

CHURCH NEWS

LETTER FROM THE RECTORY

When I was in the Holy Land a few years ago, one of the places we visited was a beach on the shore of the Sea of Galilee. It is where tradition says that, in the time after the resurrection, Jesus had breakfast with his disciples after they had been out all night trying, unsuccessfully, to catch fish. There is a beach and a huge rocky area which has a church on it, which is said to be the location of the breakfast. In many ways whether or not it really is the location of the breakfast doesn't matter: if not here it was somewhere like this. What is more important is the conversation Jesus and Peter had as they walked by the lakeside after the meal, when Peter was asked three times if he loved Christ and was given a commission to 'feed my sheep' (John 21: 1-19). Asking the same question three times reflects the three times that Peter had denied even knowing Jesus on the night of his arrest and trial. We see that, despite Peter having messed up, Jesus forgives him, loves him and trusts him to undertake a vitally important task.

There's a message here for us all, not only individually but also as a society and on an international level. We all of us mess up from time to time. We all of us need forgiveness. Are we always willing to forgive when others are sorry for having let us down somehow?

'Forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us.' We say it each time we say the Lord's Prayer. If we all really meant it and put it into practice, the world would be a very different place to how it looks at the moment...

WILD ABOUT WESTHOPE

In this, the second of our occasional feature articles, our features editor Sharon Walters explores this unique local project.

How many of us take our beautiful countryside and its wealth of flora and fauna for granted? How many of us consider how it is being looked after and conserved?

A number of large organisations do their best. For instance, the National Trust works hard on open land and in many gardens and estates that all come under its guardianship.

But alongside such major projects, there are many smaller schemes that do untold benefit for our countryside heritage and are run on a mainly voluntary basis.

One such project is in the Hope Valley in the stunning Corvedale - *Wild About Westhope*. A not-for-profit group, it promotes sustainable land management to benefit wildlife and the local community. The group manages a local nature reserve with the help of volunteers who meet regularly to undertake conservation management, green wood crafts and charcoal making.

And help is always needed! A day out in the fresh air, meeting new people with a similar ethos and doing 'your bit' in conservation for sensitive plants and wildlife in a 'forever home' for species under threat.

Westhope is home to a vast array of flora and fauna and many of the people that live here and work the land are enthusiastic about preserving it for future generations to enjoy.

Wild About Westhope was born in 2021 under the custodianship of Anne Dyer, owner of Westhope Estate and the reserve is converting areas once used for commercial shooting into wildlife-friendly habitat.

Projects underway include woodland planting and meadow preservation with species identification.

A wild walk is also being developed that will take in some of the lesser and better-known beauty spots in and around Westhope.

Helping the project along the way has been financial support from Shropshire Hills AONB and the National Lottery.

And support also came in from the influential Joy of Wildlife, a group of amateur enthusiasts who carry out wildlife surveys with an emphasis on invertebrates, who have visited the Westhope estate twice to look at the meadows, and woodland at Corfield's bank and Princes' Rough SSSI.



The part of the site known as Princes' Rough is designated as a Site of Scientific Interest on the basis of its flora and on the day of Joy of Wildlife's visit they recorded over 160 species of invertebrates including a nationally notable weevil, Orthochaetes setiger, and a first record in recent times of the chrysomelid Batophila rubi. In addition, the visit found fungus Ophiocordyceps gracilis which had only been recorded twice in the county previously.

The visit to the meadows and woodland recorded nearly 240 species of invertebrate. For a single site visit this was an extraordinary number of species, said the group.

"Corfields Bank, Westhope is an oasis within the agriculturally dominated landscape of Shropshire and attempts to preserve and enhance it should be lauded and encouraged," said Keith Fowler on behalf of the Joy of Wildlife

SUBLIME MUSIC MAKING IN CORVEDALE

It's not often one has the chance to hear the Bach Cello Suites; I think the last time for me was about fifteen years ago at Stanford Bridge church in Worcestershire, when cellist Orlando Jopling was then on a pilgrimage to play in every church throughout the British Isles, no doubt with the help



of Arts Council Funding. Any chance to hear this sublime music - one of the pinnacles of western music - should be seized. So I was delighted to discover that this time, the soloist was to be none other than West of the Clee's new editor, professional cellist, Ruth Henley.

Bach's Six Suites for unaccompanied cello - of which two will be played at each of Ruth's three recitals - were based on the Baroque

form of linking dance movements such as the Courante, Allemande, Sarabande and Gigue, together with other dance forms, into a Suite. The writing is complex, virtuosic, melodic, and with a genius's hand making a single line suggest its own harmony. There are swooping scale passages, fourpart chords, string-crossing passagework, intricate highly decorated rhythms, and lengthy developments of repeated motifs leading to breath-taking climaxes whose reverberations could be felt through the very benches we were perched on.

