Edge Chamber Choir Concert - Sunday 18th September, 3.00pm, Diddlebury Church

Edge is delighted to have been asked to be part of the inaugural Corvedale Festival. We have planned a concert full of the most amazingly beautiful music for you, but as this music is not well known I thought I would write a few words about it.



Two of the works in the programme are written for choir and soprano saxophone, the highest member of the saxophone family - it makes the most haunting and stunningly beautiful sound. It will be played by Alison Dodd who is a local saxophonist and music teacher. The works are **Nunc Dimittis** by Christian Forshaw, Professor of Saxophone at the Guildhall, and **Son of God Mass** by James Whitbourn. The music for the mass was originally written as background music for a BBC 2 documentary series, 'Son of God', which chronicled the life of Jesus using scientific and contemporary historical evidence, which some of you may remember watching. James Whitbourn later added the words of the mass to it, and I took part in its premiere in Sevenoaks, Kent, quite a long time ago! I loved it then and I love it now and I am sure you will too.

Alongside these pieces, there will be a variety of short pieces including Eric Whitacre's **Sleep** and the first performance of **Pied Beauty** by Paul Henley, founder with his wife Ruth of the Corvedale Festival, plus three gorgeous pieces by women composers.

The concert will be about an hour long followed by afternoon tea - a perfect Sunday afternoon!

Letter from the Rectory

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This September sees the inaugural Corvedale Festival taking place, with nine days of events which include poetry and literature, art and music, with many of the concerts taking place in the churches of the Corvedale Group. Most of the concerts involve several musicians playing (or singing) together in such a way that the whole they create is so much greater than the sum of its parts. You could take a piece of music played by a quartet and listen to each part being played separately, one after the other. However, no matter how accomplished the musicians it would not be anything like as enjoyable an experience as it would be when they play the parts together, mixing and blending to create something that no single one of the parts could create alone.

Thinking about this I am of course aware that we can find other similar examples. I'm writing this at the end of the spell of hot weather in mid-August and over the past few days I have been able to see the fields around this part of the Corvedale being harvested. In each case this is being done by several people working together with different pieces of equipment, so that between them the job is completed quickly and efficiently: and before it started to rain!

There are, of course, other benefits in coming together, even in activities which are essentially things we do alone. We might benefit from the social aspects of meeting up; we might be able to improve our skills by learning from others; and in times of need we may be able to give or to receive support from others in the group.

As I think about the life of the churches I am reminded that as Christian communities coming together we too can experience something that is greater than the sum of its parts, not least by sharing in the skills of those who contribute in so many ways to the life of their church and to our worship of God. Part of our role, too, is to support each other in times of need. Unlike some groups, however,

Drama at Middlehope!



In mid-August there was some major excitement in Middlehope when a contract bailing machine caught fire and set alight to both the field of hay that it was bailing and some of the adjacent woodland. Some quick thinking by the contractor in unhitching the blazing bailer and then getting a harrow to create a fire break around the burning straw stopped the fire from spreading to a nearby property. Good work by local farmers ploughing and dumping soil to make further fire breaks and the local Fire and Rescue Service from both Ludlow & Church Stretton, together with a lack of wind, narrowly averted a complete disaster. The wind was coming from the southeast and caused the fire to enter Wenlock Edge wood. Fire crews returned early the following day to ensure that the fire was completely extinguished in the wood.

Diddlebury Flood Action Group

I have recently taken over from the much-respected Geoff Neden as the leader for the Diddlebury Flood Action Group. I have had links with the village for nine years and been resident for three years. During that time, I have helped my partner, who has lived here for 40 years, through minor flooding after she experienced two severe incidents some years ago and have helped to improve flood defences to her property.

The Environment Agency and your local authority have no statutory duty to protect your property from flooding, so the onus is on you to protect yourself. With autumn fast approaching here are a few suggestions. Let's get prepared!

