



CHURCH NEWS

LETTER FROM THE RECTORY

The new Church year begins on Advent Sunday, which this year is on 3rd December, so we are now approaching this Church year's end. As we do so we are encouraged to think particularly about how the things we have heard about during the previous eleven months affect the world of today. Whilst this is something we really should be thinking about all the time it is good to be prompted to take time to do it. One of the times which brings this into a particular focus is Remembrance. As I write this the war in Ukraine continues, but it has largely been knocked out of the headlines by the events in the Holy Land. Whatever I write about the Israel/ Palestine situation will be massively out of date by the time you read this, but it is important that we remember that on both sides are many people longing to get on with living their lives and supporting their families but who have suddenly found themselves caught up in a horrendous situation.

Amongst the various hats I wear I am Chaplain to the Ludlow Air Cadets. Every year I spend time with them in the weekends before Remembrance Sunday helping to sell poppies. As I do this, every year someone tells me that as one of the clergy I should not be taking part in the glorification of war. If I was taking part in the glorification of war I would agree with them, but that's not what I think Remembrance is about. As we remember, and give thanks for, those who fought so that we can enjoy the lives we lead here, we need to think too about the world of today, praying for those who are not able to live in the same way as us because they live in war zones or under oppression. We need to pray for those, including members of the armed forces, who work to make the world a safer place for all its people.

Details of the services on Remembrance Day are given elsewhere in this magazine. There will also be an Act of Remembrance at Diddlebury War Memorial at 10:50am on **Monday 13th November.** Do join us.



CHARLES LEWIS 50727 PRIVATE 11TH BATTALION CHESHIRE REGIMENT

Born 1897 in Bromfield, one of seven children of John Lewis, farm labourer, and his wife Annie. His siblings were: William (1889), John (1890), Agnes Frances (1894), Margery Annie (1895), Sidney James (1899) and Gladys May (1909). In 1911 the family were living at Pools Cottage, Bromfield though they had moved to Sparchford Villa, Stanton Lacy by 1915.

Charles attested, aged 18, on 24 November 1915 and was called up on 18 September 1916. At his medical he was 5ft 3½" tall, had a 30" chest and weighed 7 stone 7lbs. He also required dental treatment. Charles was then working as a labourer at Church Farm, Diddlebury. After five months training Charles had put on 9lbs in weight and 1" on his chest.

Charles landed in France on 27 February 1917. After returning from home leave on 8 March 1918 Charles was listed as missing in action on 21 March 1918 at the start of the German Spring Offensive. His parents received a card informing them that he was a prisoner of war and German

records state that he was not wounded when captured. However in September 1918 they were told that he had died, aged 20, on 2 July 1918 at the Auxiliary Hospital, Hohenzollern Park, Magdeburg. This occurred whilst having his left upper arm amputated.

Samuel, Richard, Harry, Bert and George Woodhouse, five brothers from the Corvedale, all fought in WWI. Samuel and Richard were already serving in the King's Shropshire Light Infantry when war broke out.

Unfortunately, Samuel and Richard died in the service of their country and are commemorated on the Diddlebury War Memorial. Harry, Bert and George all returned home safely.

Harry was grandad to the current Woodhouse family living in Middlehope. He worked with horses during the war, serving in the Veterinary Corp in WWI and the Home Guard in WWII. Note the horse whip in the photograph rather than a gun. He returned to farm work at Shipton.

Bert was gassed very badly, and only ever did light gardening after the war. George lost a leg due to war wounds and went on to become a butcher.

CARING FOR GOD'S ACRE



A MONTH OF REMEMBRANCE

November is a month of Remembrance. We get led into the month via Halloween, when it was believed the spirits of the dead appeared and witches were out and about. While All Hallows Eve has been modernised, mainly by American imports, the celebrations - a strange word to use perhaps, when people used to mark the death of loved ones - have been toned down.