Ruth says in her excellent notes, that 'it's not uncommon for people to speak in hushed tones of the Bach Suites, as they

are miracles of communication.' Since Johann Sebastian Bach was a serious and devout man, it's not too far-fetched to say this music is about as close to divine as you can get. It truly is spiritually intense music, and to hear it played in a sweet little country church like St Catherine's at Tugford, on a calm springtime afternoon, was a stunning experience.

The sounds of the unaccompanied cello filled the space with its chocolatey tones, and captivated the audience who sat perfectly still, spellbound. Ruth's cello, made by for her by Mark Robinson, has a well-balanced and sonorous tone throughout the whole range, and Ruth projects its voice, apparently effortlessly, but anyone who has played an instrument will know that a huge amount of work goes into making things sound effortless!

Ruth's performance of Suite No 1 in G major was thoughtful, questioning, investigative, almost as though she were improvising as she went along. The double-stopping and spread chords were magnificent, and the melodic lines always moving with forward direction to their logical conclusion. In the Second Suite in D minor, Ruth seized upon the dancelike nature of the music, with its intricate rhythms, and wove a sometimes mysterious, and sometimes playful account of this marvellous work. Ruth's masterly efforts are presented for the benefit of the Corvedale Parishes, in a series titled the Corvedale Concerts, and introduced by her husband, composer Paul Henley. Two further recitals will be staged in St Peter's Church, Diddlebury and All Saints, Culmington on **11th May** and **15th June** respectively, both commencing at 3pm. Tickets are available through *ticketsource.co.uk*.



CORVEDALE GARDEN GROUP



Corvedale Garden group visited Hillview Hardy plants (*www.hillviewhardyplants.com*) on a bright and sunny Saturday. Hillview Hardy Plants grow all their own cottage garden perennials including acanthus, albuca, primulas and auriculas to name but a few and they hold the National Collection of acanthus, albuca and auricula.

The group was happy to explore the plant sales with a welcome cup of coffee whilst catching up with each other. We were warmly welcomed by John and Ingrid Millington,

who run the nursery with their daughter Sarah and her two adopted children, who were very entertaining (and keen to sample our cake!). The group was split into two and Ingrid showed us a presentation about aurículas. She and John had met in horticultural college in Essex and then set up a nursery selling alpines. They took on two national collections of auriculas, then moved on to selling herbaceous perennials. They have showed at Malvern and Chelsea and run a mail order business as well as the nursery. Ingrid explained several different categories of aurículas, some of which had snowy white dust on them called 'farina.' Some had ruffles or were doubles. There were amazing colour combinations.

The main categories are show, border and alpine. Ingrid and John grow them in a double polytunnel with two layers of shading. They were prized by the Victorians who displayed them in black auricular theatres, traditionally in clay pots, on east or west facing walls. Now Ingrid says they grow them in plastic pots which they drop into clay pots for showing.

We then swapped groups and joined John in the polytunnel and he explained how to split the plants, the compost they used and demonstrated their pot filling machines. All very fascinating.

We returned to the 'shop' for coffee and delicious lemon drizzle, iced walnut and berry streusel cake.

Most of us enjoyed buying a range of locally propagated plants for the new season for our gardens and if you have never been there we recommend a visit.

For our next meeting, and in an amendment to the programme we will be meeting at Walcot Hall, Lydbury North SY7 8AZ. On **Saturday 10th May.** Mrs Lucinda Parish kindly offered us a visit as the planned trip to the Dorothy Clive Garden has fallen through. We will meet there as usual at 10am when Amanda will collect the £5 entry fee. As Walcot is hosting a well-being day that day, refreshments will be provided at the Powys Arms on the main road: £7 for tea, cake, and time to chat. Sadly, neither Alison nor I will be free to join you due to diary clashes, but we look forward to hearing all about it. Please confirm numbers when requested following the email two weeks before for catering purposes.

Walcot Hall has an arboretum planted by Clive of India's son Edward in the 1800s. It includes specimen trees, rhododendrons and azaleas. There are fine views of Sir William Chambers' clock tower and the lakes and hills beyond. The western end of the lakes has been replanted. There are relaxed borders, an icehouse, meat safe, Russian chapel, shepherds huts, grotto, fountain and tin chapel and other delights to explore in the woods.

MUSINGS ON LIFE... LLWYBR AFORDIR CYMRU... DON'T LET THE STRAIN SCRAMBLE YOUR BRAIN!

It will probably live long in many of our memories; April of 2025 when suddenly the month declared itself early summer and azure became the sky shade for seeming ages. We went spontaneously to Wales to walk a stretch of the costal path in the poetically lithe Meirionnydd. Now, it is nice to have time to think about words. Welsh glues elements together to form words – so *aford* is the shore and *tir* is land. Trying to combine enforces a mutation of 'tir' to 'dir' and then it just flows. So the whole is perhaps 'shoreland.' I loved that - I hope you do too!