For example... leaves can cause flooding... filling gutters, blocking road gullies, redirecting water flows. Gutter cleaning before the winter stops the leaves blocking the drains and gullies. Look out for blocked road drains, report these through the FixMyStreet app.

We tend not to think about emergencies until they occur. However, with a practical and positive approach, and by planning ahead, you can make yourself more resilient. The biggest severe weather risk in the UK comes from flooding, whether that's from prolonged or torrential rain, such as that which affected large parts of England and Wales in the autumn and winter of 2019-2020, or overflowing drains.

Householders should undertake an audit of the resources available to them - pumps, buckets, mops, wet vacuums, sandbags and drain rods etc.

Prepare an emergency grab bag, this can be for any emergency - such as fire or flooding (if you need to be evacuated). Useful items to include:

• Prescription medicines and toiletries, Identity documents (driving licence / passport / insurance documents / NHS numbers)

- First aid kit and whistle to signal for help
- Radio and torch (preferably wind-up or with spare batteries)
- Notebook with key contact details such as the doctor/ dentist/school, and a pen.
- Spare glasses/contact lenses, house/car keys
- Mobile phone charger
- Wet wipes, bin bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Items for any pets

Other useful things to be aware of:

- Knowing where and how to turn off your utilities (gas / water / electricity)
- Family meeting place / alternative place to stay in case of evacuation
- Important computer information backed up onto a USB stick or the Cloud
- Three days' supply of non-perishable food and water to be kept in your home
- · Check smoke / carbon dioxide alarms weekly
- Storing items of sentimental value or importance upstairs or on upper shelves (bank statements/photo albums etc.)
- Make your own personal emergency plan

Even if you cannot manage all of these, by doing what you can, you will be better prepared for an emergency affecting your home or business.

Etta Lemon by Tessa Boase

Etta Lemon introduces us not only to the life and work of one of the founder members of the RSPB, but also to the detailed interplay of her life with the contrasting activities of Emmeline Pankhurst, one of the founders of the suffragette movement. Throughout the book we delve into their similar beginnings, strong attitudes and contrasting motivations to become two of the most driven and charismatic women, associated with groups that had a major impact on British society.

The story starts in the London slums in the 1880s where we meet Alice Battershall, a feather worker driven to stealing a feather, the cash of the day, and her fellow workers in the horrific industry that employed thousands of women and children in the cleaning, knotting, curling and onward processing of feathers for hats. We get a surprising insight into the vast scale of 'murderous millinery' where not just feathers but whole birds, sometimes deconstructed and rebuilt to fancy, were perched on the heads of ladies of the time. At its peak, the trade was worth £20 million a year (around £204 million today) and many bird species were driven to near extinction. We read in detail about the cruel egret hunting business in America where nesting egrets were hunted for their breeding plumes and the chicks left to starve in the nests and we see inside the dust filled, stinking warehouses of London where carcasses from across the world were piled high for sale. Hearing about the full extent and horror of the avian slaughter worldwide and the human workforce degradation to provide for this fashion (this latter more evident to our sensibilities than Etta's it seems), it was understandable how Etta became determined to stop the plumage trade.

From her middle-class, evangelical home, Etta started as a teenager with letters to the women attending her local church and later moved on to join forces, via the respectable medium of ladies' tea-parties, with other women of like mind, with the RSPCA, and subsequently with her husband Frank. Emily Williamson who started the Society for the Protection of Birds in Manchester and Eliza Phillips of the Fur, Fin and Feather Folk in South London were prominent and later Winifred, Duchess of Portland was crucial to add necessary aristocratic connections to the society's progress. Throughout their work they were up against opposition from various quarters, not least the millinery industry itself, but also from men of 'science' who ridiculed the women for their sentimentality and their unfeminine behaviour. They also had internal conflicts on the extent of their conservation aims, but Etta was determined to focus on the plumage industry.