In the past, remembering these early November days was a reason for festivities. Fires were lit, church bells rang out, prayers for the dead were said and souling customs happened. On 1st November - All Saints' Day - the local church would be busy with services and prayers for the dead. Meanwhile, the local children would be going round the village 'a-souling', begging for soul cakes. Beggars were also asking too, as charity was seen as part of the revels.

It is believed that soul cakes were still popular in Staffordshire and Shropshire until the 1950s. The cakes were more like biscuits than sponge and had currants in them. All Souls day on 2nd November was a more serious day after the previous night's enjoyment, but fasting and abstinence did not stop children and beggars from asking for cakes.

Remember, remember the fifth of November,

Gunpowder, treason and plot;

Hardly have we stopped thinking of our loved ones, than it's time to remember Guy Fawkes and his co-conspirators' failure to blow up King and Parliament in 1605. Bonfires and effigies of Fawkes and friends were made and thrown on top of the blaze as a reminder of what happens when you commit treason. Children would beg for ha'pennies and farthings and even more cake!

Parkin was popular as was something called Thar or Tharf cake. Parkin I know well, as it is still a popular version of ginger cake. My mother was a Lancastrian and on Bonfire Night we ate Parkin. Thar cake was made with similar ingredients, oatmeal, butter and treacle, but, like soul-cake, was more a biscuit than a sponge, and has not survived.

So now we come to Remembrance as we mark it each year. The 11th day of November 1918 saw the end to what should surely have been the 'war to end all wars'. World War I ended at the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month and has been marked in Europe ever since, now incorporating remembrance of WWII and all that have followed.

We have come a small way through this month when the idea of remembrance has been marked in a variety of ways. And we have moved through prayers to frivolity and effigies and lots of cake to what is now a solemn occasion. So let's finish with the fourth verse of Laurence Binyon's poem, 'For the Fallen':

They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We shall remember them.

CORVEDALE GARDEN GROUP 🕏

With recent Midlands news items highlighting the year's fantastic local grape harvest, it was a great opportunity for the Corvedale Garden Group to visit Coddington Vineyard, situated between Ledbury and Malvern. We were, therefore, able to admire not only the 2300 vines, but also the beautiful gardens which feature terraces, wildflowers and a woodland walk alongside a large pond and stream. A visit earlier in the year would reveal masses of spring bulbs, primulas, hostas, and hellebores. However, at this stage in the season the garden was full of late flowering roses, verbena bonariensis, ferns and late flowering perennials such as asters, rudbeckias and astrantia.

The current owners of the vineyard have lived in the beautiful Grade 2 listed property complex (house, barns, and apple press house) for just over 11 years. Initially, the focus was on the 400-year-old house, then the garden, before they finally started the A4 sheet of instructions on how to manage a vineyard! From four hundred bottles of wine produced in their early years, 4,000 bottles are the norm today. Reflecting on the transition, the owner pondered on the hard work but also the great enjoyment.

The house has a superb view onto the garden, and we took a circular walk alongside the large pond and the stream flowing from it towards the woodland area and then up to the vines. The hamamelis are clearly enjoying their position along the stream with the cornus, while the Persian ironwood (Parrotia persica), Ginkgo, Indian bean tree and the Betula Jacquemontii (white stemmed birch trees) were worth pointing out. The autumn colour from the Liquidambar (sweetgum) will also be spectacular. Six thousand wild daffodil bulbs have been

planted in what is now a wild area and we learned that, after 5 years, the owl box has been occupied, its occupants with the two resulting owlets clearly enticed by the longer grasses growing below, habitat for voles and other small creatures offering a ready-made food supply. Another section of the garden contained some old species of fruit trees. The quince was heavily laden, and the Pitmaston Pineapple (an old apple variety) offered an interesting texture as well as a rich flavour with pineapple notes.