Now, we are told that long walking routes are becoming ever more popular and common. Some have a goal of a holy or resonant place: we might call it pilgrimage, but that may be misleading as it is hard to walk anywhere in our isles that does not have a vertical history of deep past.

Climb through old slate labourings at the south margin of the fjord-like Mawddach estuary, where the tide thunders beneath your feet, and you will reach an extraordinary place. Here on the hill above the sea is a land of relics of ages and people concertina-ed and superimposed on the same hillside; standing stones, cairns, and earthworks jostle for your attention, whilst further on weird field-systems of - who knows what - antiquity, are waiting to tease. Later in the day, and talking to a friendly villager, we wondered how the bronze axe-head in his family, given up by the earth locally, could have been made. Copper is here, but where was the tin traderoute and how were the proportions so perfectly mixed? Who knows, but man was and increasingly is. ingenious with things and piling up more information about our world which helps us make...more things and gives us, we think, a superficial short-term control over the world's natural processes. Today, our technology runs infinitely faster than the wisdom to know how to use it. You wonder how those ancients would have

viewed all this; oh, for some of their shoreland knowing!

Perhaps it is not surprising that people increasingly walk lines across the earth. We have now reached a time when our direction of travel and destination are uncertain: on that we all seem to agree. Perhaps walking paths gives us some brief sense of a quiet goal that we can achieve. Technology and the enslaved science which it serves have built us a shiny raft to carry us through the storm and who can blame anybody for ignoring the leaks and sticking to it?

And yet, people are now walking new paths and a small but increasing number are trying to follow other ways. It is not in any sense easy; probably the best we can make is small gains.

In spare moments, as I walked, I happened to be reading about the work of a serious new path-maker. Since the 1960s Sheldon Cohen, an American psychologist, has shown that the stresses of modern life are associated with all manner of multi-systemic disease. Illness is, of course, highly disturbing to our minds and so a vicious circle of unwellness can result. The pathways for the unfolding disaster were already well known, probably to a handful of academics around the globe. Since Sheldon's early work was done, the burden of strain on our bodies has increased enormously through toxins in the air, water, our food and our clothes and what touches our skin. We must add to this the steepling rise in radiation that we 'need' to be alive in the e-world. Of course, our society has also changed – almost unrecognisably so: all is relevant.

This is all gloomy but not terminally so. Cycles of harm can be reversed and made virtuous. Some now are accepting whole systems of the body: nerve and gut cells, immune structures, hormonal landscapes and many more can be affected by what is termed a 'chronic inflammatory cascade.' It is like discovering a new continent, but we are a very long way from this being accepted widely which, I think, is needed to initiate healing on a wide scale. Sadly, it *pays* to treat symptoms.

With apologies for mixed metaphors and the doom-laden. I'm off for a nap and hope to dream of clipping the ball through the covers to notch up a century before lunch at Lord's – against the Aussies of course!

Expecting a talk by a photographer, we were told straight away that he isn't (in his own words) a 'proper photographer' - yet, as his images reflected, he is certainly a highly skilled user of his phone camera, being able to capture the most fascinating shots of very unusual and, likely, unseen locations in our country. Most of the shots Keith showed us were taken deep underground in disused mines which he had discovered through research into his family history and, in particular, by focusing on his great grandfather who, he discovered, had lived and worked in Mid to North Wales as a miner. Keith's slide show introduced some shots 'in this world' to show long, forgotten homes of mine workers in these out-of-the-way mining areas of Wales. Through much of his research he was able to find the mine in which his great grandfather had worked and was even able to discover the remains of his great grandfather's tiny cottage, with just its basic foundations remaining. His photography, apart from being cleverly composed, captured some very colourful images, some created by the light shining in from above, and many unrecognized images, revealed some intriguing geological results of, for example, water very slowly dripping from high above onto single spots below which, over time, had developed to look like fossils. They were literally 'out of this world'!

Planning: 25/00968/FUL Proposed single storey extension, Village Hall, Culmington, SY8 2DB. Applicant: Culmington Parish Council. Cllr Mear was not involved in the debate. It was resolved to support the application.

Highways: Update on desilting: Cllr Mear reported that John Bellis, Shropshire Council's Flood Risk Manager, had visited the site of the outflow pipe on land at Seifton Lane and agreed for the desilting to be carried out.

Environmental Maintenance Grant Application: A grant of £1,500 for the year 2025-26 would be requested. It was confirmed that the council's expenditure of the Environmental Grant for 2024-2025 had been in accordance with the grant specification.