Emmeline Pankhurst's story is more widely known than Etta Lemon's. She came from privileged roots, as did Etta, but she was determined to always appear demure and throughout her campaigns wore a plumed hat and fashionable attire as she campaigned for votes for women. In the book we follow the parallel development of the suffragette movement and the lengths to which these women went to try to secure rights to vote. We learn of the difference between the active and sometimes violent protests of the suffragettes and the determinedly peaceful suffragists, led by Millicent Fawcett. We are also introduced to the anti-suffragist women, notably Mrs. Humphry Ward and Etta herself, who believed that women could achieve their goals quietly from their positions in society, without need of a vote. We read about the horrors of the hunger strikes and the inhumane force-feeding of the prisoners. Emmeline escaped this fate: it was the working-class women who were treated most cruelly, a repeated theme throughout the book.

Objectives for both groups came about largely because of changing conditions following WW1 - women had jobs and to some degree voices, men were fewer, and the class structure had been severely dented by the war. In America there were several changes in legislation against the plumage trade between 1900-12 but seeming stagnation in Britain. In 1919 Virginia Woolf, who had campaigned for suffrage, was moved to write acerbically about the thoughtlessness and cruelty of following fashion and Lady Nancy Astor was voted in as MP following (some) women winning the vote in 1918. She was instrumental in the British Plumage Act of 1921, so the two often opposing interests finally came together.

There was lots to discuss about this book: we all felt we had learnt something and were going to dig out ancestral photos to see the horrendous hats worn by our relatives. We had not appreciated the scale of the trade and most of us, though RSPB members, were unaware of Etta Lemon. We found the characters and the research of facts in the early part of the book an engaging read, though later the narrative was a bit wordy.

We reflected on the societal changes of the last one hundred years and how male attitudes and female roles have thankfully largely changed. In the book the two differing approaches of the leading characters was well contrasted: Etta worked a lot through her husband and other influential men, though she masterminded the engagement of local groups of women in spreading the word across the country while Emmeline was always an independent, well-dressed

woman who fought her own battles. Neither woman addressed the suffering of women and children in the slums, both focused on their individual aims, and piece rate working, situations of extreme poverty and prejudice, so highlighted in the book, sadly continue.


A world on the brink.

One day in the early summer 1315 it started raining. It was a bit like the old joke, 'oh it's only a shower; it should stop by October!' That year it wasn't a joke: it really didn't stop raining till October, and bad summers were suddenly the norm. The hay was ruined, and crops failed. In those days, if you planted a single seed of corn, you needed at least three seeds back from the crop to merely survive.

It was such a shock because times since the millennium had got better and better. Yes, of course there were setbacks, but families got bigger as more children survived and the ambitious had even applied to their Lord to clear a bit of woodland and plant some crops outside the common open fields. Some lords quite liked the idea: a lord on the rise welcomed 'free tenants.' Some of the kit had got better too; ploughs were more efficient, and then there were those new-fangled windmills which made a difference.

There was even talk on some manors, especially those owned by monasteries (which were common), that the monks had worked out new farming systems which were making everyone even more prosperous, mainly themselves!

Looking back now from our perspective in the 21st century, scholars of economic history believe that the population of England rose at least threefold in the years between the conquest of 1066 and the year 1300. More people were climbing out of grinding servitude on the land and some peasants were even - in a modest way - becoming part of the monied classes, something unheard of in their fathers' and grandfathers' day.



As far as the land was concerned there was a technical legal term for all this clearing of wasteland and woodland - *assarting*. This all might seem quite obscure today but in fact the remnants are still with us. Medieval woodland often occurred on the tops of hills, steeper slopes, or parish margins and even today such boundaries are irregular, indicating that the clearing was piecemeal. The most

natural way of clearing would be to hollow out adjacent wood leaving a semi-circular 'bite,' rather like a child and

a biscuit. Sometimes this shape seems never to have been squared off - like here on the hill just east of Stanton Lacy.