Harvesting of the Bacchus and Ortega grapes had been in full swing for a few weeks, but the Pinot Gris grapes were hanging heavily on the stems ready to be picked. The twoacre vineyard is south facing and with its own special sheltered microclimate produces a small selection of acclaimed wines, available to buy in the old apple press house. The Garden Group was fortunate in being offered a tasting of both the Bacchus and Pinot wines and a few sales were made!

The Garden Group's final meeting for 2023 is on **Saturday 11th November** at 10.00am in Diddlebury Village Hall. This should not be missed as Tamsin Westhorpe of Stockton Bury Gardens offers her gardening advice on how to 'Prepare for the Perfect Spring.' Gardening is and always has been a major part of Tamsin's life. She is both a practical firsthand gardener and someone extremely well regarded in the horticultural field. As an entertaining, humorous, and knowledgeable speaker this talk should not be missed by anyone aiming to create a fabulous garden in 2024. Admission is £10 to include refreshments and there will be a raffle.

CORVEDALE BOOK GROUP



This month's book was published in 2015 and described by one reviewer as a 'memorable rural novel'. Cohu was a new author to the group, and this was his debut novel although he has published other non-fiction works and been a columnist for the Daily Telegraph. He lives in Lincolnshire, the location for this novel. Cohu himself describes the book as a romance in the sense that it has mystery and love and hopefully entertaining Gothic aspects. He says that it began with a strongly political enquiry about the bewilderment he experienced as a teenager at the conservatism of the people of Lincolnshire who had historically suffered so much. His love of the countryside and respect for the working people of rural Lincolnshire resonates through the book.

In the summer of 1985, two travellers walk south across the Lincolnshire Wolds to a village riven with dark secrets. When Norman Tanner kills his workmate and, he thinks he has gotten away with it. But he doesn't know about his workmate's girlfriend or the child who will come back to haunt him; and how he is caught up in a story that stretches back to that Victorian summer. For some in the village of Southby and its nearby grand estate, people are in charge of their fate and the world is full of meaning; for others, there is nothing but grass.

Set almost entirely in a small, vividly described part of the Lincolnshire Wolds, the main body of the novel is concerned with the 30-year period from 1985 to the present day, but there is an early section set in 1875 and the book returns to the Victorian period at its close. This allows the reader to visit and revisit the manor house, the market town, the woods. farms, and quarries, and watch them both persist and alter. It let's us see, too, the differing ways in which they are used and understood across time. The past informs the present in more direct ways, too. In Nothing But Grass's central incident, in 1985, when Norman kills his workmate with a spade and secretly buries him, the act creates a hidden instability like a sinkhole under the lives of not only Norman but a dozen of the book's other characters. Some years later a skeleton is dug up, but it proves to be from the Victorian era: another secret, another sinkhole, another distortion in the collective history of this ordinary Lincolnshire community.

There are no central characters; instead, a large cast of individuals and families arrive and depart over 30 years. Some of the group enjoyed this aspect of the novel but it made the

novel feel more like a series of short stories which left you wondering what was significant in uncovering the secrets and what was less so. Some of these short stories interrelated, sometimes closely, sometimes loosely, to each other rather than contributing to any central narrative. This feels much like life and the way it unfolds over time: our friendship groups form and dissolve and overlap like Venn diagrams, things matter and then fade, and there is much we don't know about our neighbours and relatives. However, this made it hard to keep track of all the characters and their relationships to one another. We found ourselves struggling to remember names, incidents, and the timeline!

Cohu is a writer who clearly understands human frailty, and one of the most appealing things about *Nothing But Grass* is the dignity it grants its characters. Nobody – not even the slow-witted Norman with his lethal edging spade – is easily judged or mocked. There is real compassion in the way the book traces the effects of time on people's hopes and dreams. It was refreshing to read a novel set in a rural location, and which depicts the lives of ordinary people so well.

