to reduce speed.

Two councillors and members of the public had raised with DPC the unsightly manner in which BT had sought to connect telephone/Broadband services to the Malt House. Part of cabling had been inserted in a grey plastic downpipe, which had been attached to the side of the footbridge in Mill Lane in a very visible manner, which was considered to be incompatible with a conservation area. The Clerk was requested to contact Mr Jack Wrigley to seek a visually improved scheme.

**Communications and Correspondence:** Twenty items of correspondence were considered. Cllr R Povall agreed to deal with Item 20 and provide a response to the letter from Culmington Parish Council. He would visit the new owners of Chapel House. The Clerk was asked to contact the Place Plan department at SC to ascertain whether it was open to DPC to vary the designation of that part of Seifton which is in Diddlebury Parish from community cluster to open countryside.

Application for a donation towards exterior refurbishment works from Westhope Village Hall Committee: The Committee had not been able to provide DPC with adequate quotations for the works nor the requested up-to-date accounts, so had withdrawn its application for the time being.

Consideration of quotations for works on the proposed public access playground in part of the school grounds at Corvedale C of E school, Diddlebury: The proposed playground required realignment of the existing fencing plus additional fencing. DPC approved a quotation of £2,598 plus VAT for these works and they would take place in the Easter holidays. One quotation in the region of £14,500 had been obtained for the all-weather surfacing works and additional quotations were being sought. It was agreed by the DPC councillors that, in principle, the work would proceed once quotations and funding were in place. Two councillors agreed to explore funding avenues. The fencing works would be paid for from existing Neighbourhood Fund receipts. Residents of Diddlebury Parish were invited to make individual donations towards the cost of this playground, which would be available 24/7 to all children and their families.

**Finance Matters:** The Finance Report for December 2023 – January 2024 was considered and cheques totalling £769.63 were approved for payment, after which DPC held funds totalling £23,081.93. Cllr O'Boyle verified the reconciliation between DPC's cash book and bank statement 377.

**Consideration and adoption of the 2024-25 Precept Budget:** Councillors considered DPC's 2024-2025 Precept Budget and voted for a budget of £7,500, which would cost Band D council tax payers £25.46. A copy of the Budget could be viewed on DPC's website.

**Meeting dates and times for 2024 – May 2025:** A list of meeting dates was approved. Cllr O'Boyle proposed that in future meetings commence at 7.15pm rather than 7.30pm and this was adopted. A list of meeting dates can be viewed on DPC's website.

**Any Other Business:** Local groups, charities and organisations were reminded that DPC considers requests for small donations at the March meeting – 20th March 2024. Please send requests to the Clerk or Chairman.

DRAFT MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF MUNSLOW PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON THURSDAY 1ST FEBRUARY 2024

**Present:** Cllrs Barbara Archer (Chair), Nigel Dobson, Andy Johnson and Graham Williams. In attendance: Cllr Cecilia Motley (Shropshire Council) and H Coonick (Clerk/RFO).

**Apologies for Absence:** Cllrs Antonia Bury, Val Fotheringham, Ed Povey, David Marston and Chris Meeson.

**Declarations of Interest:** None.

Public Forum: No members of the public were present.

**Minutes** of the Parish Council meeting held on 7th December 2023 were signed by the chair as a correct record.

**Reports:** Chair's Report: Cllr Archer reported that the application for solar panels at Aston Munslow had been withdrawn.

Cllr Motley reported that Shropshire Council was making drastic reductions in budgets to ensure it can provide statutory services to Children's and Adults' services. It was due to make a public announcement the following week. She had spoken to Tracy Darke, Assistant Director Economy & Place, regarding the B4368 meeting between Shropshire Council and Diddlebury and Munslow Parish Councils. Ms Darke would discuss the matter with the Traffic Engineers. The Council was combining the Place Plans with the equivalent in Health and Wellbeing. The Clerk said that she had already been contacted by the Health and Wellbeing Team.

**Cllr Dobson** had nothing to report about the Beambridge Club Room.

**Clir Meeson** had attended a meeting of South Shropshire Chairs on behalf of Clir Archer. He had sent a report. There had been considerable discussion about the implications of Martyn's Law for Parish Councils. The Clerk reported that this could be incorporated into the Emergency Plan for the parish. Other matters discussed were affordable housing and banking issues.

**Highways:** Minutes of the B4368 Report and Meeting with Shropshire Council had been circulated to the Traffic Engineers, Diddlebury and Munslow Parish Councils, Cllr Motley, and West Mercia Police.

**Highway Priorities:** It was agreed that Shropshire Council should be informed that the priorities for the B4368 through Munslow Parish were:

- for there to be a speed limit of 40mph throughout the length of the parish, maintaining the present 30mph limits within the villages.
- for there to be additional funding for West Mercia Police to enforce the limits.
- additional posts to be installed for the mobile vehicle activated signs.

It was agreed that the first and third point be added to the Place Plan.

**Other Highway Matters:** Cllrs Dobson and Williams reported that the vehicle activated signs were all functioning well and were noticeably effective at reducing the speed of traffic. They were still waiting for additional posts to be installed by Shropshire Council.

The Clerk reported that the application to the Police and Crime Commissioner for a further Mobile Vehicle Activated Sign made earlier in the year would be considered by the PCC in the next round of funding.