Those people who can get access to and read medieval manorial documents tell us that the process of assarting was common. You might think, then, that the name would persist to modern times. It does occur but it takes some finding. I only know one example where it crops up as a village name today, and it just happens to be within a

mile or two of where one of our sons lives. It's a small community in Oxfordshire called Field Assarts.



What about the names of assarted fields, surely, they are commoner? Yes, but again they are not easy to find. Occasionally 'assart' or just 'sart' comes up, but I don't know any examples in Shropshire. There are other names, too, of course, which are associated with the process. One is rather ominous 'brake,' and this gives some idea of the massive effort involved in cutting down trees and grubbing out roots without power tools. Other names indicating previous assarting, are 'royd,' 'redding,' 'stocks' and 'stubbings.' I don't know any local examples of these, so please let me know if you do!

I do have my own idea as to why these names, which should be common, just don't appear. I wonder if the process was just so universal in the years up to 1300, that people got used to it and simply used the common field name of 'close', meaning any old, enclosed field.

Unfortunately, that bad summer of 1315 wasn't the end of the story. It was just the beginning, what with cattle disease, civil and European war, animal plague and then the Black Death. It took us hundreds of years to recover.

In hindsight it might seem obvious that resources and land were being massively overstretched by the 1300s, in part to support the population and ways of life that just weren't, as we say these days, 'sustainable'. You may see some parallels with 2022; I of course could not possibly comment!

Geoff Neden

Many of you will know that Geoff Neden, sadly, died on 4th August after being ill for a little while.

A civil engineer by profession, Geoff and Beth came to Diddlebury in 2012 after having spent much of their lives working abroad. He soon became heavily involved with this magazine. Having been a distributor in and around Diddlebury village for a number of years he joined the Corvedale News team in 2018 and became the Distribution Manager. The magazine had, since its foundation back in the 1970s, been successfully run on a very informal basis but he set up the systems so that membership and subscriptions could be coordinated in a much more professional and twenty-first century manner. His contributions to the team meetings were always thoughtful and practical. Geoff did not limit his community activities to the Corvedale News. He founded the Diddlebury Flood

Shepherd's Barn

Shepherd's Barn was the venue for the Corvedale Garden Group visit on 20th August and provided inspiration for the twenty seven people who visited. Sam and Kate have been in residence for just 7 years but have transformed the two acres into a working small holding, intent on being as sustainable and self-sufficient as possible. The fact that they have not bought fruit or vegetables from a shop for 20 years is testament to their commitment which predates the barn!

Sam and Kate's home, originally a sheep shed but whose name inaccurately became Shepherd's Barn, does have a 'traditional' garden. This has been developed into an elemental garden with interesting, planted beds representing earth, wind, fire and water. Close by the house, a shepherd's hut (with compost loo - where men need to sit down!) overlooks the pond and from this central point we needed a map to fully appreciate the different areas and to make sure we didn't miss anything.

An interesting risk assessment was delivered before we

were free to wander; beware the deep water, the bees, the geese with attitude and goats which nibble; before we got to the typical watch the steps and uneven ground.

Low maintenance is so important here: from the choice of plants (no time for deadheading) to wood chip, carpet and membrane on beds; from grass paths which are one or two mower strips wide to edging of beds for once yearly strimming; from hard landscaping with rocks to a fire pit (no need to weed or mow). In addition, the further away from the house, the wilder the appearance. Around the house is the Japanese garden, the shady seating area, the fernery; then comes the semi-wild areas like the top orchard and the hazel coppice; and then you reach the really wild areas.

What of watering you ask. No use of tap water here! 10,000 litres of rainwater can be collected and stored with a network of hoses, pipes and buckets to deliver it to where it is needed. How much potting compost do they buy? None, because they make their own.

The land uses are also interconnected in terms of sustainability. From the goat paddock and goats comes the milk, cheese and manure. The really wild area, with its brambles and nettles, is beneficial to the insects. The hazel coppice is attractive to wildlife, it produces nuts and is coppiced for firewood. Meanwhile, the deep pond supports a colony of great crested newts and a pair of breeding moorhens. The areas are so very wildlife friendly. Birds, bees and butterflies with a variety of other insects take advantage of the orchards and wild areas with their wildflowers: cowslips, cow parsley, fox and cubs, mallow, red campion, bluebells and daffodils.