Most of us enjoyed the book and wanted to uncover the truths and secrets held within it. We found it professionally written on the whole with evocative descriptions of places and clearly drawn pictures of the characters. However, it had some flaws. Cohu's male characters are stronger than his female ones, with the exception of Frances, the child mentioned earlier. The dialogue works well in places but elsewhere it doesn't always ring true. As the narrative approaches the present day, Cohu throws a lot of other contexts at it - the Iraq war, flooding, the financial crash - and this made the book seem a little over long and confused at times. But the desire to know what happened one hundred years ago, and whether Norman will get away with his more recent crime, is enough to hold the attention, while Cohu's insightful, moving depictions of both people and place illuminate what is an accomplished novel.

The group's next meeting will be at 7.30pm on **Thursday 9th November** at Culmington Village Hall when we will discuss *Home Going* by Yaa Gyasi, a story of two sisters with quite different destinies: one sold into slavery; one a slave trader's wife.

CORVEDALE PAST & PRESENT

NOVEMBER THOUGHTS ON OVALS, AND SOME OTHER SHAPES

When Linda suggested to me that we might have a little more about oval shapes this month I had to have a little think! If you look at the earth and man's impact on the land and the marks he has left, and still leaves on it, ovals appear everywhere both historically and down to the modern day, including all sorts of things from enclosures of unknown antiquity to contemporary stadia. Hardly surprising, I suppose, because when you look at the natural world, they are even more pervasive. It's a real shape of nature.

Let me try to explain.

Fractals seem to be a popular word these days. My poor understanding of them would probably drive anyone who understood any mathematics mad. It is, though, a fascinating subject, so here goes! A shape or pattern which seems random and isolated can, in fact, be repeated on various levels, from the tiniest to the most immense. So, one of our ancestors, standing on Nordy Bank two thousand five hundred years ago, developed from a single human cell which was ovoid in shape. The structure in which he or she stood is also ovoid, as is the shape of the trajectory of the innumerable planets circulating round numberless stars seen whilst gazing through a cloudless sky. Those stars themselves are not isolated but configured in galaxies, which, if represented in two dimensions, appear as ovoid shapes. These galaxies are, of course, three dimensional and, I understand, helical in shape: presumably, the twodimensional dynamic ovoid spread into a third dimension. (I hope someone will correct me if this is wrong). As such, they are analogous to the human chromosomal arrangement which is also based on the helix. So, it begins to look like genetic information in a single human cell is arranged in a similar way to the largest structure in the universe that we can encompass with our small minds.

Going back to our stargazer on Nordy Bank (I am dictating this article to voice recognition which always interprets 'Nordy Bank' as 'naughty bank' – so much more entertaining!), every one of the trillions of cells in his or her body is reflecting an inconceivably massive structure in the heavens above. To push this a little further, astronomers are now telling us that those galaxies consist of stars of all ages which are dying and being born. Exactly the same is true of the human cells which have replaced themselves many times since we were conceived.

The most spectacular example of this is in our guts! Some have calculated that every cell of our gut lining – the epithelium – is successively replaced in days (some say three, some say up to ten). Epithelium literally means 'above the nipple' which seems strange, but an associate word is 'affiliate' i.e. to have a close association.

Startling, you may agree, but so what? Well, the gut lining is an area of contact with the outside world and the rest of the universe and is without parallel. It's far larger than the skin area. What is more, just below this very thin layer (about half the thickness of a human hair) is, some estimate, 80% of our immune heavy-lifting capacity and 20 percent of our 'brain' function. It begins to look as if this is of incalculable significance to our future and those who come after.

This is, of course, a vast subject and most of it is new. When I was a lad, although everyone knew about the islands of immune tissue in the gut and the massive plexus of nerves below the epithelium, they were simply ignored so that we could get onto the disease!

I hope this type of stuff is of interest: I would love to expand on it.

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MUNSLOW PARISH COUNCIL DRAFT MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON THURSDAY 5TH OCTOBER 2023

Present: Cllrs Barbara Archer (Chair), Antonia Bury, Val Fotheringham, Andy Johnson, Ed Povey, David Marston, Chris Meeson and Graham Williams.