Village Gateway: The width of the verges to the southwest of the village near the speed limit signs is 1.7 metres. This would allow for a 960mm gateway. A single gateway without installation would cost in the region of £475 from a commercial supplier. The clerk was asked to investigate the cost of installation and the effectiveness of gateways.

Cllr Turley asked the Clerk to investigate whether there was still a weight limit on the bridge on the B4365 on the racecourse. This matter would be included on the agenda for the Annual Parish Meeting under expenditure of the Neighbourhood Fund.

SUMMARY OF THE DRAFT MINUTES OF DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL'S MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 26TH MARCH 2025 AT WESTHOPE VILLAGE HALL

Present: CllrDHedgley–Chairman.CllrsAWatson,CMartyn,RPovall,SPovall, T Pardoe and R Morgan.

Apologies: Cllrs T O'Boyle and A Rattu.

In Attendance: The Clerk, Corvedale Cllr C Motley and three members of the public.

Declarations of Interest: None were made.

Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting on 26th February 2025 were approved.

Matters Arising from the Minutes: The Clerk, in response to the accusations which had been made against her in an anonymous letter sent to her on 17th February, corrected mistaken information. Cllr. Watson said Severn Trent Water had contacted residents in The Moors and Moors View, to advise them that they had suspended work on the proposed new pipeline.

Reports: *The Chairman* reported that, on behalf of the parish council, he had sent condolences to the family of the late former councillor Mr Mervyn Thomas of Peaton Farm. He would represent the parish council at Mervyn's funeral on 29th March.

Shropshire Council: Cllr Motley said that parish councils should encourage Shropshire Council to resume the Community Governance Review, which had been suspended due to the Boundaries Review taking precedence. Some parish councils had agreed to amalgamate with adjoining parishes and others had boundary issues to resolve: for example, Stanton Lacy PC believed Sutton Hill should be in their parish, not Diddlebury. She suggested whoever replaced her after the elections should be invited to come to a meeting to discuss the review. At present there were two candidates running for the Convedale Division, Dr Colin Stanford and Claire Braithwaite. The parish council also needed to be aware of the government's plans to amalgamate smaller local authorities Into unitary councils with 500,000 populations and headed by a mayor: Shropshire was not currently subject to this scheme, but councillors needed to be alert to the future possibility that it may be.

Westhope Village Hall: Mrs Worthington reported on successful events which had been held at Westhope Village Hall. Community lunches would be recommencing in April and were open to all to attend. The Chairman invited the WVH committee to submit a letter to DPC asking it to take on responsibility for the maintenance of the WVH defibrillator, as it does for Diddlebury and Bouldon.

Flood Action Group: Cllr Martyn reported he had walked the length of the

Update on the Blocked Bridleway: A response had been received from Mr Bamber, Shropshire Council's Rights of Way Officer (Legal Orders & Enforcement). He stated that there is a 'disparity between the volume of work that our team has to deal with and the resources available to the team' which has 'increased since the Parish Council initially contacted us with their concerns' in January 2024. The Council would make a formal complaint to Shropshire Council about the lack of action regarding this bridleway.

Retention of the Telephone Box at Culmington: The Council would respond to the Shropshire Council team that the box should be retained as this area was at risk of flooding, was on a diversion route for the A49 and there were no other public telephone boxes on the diversion route. The option of adopting the telephone box, should BT decide to decommission it, would be added to the Annual Parish Meeting and Annual Parish Council Meeting Agendas.

Annual Parish Meeting at 7pm on 13th May 2025: The agenda would include items on consideration of the expenditure of the Neighbourhood Fund (including the Village Hall extension), repairs to All Saints Church, and Village Gateways, and the possible adoption of the telephone box in Culmington Village.

Finance: Payments were authorised to: H Coonick (reimbursement for inks and postage) £33.47, D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) Inv 718 £45.00. The Draft Annual Finance Report and Bank Reconciliation would be presented at the Annual Parish Meeting.

Items for the Annual Parish Council Meeting after the Annual Parish Meeting on Tuesday 13th May 2025: a. Village gateways b. Potential adoption of telephone box c. update on blocked bridleway d. dates and times of future meetings.

Councillors wished to thank Cllr John Turley for his service to the Parish Council for 55 years. He would not be standing again at the election. His understanding of the history of the parish would be very much missed. He was nominated by the Parish Council to attend the Shropshire Garden Party in recognition of his time as a councillor.

Finance Matters: The Finance Report for March 2025 was considered and cheques totalling £644.79 were approved for payment after which DPC held funds totalling £13,290.19. Cllr. Watson verified the reconciliation between DPC's cash book and HSBC's bank statement.

Audit 2024 - 2025: Councillors approved the revised Strategic Risk Assessment and the updated Register of Assets. Due to new rules being enacted, the Standing Orders and Financial Regulations were being amended, so their approval was deferred to another meeting. 