The vegetable area consists of raised beds - and you do need quite a lot if you are to live on what you produce. The onions were laid out to dry and then there is the rest: squashes, beans, broccoli, cauliflower, leeks, carrots,

calabrese, cabbage, swedes, celeriac (to name a few). From the greenhouses come tomatoes, aubergines, chillies, cucumbers and peppers.

Deep South Apple Pie - Martin Jones

'Motherhood and apple pie' are supposed to represent basic US values. Which is slightly odd, as apple pie is not, of course, limited to America (nor, for that matter, is motherhood).

This recipe is clearly an Anglicised version because it contains marmalade, which, so far as I know, is not found on the other side of the Atlantic save in a few niche shops in large cities specialising in British foods. But it's an interesting change from the traditional British version.

Ingredients

Pastry	
--------	--

Filling You could substitute for bought shortcrust pastry. $1\frac{1}{2}$ lb 2 oz vegetable fat $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp 2 oz butter 1 tbs marmalade 8 oz plain flour a little cold water

Method

- 1. Rub the fats into the flour. Add just sufficient cold water to bind the pastry. Chill in the fridge for at least 30 minutes.
- 2. Peel, core and slice the apples. Put in a saucepan and cook slowly with the sugar and cinnamon to a pulp, adding just enough water to prevent sticking. Add the marmalade and butter and beat well. Cool.
- 3. Divide the pastry into two. Roll out into two circles: with one line a pie plate. Pour in the apple mix and cover with the second circle. Seal the edges.
- 4. Bake in an oven preheated to 2000C for around 30 minutes.
- 5. Serve hot or cold, well dusted with icing sugar, and with cream.




Culmington and District Flower and Produce Show

Annual General Meeting - September 20th at 7.30pm

In the UK, the number of us more than 80 years old is growing, both absolutely and relatively. We may have an advantage as far as experience is concerned, but there comes a time when younger minds (with more energy) need to take the lead. At the moment, there are too many octogenarians on the Village Hall Committee, so resignations are coming to the fore. At the Annual General Meeting on 20th September, there will be the opportunity for new leadership with initiative, to step forward.

Beambridge Clubroom gets its name from the time when it was used as a club facility for estate workers, in the earlier part of the 20th century. Over fifty years or more, the hall has been transformed from an agricultural building by local volunteers, to become the 'home' of Munslow Parish Council, Corvedale Arts Club and Munslow's WI, as well as being the Polling Station for our Electoral Parish. The hall is also the home to The Mappa Munslow, created to celebrate the Millennium and made by the children and ladies of the Parish.

Recently, Corvedale Tots, have enjoyed our facilities but there are more opportunities for wider use of the building, by the community. The scope for a new administrative body to develop and expand this unique, historic asset in the Parish of Munslow, is evident to the existing committee but requires new energy to make it a reality. It is not an onerous responsibility, the committee, currently meets about four times a year.

In 2023, the 21-year lease for Beambridge Clubroom is due for renewal. As a Village Hall, it is already a registered charity, but it is planned that it will be transferred from the ownership of Millichope Park to the Millichope Foundation, a charitable body that supports the arts in Shropshire. The heating and lighting in the Hall are currently being upgraded, together with the recent installation of Wi-Fi, this will make it more user friendly in the present climate of fuel economy and developing technology.

If you are a resident in the Parish of Munslow, please do consider coming forward to serve on the Village Hall Committee. Bring your ideas and energy with you so that we octogenarians can step down gracefully. It has been a rewarding commitment, but it is time to move on.

Matters Arising From Those Minutes That Are Not Covered On The Agenda: None.