In Attendance: Cllr Cecilia Motley (Shropshire Council) and H Coonick (Clerk/RFO).

Apologies for Absence: None.

Declarations of Interest: Cllr Bury (Beambridge Clubroom Lease). This item was moved to the end of the agenda.

Public Forum: Two members of the public were in attendance. One asked if the council was collecting data from the Vehicle Activated Signs. Cllr Dobson said the data was being collected and he would report on it later in the meeting.

Minutes of the meeting held on 7th September 2023: Item 13 should read 'to contribute £150 to the Trust'. The amended minutes were then signed by the chair as a correct record.

Urgent Items for discussion at the discretion of the Chair: There were none.

Compliance with the Eligibility Criteria for the General Power of Competence: The eligibility criteria are that a. a majority of councillors are elected rather than co-opted and b. the Clerk has attained a Certificate in Local Council Administration. The Council resolved that it complied with the eligibility criteria and now had the General Power of Competence.

Reports: Cllr Motley reported that the Boundary Commission had agreed most of the suggestions made by Shropshire Council. However, the Corvedale division would now include Cardington Parish. The proposals would be ratified by Parliament in November. The Parliamentary Boundary Commission Review had been completed but this had resulted in some parishes being split, so the electoral team would be working on this alongside the review of the polling stations. It was unlikely that the Community Governance review of the parish boundaries would be completed until after the next election (no later than 2025). British Telecom planned to move over to a digital service but there were concerns about how this would affect some groups of people. The government's plan to ban the installation of oil and gas boilers had been delayed until 2035. A memorandum of understanding had been agreed between Shropshire, Herefordshire, Powys and Monmouthshire Councils and is called The Marches Forward Partnership. They would join forces to apply for funding from Government on major projects that would benefit the Marches region. There had been some progress in Cllr Motley's portfolio with funding for people to be cared for at home. There continued to be a high number of children in care.

Beambridge Club Room - Cllr Dobson reported that the Big Breakfast has raised £430 for the club room and Macmillan Cancer Support. He would like to thank Alan Golden and the team who did the cooking and the generous donations.

New Beambridge Club Room Lease: (dealt with at the end) Cllr Bury left the meeting for this item. The new lease had been signed by all parties. A letter had been received from Mr Lindsay Bury on behalf of the Millichope Foundation with concerns about the cost to the Foundation of preparing the lease. It was agreed that the Clerk would register the lease with the Land Registry. A letter would be send to Mr Bury responding to the issues raised by his letter.

The Washwell: The council agreed that it should apply to the Land Registry for the entry for the Washwell to be changed to return it to public land. The Clerk would gather information from minutes, correspondence and historical records and then apply

for a change of the Land Registry entry.

Fundraising for the Henry Angell-James Memorial Trust for the Defibrillator: The village fete raised £150 and with other donations a total of £280 could be sent to the Memorial Trust. The teas at the Millichope Park Open Garden would raise further money alongside the money in the collection box at the village shop in Aston Munslow.

Website: Hugo Fox, the present website provider, would begin charging a fee in April 2024. The Clerk reported on possible alternatives. It was agreed that Hugo Fox should retain the website and the fee for this would be included in the budget for 2024-25.

Attendance at the War Memorial on Remembrance Day and the Purchase of a Wreath: Cllr Archer would attend a short service on Saturday 11th November and lay a wreath on behalf of the Parish Council.

Highways: The Clerk reported that comments from Councillors on Shropshire Council's report on the B4368 had been sent to SC on 22nd September. She would request a response before the next meeting.

Vehicle Activated Signs: Cllr Archer said she had heard from Shropshire Council that the sign for the western entrance to Aston Munslow had been delayed but should be in place by 10th October. Data from the mobile sign at the western entrance to Munslow showed that the majority of vehicles were now travelling at below 30mph. Cllr Williams reported that he has noticed a reduction in the speed of vehicles as they approached the second mobile sign now sited to the east of Broadstone.