Cllr Archer reported that residents wanted to thank the Council and the Environmental Maintenance Contractor for the work carried out near The Swan Inn at Aston Munslow. Further work for the contractor had been in Beambridge and Broadstone.

Councillors, the Clerk and many members of the public had reported the flooding and condition of Rowe Lane to Shropshire Council via Fix My Street. Shropshire Council had now used a digger to clear the ditches and the flooding had gone. Further work was planned.

**Correspondence:** Snowball Community: the Disability App was noted. The Clerk would inform the Community Health and Wellbeing Survey (Joint Strategic Needs Assessment) Team of the best methods of communicating with parishioners regarding the survey.

**Update on Access to Work:** The Clerk reported that she had now received various pieces of equipment from the government scheme to enable her to continue to work as a clerk. They were proving very effective.

**Delegation, Biodiversity, and Complaints Policies:** The Council resolved to adopt all three policies.

**Update on Emergency Planning:** The Clerk reported that she had attended an Emergency Planning session with Cllr David Hedgley (Chair of Diddlebury Parish Council). It had been agreed to support the proposal for a joint working party for Emergency Planning with neighbouring parish councils.

**Finance:** The bank account held £10,905.06 as at 19th December 2023. The budget report showed overspends on several items and a further £1,375 was needed to cover expenditure during January - March. The report was accepted and the budget would be increased by £1,375. The bank reconciliation was signed as accurate by Cllrs Johnson and Williams.

**Payments were authorised to:** HMRC (£180.20), D Lewis for Environmental Maintenance (£80.75 and £63.75).

**Neighbourhood Fund Payments:** The Parish Council would receive a payment of £3,234.22 from the Neighbourhood Fund in April. This money could be spent on items of infrastructure or on addressing the demands of development within the area. This matter would be placed on the agenda for the Annual Parish Meeting.

**Community Governance and Boundary Review:** Diddlebury Parish Council had acknowledged receipt of the letter about the boundary at Seifton Batch.

The Clerk reported that she had hand delivered a joint letter from Stanton Lacy and Culmington Parish Councils to six households in Vernolds Common informing them of the proposal to transfer them to Culmington Parish Council area and giving them the opportunity to comment.

Reports from Members: Cllr Motley reported that Shropshire Council had received the final settlement from the Government but it was not enough to cover costs and the forthcoming year looked very unclear financially. She had managed to reduce the costs of her departments by approximately £15 million but further reductions would be drastic. The Council would do what it could to try to continue to provide services. The NHS was looking at health provision in rural areas. Station Drive had now taken over full responsibility for the operation of Ludlow Hospital.

**Clir Mear** said that the Village Hall Committee had planned a range of events, some to raise money for the extension but also to encourage as many people as possible to use the hall. There were still issues trying to get Wi-Fi for the hall. The Committee thanked the Parish Council for the donation towards the costs of maintaining the defibrillator.

**Correspondence:** Crane Quality Counselling donation request – this would be included in the consideration of donations at the March meeting.

Shropshire Planning Enforcement – Councillors had been provided with information from the Planning Enforcement Team on the updated planning enforcement protocol and priorities when dealing with planning enforcement.

**Highways:** The Clerk reported that she had received confirmation that day that the post for the Speed Indicator Device at the eastern entrance to Culmington Village had been ordered and once it had been installed the Speed Indicator Device could be ordered.

Mr Jeff Williams from the Parish Path Group was asking for volunteers to help with repairs to the footbridge on Seifton Lane. Further money had been received from Shropshire Council for the paths group equipment.

The permit for the desilting of Seifton Brook was for three years and would end on 30th June 2024. Cllrs Byng and Turley would look at the brook in March and decide if desilting was required.

**Telephone Box at Vernolds Common:** Further reasons why the box should be retained with telephony had been given to BT. Shropshire Council was awaiting their decision. If BT decided not to retain the telephony Stanton Lacy Parish Council would consider adopting the box. It is, however, in very poor condition.

**Emergency Planning:** The Clerk reported that she had attended an Emergency Planning session with Cllr Hedgley from Diddlebury Parish Council. It was agreed that Culmington Parish Council would support a joint working group with Diddlebury and Munslow Parish Councils and Flood Action Groups to develop a plan.

**Blocked Bridleway:** Outdoor Partnerships had been informed and would look into the matter.

**Finance:** Payment was authorised to D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) Invs 455 and 465 £106.25.

**Finance Report:** Expenditure was within budget except for the hall rental where there had been an overspend of £33. It was expected that the expenditure in total in March would be within the budget. As of the 20th December 2023 the bank account held £11,410.84 which reconciled with the accounts. The report was accepted and the bank reconciliation was signed by Cllrs Mear and Seabrook as an accurate record.

The Boundary Review would not impact the parish. Ash die-back grants might be available if trees were beside roads or footpaths. Clee Hill motorsport would be coming through on 21st January 2024. The D-Day 80th anniversary would be on 6th June 2024. It was agreed to forward details to the Village Hall. Shropshire Hills National Landscape (which replaces the AONB) would be making Conservation Fund grants of between £500 and £2000 available for funding environmental education. Applications had to be in by 12th February 2024. Cllr Whalley updated everyone on the Chairs' meeting and Martyn's Law.

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