Urgent Items For Discussion At The Discretion Of The Chair: The Chair and Treasurer of the Beambridge Club Room Committee will be resigning in September. Replacements are urgently needed to ensure that the Club Room can remain open. The Clerk will place posters on notice boards, Facebook page and Google Group.

Planning Matters: None.

Reports: *Shropshire Council* - Cllr Motley reported that Shropshire Council is beginning to discuss next year's budget as there is a potential deficit. The Government has agreed to give a two-year rollover budget. The Local Government Association has reviewed the Council's financial systems and the result is positive. They have also been asked to complete a Communications Review. The Local Plan is at the Public Examination stage. The Boundary Review needs to make any proposals for changes to the divisions by October 2023. An inspection process has been set up to check the accommodation being offered to Ukrainian Refugees. At the request of the Parish Council, she has written to Nick Newton to establish the date of publication of the highways report on the B4368.

Beambridge Village Hall - Cllr Dobson reported that the electrician is due to do the work on the hall on 25th July. The cost of running the hall will need to be clarified so groups using it can be charged an appropriate fee. See above.

Finance: The bank reconciliation and budget were approved.

Review the Accounts, Bank Reconciliation and Budget: Approved. As of 22nd June 2022 the bank account holds £18,857.02.

Quotations for the insurance renewal have not been received yet. Cllr

Meeson agreed to assist the Clerk to ensure the cover is appropriate. As cover is required before the next meeting the Council agreed to expenditure of up to $\pounds400$ on insurance.

Payments - Insurance up to £400, Recovery of costs for the May 2021 local elections £100, Microsoft 365 (shared with Culmington and Stanton Lacy PC's) £26.66, HMRC for Clerks Salary April-June £117.20 were authorised.

Neighbourhood Fund Annual Monitoring Form was agreed.

Highways: The Clerk reported that TWM will refund the cost of the VAS sign upon return. It was agreed to request that TWM remove the sign rather than the Council.

Cllr Dobson is in the process of requesting support for the funding of the VAS proposal from Shropshire Council. Various sign option and sites were discussed. A number-plate recognition sign is available, and Cllr Dobson is in discussion with West Mercia Police about whether this would be appropriate. This matter has been deferred to the next meeting.

Joint Parishes Highways Proposals and Communication with other Parishes: At the request of the Parish Council Cllr Motley has written to Nick Newton to establish the date of publication of the highways report on the B4368. A letter updating the other parishes involved has been sent.

Environmental Maintenance Contractor: Only one application has been received by the Clerk. A rate of £17 per hour was accepted and the Clerk will draw up a contract, obtain a copy of their Public Liability Insurance and introduce him to the work required in the parish.

Update on the Defibrillator: Cllr Dobson will ask for the telephone box outside The Crown to be turned so it is more easily accessible. Cllr Dobson will then purchase the defibrillator and cabinet. A second defibrillator for the parish may be available via a charity but its site needs to be discussed further.

Update on Queen's Jubilee Oak: A replacement tree will be available from Shropshire Council in the Autumn.

A letter will be sent to the households affected by potential boundary changes in Vernolds Common, Seifton Batch and Sparchford. The Clerk will contact Vicky Turner (Place Plan Officer) to discuss the issue of the inclusion of Seifton in the Diddlebury Cluster.

Reports: Cllr Motley reported that the Local Government Association Team review of finances had had a positive outcome. They will now do a Communications Review. The Government has decided to give Shropshire Council a two-year rollover funding which will make budget Parish Council Website and Planning: The Clerk has transferred planning slightly easier. The Children's Services has been rated 'good' by Ofsted. There are 609 children in the care of Shropshire Council. Summary of the draft Minutes of Diddlebury Parish Council's Meeting held on Wednesday 27th July 2022 at Diddlebury Village Hall

Present: Cllrs D Hedgley - Chairman, A Watson, R Povall, S Povall, T O'Boyle, T Pardoe, A Rattu, C Martyn

Apologies were received and accepted from Cllr R Morgan.