Environmental Maintenance and New Tasks: The Clerk reported that the Environmental Maintenance contractor had completed work in the Rowe Lane, and Munslow and Aston Munslow village areas. The stream near the Swan Inn needed digging out: the Clerk would report this to Shropshire Council. She would ask the contractor to carry out work on the verges up to Five Ways.

Councillors agreed that the Clerk should ask for the speed limit at Broadstone to be extended to beyond the Seven Stars, preferably to Slaughterhouse Lane, and a speed limit for Beambridge due to the increase in traffic entering and exiting the B4368 with more events at Millichope Park, Beambridge Club Room and the Nursery.

Communications with West Mercia Police: The Neighbourhood Team officer for the area is changing.

Accounts: As at 1st August 2023 the bank account held £16,619.51 with an expenditure since 1 April 2023 of £3,511.73. There had been expenditure over budget for the Clubroom rental, defibrillator costs and grants. VAT for the new vehicle activated signs has been added to the budget but this would be reclaimed. There was a reserve and unallocated funds which would cover the additional expenditure. The bank reconciliation was signed as correct by ClIrs Meeson and Williams.

Items for Inclusion in the Draft Budget: Website fee and Defibrillator costs. Councillors would inform the Clerk of any other proposals prior to the next meeting when the draft budget would be presented for consideration.

DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL SUMMARY OF THE DRAFT MINUTES OF DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL'S MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 27TH SEPTEMBER 2023 AT WESTHOPE VILLAGE HALL

Present: Cllr D Hedgley - Chairman, Cllrs A Watson, S Povall, A Rattu, T Pardoe, R Povall, R Morgan, T O'Boyle.

Apologies: Cllr. C Martyn.

In attendance: The Clerk, Unitary Cllr C Motley and five members of the public.

No Declarations of Interest were made.

Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 26th July 2023 were approved by councillors.

Reports: The Chairman reported, sadly, the untimely death at the age of 64 of Chris Jackson, the best Highways Officer this parish council had ever had the pleasure of working with. He extended the parish council's sympathies to his family for their loss.

He has been approached by the Clerk of Culmington PC who wished to hold a meeting to discuss he parish council boundaries review. Cllr Motley's advice was to take no action until the Constituency Boundaries Review had been published, as it might involve parish boundary changes. He reported a deplorable act of vandalism at one of the new houses in Bache Mill and pointed out that the agreed tree planting, which seemed to be the subject of the graffiti, could not be carried out until November. He had taken up concerns about the possible demolition of a historic cottage in Bouldon with the Heritage Team at SC who advised that planning permission would be needed for any works or demolition.

Clir Motley said the outcome of the Constituency Boundaries Review was due to be published the following week: once received, work needed to be resumed urgently on the parish boundaries review. SC had launched a £150,000 community projects fund for capital projects: information would be circulated soon. A Community Hub would be opening shortly at the Youth Centre in Ludlow to assist families struggling with various problems. A Community Equipment Loan Scheme had been set up from which wheelchairs, crutches etc. could be borrowed and returned when no longer needed. BT was planning to shut down all land telephone lines by 2025/26: it is not clear what will happen to those who have no internet or mobile phone signal. The government was planning to legislate for all gas and oil fired boilers to be removed and replaced by other heating methods by 2030.

Flood Action Group Report: Cllr Martyn had submitted a written report saying that a meeting had been held with the National Flood Forum team plus SC Flood Manager (John Beliss), and SC Emergency Response Team (Angela Hollyway). Topics discussed included the fallen wall at Bouldon (no action), and drainage at Warwick Cottage, Corfton (cleared through and fenced off). The possibility of individual support in developing individual flood action plans had also been discussed.

There had been a stream clearance on 19th September. Flyers had been distributed to properties at bottom end of Mill Lane. Thanks were given to volunteer Colin Pitcher, who cleared Himalayan Balsam and other growth restricting the stream below the Diddlebury weir. Alison Cope of Mill Lane had contacted the Clerk about the growth of Himalayan Balsam at the Bache Mill development. The Clerk had contacted Jack Wrigley, who promised to clear the weed in the next few months and replied to Alison Cope accordingly.

Westhope Village Hall: Mrs Kath Worthington would represent WVH's Committee at DPC meetings. She reported on the refurbishment works which had been carried out, including a new kitchen, new lavatories and refurbishment of a storeroom. A request from the WVH Committee for grant funding towards repairing and repainting the exterior of the hall would be submitted in writing, together with three estimates, following which it would receive DPC's consideration.

Planning Applications: 23/03928/TCA – an application to fell one sycamore tree at The Malt House, Delbury Hall, Diddlebury was supported by the parish council.

23/03819/FUL – an application for a single storey extension, insertion of a new roof light, erection of a new porch and the replacement of external timber cladding with render at The Old Hen and Ferret Cottage, Sutton, SY98 2AJ was supported by the parish council.

23/03991/FUL and **23/03492/LBC** – applications for planning permission and Listed Building Consent for the erection of a two storey extension to Grade II listed The Green Farm, Middlehope, SY7 9TT. The parish council was not able to support these applications.

23/03497/PAAFC – an application for prior approval under Class R of the General Permitted Development Order 2013 for the change of use of an agricultural building to a holiday let property, at Preens Barn, Middlehope, SY7 9JT. The parish council supported this application.

Highways/Environmental Issues: The continuing problems with drivers speeding and non-residents taking up scarce parking places at The Moors/Moors View were discussed and various options to remedy the problems would be pursued. The access arrangements proposed for the highways operations at Bouldon had not, in the event, been carried out, as asbestos had been discovered in the water mains pipe. All work had stopped and the contractors had withdrawn from the site.

Communications and Correspondence: Eighteen items of correspondence were considered and responded to as necessary. No response had been forthcoming from the Sorting Office in Craven Arms to explain the very poor mail delivery and collection service in the Corvedale.

Finance Report: The Finance Report for August & September 2023 was considered. Cheques totalling £837.34 were approved after payment of which DPC held the sum of £24,877.89. Cllr O'Boyle verified the Clerk's reconciliation between HSBC bank statements and DPC's Cash Book.

Consideration of the Place Plan Review: DPC had submitted the following proposed projects to the Place Plan Officer for inclusion in the revised Craven Arms Place Plan.

• Improvement to Broadband and mobile phone signal in outlying areas (Westhope and Middlehope in particular)

- A playground in Diddlebury
- Provision of public transport
- Measures to slow the speed of traffic using the B4368 in the Corvedale.

To date the Place Plans Officer had not responded about Broadband or Public Transport. All the measures DPC wanted to slow the traffic on the B4368 were rejected on the basis of the lack of any serious accidents. Street lighting proposed by DPC would have to be paid for by DPC. The parts of Mill Lane which have no pavements cannot be provided with pavements as there is insufficient road width to accommodate them. A playground in Diddlebury cannot be funded from the Craven Arms Area CIL fund as it is not linked to any development.

Councillors were seeking means other than CIL to fund a playground for Diddlebury and were exploring possible sites for it.

Any Other Business: The Chairman would be attending some SC courses on emergency planning with a view

CULMINGTON PARISH COUNCIL DRAFT MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON TUES 3RD OCTOBER 2023 AT 7.00PM AT CULMINGTON VILLAGE HALL

Members Present: Councillors Mr Ian Alderson (Temporary Chair), Mrs C Byng, Ms J Mear and Mr I Steele.

In Attendance: Cllr Cecilia Motley (Shropshire Council) and H Coonick (Clerk).

Apologies for Absence: Mr A Pike, Mrs M Holland, Mr M Seabrook, Mr J Turley and Ms J Watts.

Declarations of Interest relating to this meeting: none.