In Attendance: The Clerk and Unitary Cllr Cecilia Motley.

Cllr Clive Martyn, of Bache Mill, having been elected to the Parish Council, was welcomed by the Chairman. He completed the DPI and Acceptance of Office forms.

Declarations of Interest: None were made.

Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 22nd June 2022 were approved by councillors and signed by the Chairman.

Matters Arising: It was confirmed that responses from SC planning relating to the developments at Bache Mill and the old poultry sheds

in Corfton had been received but further clarification is being sought. Public objections and DPC's response to application 22/02425/FUL are on the Planning Portal.

Reports: The Chairman reported that he had carried out numerous maintenance jobs on DPC assets in Bouldon. He had responded to a request from Culmington PC about a planning application in the contested Seifton area. Much time had been spent trying to progress the resurfacing of the car park at the school and Diddlebury Village Hall which has been an ongoing saga since 2019. Action from SC and payment of the CIL £11,717 is as elusive as ever. Given the dangerous state of the car park, the Chairman proposed that Corvedale School, Diddlebury Village Hall Committee, the church and DPC appoint their own contractor to resurface the school car park/playground and the whole area around the village hall, ideally commencing in August 2022.

Further quotes and updated quotations from those received in 2020 and 2021 are currently being obtained and procurement legalities are being dealt with. It was resolved that DPC will send a letter to Mr Eddie West at SC saying if DPC has no positive response in 14 days, the contractor will be instructed to commence work.

Unitary Cllr Motley reported that Mr West has been very busy dealing with the new Shropshire Local Plan. Many parish councils are concerned at non-payment of their CIL entitlements, but some 67 have been approved recently: a lack of manpower is seemingly causing the delay. She also spoke about a proposed new Health Hub to envelop several GP's surgeries in the Shrewsbury area to provide a wider range of treatments than GPs normally deliver. The proposal is to build it by the football ground in Meole Brace.

Westhope Village Hall: Cllr Watson reported that work replacing the roof of Westhope Village Hall is almost complete. Some group activities at WVH have been disrupted or cancelled due to the road closures on the B4368 preventing users from reaching Westhope.

Diddlebury Village Hall: Cllr Rattu had no report about DVH but has had a communication from BDUK about possible Broadband provision in areas of Diddlebury with a poor signal: he will report fully once he has familiarised himself with the proposals.

Community & Governance Review: Cllr R Povall reported that Culmington PC has indicated it wants to lodge an application for a number of properties in Diddlebury Parish to be moved into Culmington Parish. DPC believes this is premature and more negotiations are needed with the affected residents and between the two parish councils.

Planning: 22/02632/FUL - application for the installation of 2

replacement oil tanks with hardstanding bases and 1.8m fencing and gate, at Elsich Manor, Seifton. Councillors considered and supported the application.

Highways/Environmental Issues: Various maintenance works are needed around the parish and there is currently no EMO: the last four appointments have not been successful. It was agreed to place an advertisement in the Corvedale News and via the Google Group listing the current works required and inviting expressions of interest from suitably qualified and insured applicants. A report prepared by Cllr Watson on the chaotic effects the works on the B4368 has had on local residents, businesses and the traveling public was considered. It was agreed Steve Smith of Highways and a representative from the contractors be asked to attend the next parish council meeting. The speeding and safety issues on the B4368, especially through Corfton, could also be discussed.

Communications and correspondence: 17 items were considered, and responses agreed as necessary.

Finance Report for July 2022. Cheques totalling £1,659.83 were approved for payment, leaving a total fund of £38,564.79. The cash book/statement reconciliation was approved.

Any Other Business (for dissemination of information only). The Clerk is moving on 7th August 2022 to *12, Brampton Bryan, nr Bucknell, Herefordshire SY7 0DH.* The telephone and broadband are not being connected until 15th August. The new telephone number is not yet known so any urgent matters should be referred to the Chairman - *01584 841 068* - in the interim.

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
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
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