Public Involvement Session: Cllr Byng raised an issue on behalf of the public in requesting a 20mph limit in Culmington Village. This issue had been raised previously and when monitored there had been no incidents of vehicles travelling faster than 20mph.

Cllr Mear asked if a card could be sent to the family of Mr Chris Jackson, who has recently died, in recognition of the support he had given the parish over many years. The clerk would send a card.

Minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on Tuesday 5th September 2023 were approved as a correct record and signed by the chair.

Compliance with the Eligibility Criteria for the General Power of Competence: The majority of the councillors had been elected rather than co-opted and the clerk had attained the Certificate of Local Council Administration. Accordingly, it was agreed that the Council complied with the eligibility criteria and now had the General Power of Competence.

Management of the Defibrillator at Culmington Village Hall: Janet Stuart, who is responsible for maintaining the defibrillator, presented the issue of the funding for batteries and pads for the defibrillator and for replacement for the machine in the longer term. The battery needed replacing now and the pads in February 2024. The cost of replacement batteries and pads would be included in the Parish Council budget for the next and following years. If sufficient money remained in the budget for 2023-24 the parish council would provide funding for a new pad and battery in March 2024. If the defibrillator itself needed replacement this would need to be covered by local fundraising or approaches to organisations which donate defibrillators. Responsibility for insurance for the equipment would remain with the village hall.

Community Governance and Boundary Review: Cllr Byng would meet with Cllr Povall (Diddlebury Parish Council) to discuss the boundary at Seifton and report back to the next meeting. There was agreement with Stanton Lacy Parish Council that six properties presently in Stanton Lacy parish should transfer to Culmington Parish Council area.

Highways: Shropshire Council would be asked to agree that the Speed Indicator Device (SID) at the Eastern Entrance to Culmington Village be placed on the pedestrian sign just inside the speed limit to the east of the village.

Reports from Members: *Cllr Motley* reported that the Local Government Boundary Commission had accepted most of the proposals made by Shropshire Council except that Cardington would be moved to the Corvedale Division. She would find it difficult to attend all nine of the Parish Council meetings due to the distances involved. The election team would now sort out the changes to the parliamentary boundaries. The Community Governance Review would not need to be completed before the next election. The government's proposals to stop the sales of oil-fired boilers had been extended and there was concern about the timescale for the changeover by BT to digital landlines. There was government funding available for rural areas called the Rural Prosperity Fund.

Village Hall Committee – Cllr Mear said building regulations approval for the village hall extension had been applied for. There were fundraising events planned and the recent Tractor Run had been well supported. The committee were trying to get broadband installed in the hall.

Flood Committee – Cllr Byng had nothing to report.

Renewing the Parish Plan: Cllr Motley suggested that the Shropshire Council Place Plan was now a more important document than the Parish Plan and the Clerk reported that the Council had put forward several items for inclusion in the Place Plan earlier in the year. The Council agreed not to renew the Parish Plan at this point.

Preparing an Emergency Plan: The Clerk reported that she had discussed this with Cllr David Hedgley (Chairman of Diddlebury Parish Council) who had suggested that a meeting with Shropshire Council's emergency planning team be organised. Cllr Motley would look into this request.

Website Options: The Clerk presented the options, none of which provided a cheaper user-friendly alternative to Hugo Fox, the present website provider. It was agreed to remain with Hugo Fox after they begin charging a fee in April 2024.

Finance: As at 15 September 2023 the bank account held £12,842.43, with expenditure from April-September of £2,143.86. This was within budget. The bank reconciliation was signed by Cllrs Steele and Mear.

The November meeting would include discussion of the financing of the Defibrillator battery and pads, and website fees. Councillors were asked to notify the Clerk of any suggestions so they could be costed and included in the draft budget.

Payments were authorised to D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) £238.00, H Coonick (Clerk) Stationery and inks £54.74.

Chairperson for the Next Meeting: Cllr Ian Alderson would remain as temporary chair.

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
